#### DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

#### **BICYCLE SAFETY**

Recently a student from our school was involved in a serious accident. While he has significant facial injuries he was rather fortunate not to sustain any broken bones. At QHHS we have a SMART Bike/Scooter Policy. Which all students are required to adhere to:

#### Quakers Hill High School SMART Bike/Scooter Policy

In order for a student to have permission to ride their bike/scooter to school and secure it in the school lock up they must abide by the following policy:

- When riding their bike/scooter to and from school, students must abide by the road laws and legislation, including wearing
  a helmet at all times during travel. Students must always use their bike/scooter with the utmost safety and caution.
- Students must be able to transport all equipment required for the school day to maintain a motivated approach to their studies and be prepared for their lessons.
- Students must secure their bike/scooter in the school lock up between 8:20am and 8:40am. All riders are required to be in
  class by the start of lesson at 8:45 to promote learning and academic achievement.
- When on school premises, students are to walk their bike/scooter until off school grounds. Pedestrians (people walking)
  are to be treated with respect and have right of way.
- The school bike lock up is a shared facility. It must be used by bike/scooter riders respecting other people's
  equipment and tolerance of many people using the one facility.

Any breach of the above policy may result in a student's bike license being revoked and no further travel to school by bike/scooter will be permitted.

Students are not permitted to ride without the license. The application form can be found on the school website or can be obtained from the front office. Here are some tips for riding your bicycle safely:

- Always wear an approved bicycle helmet, properly fitted and fastened to your head.
- Always obey the road rules, including traffic lights, Stop signs and Give Way signs.
- Ride in a predictable manner that does not require other road users to react suddenly to your movements.
- Give hand signals when changing lanes or turning left or right.
- Make yourself as visible as possible by wearing bright, light or reflective clothing.
- Plan your route using quieter streets, bicycle paths or shared paths, wherever possible.
- Maintain control of your bike at all times. It is an offence to ride with both hands off the handlebars, feet off the pedals or to carry anything which prevents you from having control.


#### **SEMESTER 2 FEES**



# STUDY SKILLS TIP FOR MARCH – FINDING HELP

Where can you find help when you are struggling at school?

#### PERSONAL ISSUES

If things in your life are upsetting you or stressing you this will affect your ability to learn effectively. Talk to your family, talk to your friends or other people you are close to or teachers you feel comfortable sharing with. However if you need additional support, make sure you find it rather than let things get worse. You can approach the counsellor at your school and they can give you some professional help or find someone who can help you with your specific problems. If you want someone to talk to, you can use Kids Helpline, a free confidential service: 1800 55 1800 or use the online service www.kidshelp.com.au. It is much better to talk to someone rather than lock it all inside you.

#### SUBJECT SPECIFIC ISSUES

If you are finding a particular subject difficult, the first place you should seek help should be your classroom teacher. Firstly ask questions in class as problems arise. If you find you have too many questions to ask in class (as you'd end up disturbing the class) then ask your teacher if you can make a time to see them before or after class or during lunch or after school. Teachers are happy to help students who do their best and are keen to improve. Other places you might be able to find help are: books or extra textbooks in the school or local library, other students in the class, students in older years, other teachers at the school, family members, family friends. If you try all of these options and are still having problems, then you might consider looking for a tutor. Often ex-students from your school who are at university might be interested in doing some tutoring or even teachers at other schools. You can ask your teacher if they can recommend anyone.

#### LEARNING ISSUES

If you aren't having trouble with a specific subject, but are finding learning for school in general difficult, the first people to talk to are your parents. You might like to write down your feelings or what you are experiencing so you can explain things to them clearly. Your parents can then help you decide what steps to take next. It is probably a good idea for them to talk to your teachers first to get their perspectives. They might make an appointment with one of the pastoral care staff like a Year Coordinator to sit down with you and your parents to talk through the issues you are experiencing. The school might also have learning support staff who can help you work out what your issues are and who the best people are to help you. If the learning support staff can't help you, they will be able to refer you to outside services who can diagnose and address any learning issues you might have.



# REFLECTIONS BY PARTICIPANTS

#### Kaitlyn Hockey (Year 10) 'Architectural Innovations' – A Research Project & Installation

"Another year of Prosperitas has gone by, and I cannot express how amazing the experience was. During the four years that I have participated in the program, I have researched history, architecture, our school and composed an anthology of poetry, but it is not the

knowledge that I've gained, but the experience of researching independently of the curriculum and sharing my achievements with others, that I treasure most. I love seeing what others have achieved as well. The competition has an amazing atmosphere and a strong sense of community and celebrates initiative, perseverance and achievement at Quakers Hill High School."

#### Muskan Soni (Year 8) *'Inspired By Nature'* – A Poetry Anthology

"For my Prosperitas project I composed a poetry anthology about nature. I chose nature as my inspiration for writing and poetry as my writing style, because it allows you to be creative and express your feelings. From this project I have gained new friends, experiences and confidence in what I can create and can share with the school community. The Prosperitas Program encourages you to be to do your best and helped me discover that I have talent for writing poetry and drawing.

#### Kopal Mathur (Year 7) 'A Home Away From Home' – A Semi Artificial Eco-system'

"My Prosperitas project has been a tremendous learning experience for me. It was a great opportunity through which I learnt about the behavioural and adaptive nature of aquatic life. I observed the role of abiotic and biotic components in an ecosystem in a micro-environment. Moreover, I also got a chance to showcase that setting up an aquarium at home can be inexpensive and adventurous."

#### Aarya Raghubanshi (Year 10) 'Fractured Reflection' - An Art Composition

#### What is it?

The image of the artwork captures a girl having a near death experience. The lifeless body is lying flat with open eyes, reflecting the experience of her soul. The reflection contains a young girl with bones, representing emptiness and the wings, representing good or heaven. This is the representation of the decisions she has made in her lifetime. The reflection captures the girl being judged by herself, raising the question of how an individual has lived their short life, and what stands out more, the good that they have done or the bad? The title "The Fractured Re-

flection" incorporates the back story of the artwork. Eyes are synonymous with seeing; knowing and understanding, yet, in my artwork the eye reflects a lifeless body and this suggests an absence of vision.

#### **Process**

The process started with an attempt to draw an eye, drawing solely on my imagination. The visual outcome of the drawing was decent; but I wanted to go beyond 'decent', so this is when I decided I wanted to capture the realistic essence of an eye. The initial phase was frustrating, as I had never worked with a large scale paper. In the process I made a ton of mistakes, I also learnt a wealth of techniques. The first attempt on a large scale paper turned out alright, although the mistakes were showing, lowering the standard of the product. I then decided to restart. I used all the techniques I learnt in the first attempt, finishing off my Prosperitas project in one week. In the process, my techniques in drawing and tonal work evolved and I am proud of the overall outcome. I used graphite and pencil toning for this artwork.

#### **Prosperitas**

This is my first participation in a Gifted and Talented program at QHHS. The Prosperitas Program gave me the chance to challenge my abilities, to explore myself and test my capacity to handle working under stress. I learnt a tremendous amount of techniques regarding the process of art making, but most importantly, I learnt how to tackle harder projects. This program has heighted my confidence both as an individual and an art student. This program was the platform for me to develop as an individual and I dearly appreciate the efforts of the leader teacher, Ms. Critchley for providing this opportunity for me.

#### Significance of Art

Art has been a big part of my life from a young age, as I saw my sister use her creativity for much of my childhood; I believe this triggered my desire to do well in Art. I admire both the theory and the practical aspects of Art. I admire how there is more than one way to interpret an artwork and the manner in which each individual can use their imagination to interpret art.

#### Inspiration

I admire eyes, and our vision out of all the basic five senses. Art is visual poetry, the captured imagination of an artist. Indeed Art allows the audience to construct their own meaning and to express their interpretations based on their experiences and imagination. I admire the limitless possibilities of our imagination, which can be captured through art.

#### **Outcome and Future**

The Prosperitas Program is the first Gifted and Talented Program that I have participated. I was not expecting much out of it. The reactions I got from people on the first glance of my work were priceless. In the future I do hope to use my experiences and take part in any opportunity like this to develop as an individual and an art student.

#### Measles, Mumps and Rubella High School-based Catch-up Vaccination Program 2014

Many teenagers and young adults are catching measles, especially while travelling abroad or from someone who has brought the disease into Australia from overseas.

#### Who is at increased risk?

Teenagers and young adults are at higher risk of measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) because many of them missed one or both of their routine MMR vaccinations as infants and/or the second dose of MMR vaccine was not included on the National Immunisation Schedule during their childhood.

Up to 2 in 5 students are not fully vaccinated against measles, mumps and rubella (MMR). Teenagers and young adults are also likely to travel for schoolies or other holidays to countries where measles is more common, including Thailand, the Philippines and Bali.

NSW Health has identified a need to offer a high school-based catch-up MMR vaccination program in a number of selected NSW high schools.

#### What can you do?

Our school has been identified as possibly having a high number of students who have not received MMR vaccination. Two doses of MMR vaccine provide life-long immunity. The local Public Health Unit will be offering one dose of free MMR vaccine to students in Years 10 -12 starting in the 2014 3<sup>rd</sup> term. Parent Information Kits will be sent home soon and parents should:

- read the information provided
- check your child's vaccination records
- complete the consent form if you would like your child to be vaccinated and return the signed consent form to school

Parents can check your child's immunisations in their Blue Book or ask your GP. If parents are unsure or unable to find their child's records, it is safe for your child to receive another dose of MMR vaccine.

After vaccination, a Record of Vaccination will be given to children and parents should inform your GP that MMR vaccine has been given. If this is the child's first dose of MMR vaccine, you should contact the GP to arrange for your child to receive a second dose of free MMR vaccine in 4 weeks' time.

#### What is measles?

Measles is a very infectious virus that is spread by coughing and sneezing and causes fever, cough and a rash. Measles is often a severe disease that has complications such as middle ear infection, lung infection, and diarrhoea. Measles infection during pregnancy can cause in miscarriage and premature delivery. Brain inflammation can result in permanent brain damage.

#### What is mumps?

Mumps is an infectious disease causing swollen neck glands and fever. One in five male teenagers/ adults with mumps develops inflammation of the testes. In females, mumps infection in the first three months of pregnancy may cause miscarriage. Mumps can sometimes cause fertility problems, permanent deafness and brain inflammation.

#### What is rubella?

Rubella, also known as German Measles, is an infectious disease causing rash, fever and swollen glands. A number of patients develop bruising or bleeding and many develop brain inflammation. Infection in the first three months of pregnancy will result in nine out of 10 babies having a major congenital abnormality, such as deafness, blindness or heart defects.

#### Why is vaccination important?

MMR vaccine is safe and has been used for over twenty years. Any link between MMR vaccine and autism or other health conditions has been disproven by many studies and experts.

If your child is in Year 12 and you are concerned about the timing of the vaccination clinic and your child's performance in the HSC trials/exams, you can take your child to the GP to be vaccinated at a later date. It is important to ensure your child is fully vaccinated for MMR before he/she travels overseas and/or enrols in a higher education health course.

#### **HOME ECONOMICS NEWS**

#### Year 7 Technology Mandatory - GAT class - China: Past, Present and Future

It is very pleasing to see an enthusiastic bunch of Year 7 students working hard on perfecting the art of making dumplings. As they were rolling and kneading the dough for the wrappers from hand, till they were flat, round and thin, they learnt and appreciated the delicate nature of the process and an understanding of Chinese culture and traditions.

Dumpling, or "Boiled Dumpling", is a sort of traditional food in China. It originated in the Southern and Northern Period and has a history of over 400 years. Many customs regarding the eating of dumplings have been prevailing in China since ancient times, for example, eating dumplings at the New Year's Eve and on the midwinter day; eating dumplings is prevalent in many regions in North China during the festivals or on family-reunion occasions.

In connecting the past, present and future, the students are given the task of designing their own dumplings, from the ingredients to the packaging and branding. Their challenge is to design and modify their own range for contemporary Australian consumers and meet certain requirements for their packaging design. They will also be creating their own advertising campaign and marketing their product.

Here you can see some Year 7 students having a lot of fun making the deliciousdumplings and then cooking them in the traditional Bamboo steamers. The pictures don't show that they also ate them in a hurry.











FOOD TECHNOLOGY - ELECTIVE

The Year 10 Food Technology students studying the 200 hour course are now on their final unit of work entitled Food in Australia. This is an exciting unit where the main focus is learning about foods that are indigenous to Australia and a real appreciation of Aboriginal culture. We also study the changing nature of foods in the Australian society and the cultural influences which have been significant in the eating habits of Australians. In the practical component of the course, the students have begun making some foods with ingredients that are indigenous to this land;

- Kangaroo Stir Fry
- White Chocolate and Macadamia Nut Cookies
- Roasted Apple and Wattleseed Muffins

**Fun Fact:** The Macadamia nut is the only native Australian crop that has ever been developed and traded internationally as a commercial food product. The Australian macadamia industry is now worth more than \$200 million annually.

The Year 10 students are also going on an exciting excursion to the Botanical Gardens to supplement their learning on Bush Foods.

Another exciting excursion being planned for the end of the term for Food Technology is to Elizabeth Farm. Here the students will learn a lot about how the early settlers preserved, maintained and handled their food and our very interesting Australian colonial heritage.

Term 3 is certainly an exciting and vibrant time for Home Economics!


#### 2014 SRC BOOK FAIR AND CAFE



# SKIPPING SCHOOL FOR JUST ONE DAY AFFECTS NAPLAN RESULTS, STUDY FINDS

Missing just one day of school has negative consequences for a student's academic achievement, the first major study linking poor attendance to lower NAPLAN results has found.

And school attendance patterns established as early as year 1 can predict how often a student will show up to class right through high school, according to the research.

The average public school student in NSW misses almost three weeks of school each year. Australia is alarmingly slack when it comes to school attendance, with high school students skipping more days of school than almost any other developed country.

On Monday, the harmful effects of that absenteeism will be exposed by the results of a study to be presented at the Australian Council for Educational Research's annual conference.

An analysis of the attendance records and NAPLAN results of more than 400,000 students from Western Australia found any absence from school leads to a decline in academic performance.

The study dispels the belief there is a safe level of absence students can get away with before their grades will suffer.

"We were able to show that actually every day counts and days that you're missing in year 3 and year 5, we can detect that all the way through to year 9," the report's co-author, Stephen Zubrick, from the University of Western Australia, said.

"A 10-day period of unauthorised absence in a year is sufficient to drop a child about a band in the NAPLAN testing."

Year 3 numeracy achievement in 2012 declined by 1.6 NAPLAN points for every unauthorised day of absence in the first two terms of that year.

The most startling finding, Professor Zubrick said, was that students arrive in year 1 "with their school attendance careers already in their pockets".

"For most children, year 1 sets the pattern for what school attendance will look like in the future," Professor Zubrick said. "You're learning more than reading and writing. You're learning to show up."

Absence was found to have a greater impact on writing than it did on numeracy and reading.

While poor attendance is a problem across the socio-economic spectrum, families in affluent areas often interrupt schooling for overseas holidays.

Professor Zubrick insists his message is not about finger wagging or guilt trips, but says "we do need to recognise that when a child is standing on the Eiffel Tower, so to speak, they may be learning a lot about the world but they're not necessarily learning everything they'd be learning at school."

The average attendance rate for NSW public school students in 2013 was 92.6 per cent - about 14 days off per year - and has been relatively consistent over the past decade. Attendance is much poorer among high school students with the average student missing 20 days per year.

Julie Townsend, the headmistress of St Catherine's School in Waverley, said the girls' school had a "very strict" attendance policy and did not consider a family holiday to be an appropriate reason for missing school.

"We [tell parents] that we only teach for about 185 days a year and we expect that they take their holidays during the very generous holiday period," she said. "If the parents go - and that's just happened this week - we call them in and we talk about the breakdown of our relationship and that our values aren't aligned. We take a very hard line on it."

She said acceptable grounds for leave could include compassionate reasons, health complications or the commitments of elite athletes.

In a major international survey of 15 year olds, conducted by the OECD in 2012, almost onethird of Australian students said they had skipped at least one day of school in the previous two weeks.

That means Australian students skip school more frequently than any other developed country except Turkey and Italy. In high-performing countries such as Japan and Korea that figure was less than two per cent.

The NSW Education Department's school attendance policy states principals have the authority to grant students exemptions from school for up to 100 days per year. Reasons can include family holidays if they are "in the best educational interests of the child", employment in the entertainment industry or participation in elite sporting events.

Ross Tarlinton, the headmaster of St Joseph's College, said it was always his priority to maximise a student's attendance but he would make exceptions for ill-health, family or sporting commitments and occasionally travel.

"I had a boy who went with his father who was doing some pro bono medical work in a Third World country for a short period of time to have that experience and I let him go," he said. "That boy came back so rich for the experience."

The head of SCEGGS Darlinghurst, Jenny Allum, said understanding\_that you have to show up even when something else might be more desirable is an important life lesson.

"School isn't something you normally or mostly do. It's something you always do," she said.

"If you're making a commitment to something else over school, boy that better be important."

<u>Uni.</u> This has the following drop down menu options:

- · Open Days. A full listing for not only NSW and ACT but across Australia with links about going to them.
- · <u>Scholarships.</u> Each Uni has an explanation about their scholarships and how to apply for them. Many have the listing of their Undergraduate Scholarships they have on offer.
- Bonus Points. Many universities offer Bonus Points which can help you gain entry to your chosen degree at their Uni. This is often based on how well you have done in particular HSC subjects and/or on your location. Some Unis even have a handy Bonus Points calculator.
- · <u>Alternative Entry.</u> Unis have various ways to allow you to gain entry. Each Uni's options are found here.
- Educational Access Scheme. If you faced some type of hardship over your HSC years, then you may be considered for entry to your degree by completing an E.A.S. application. Speak to your Careers Advisor.
- · <u>Deferment.</u> Some people need to have a break before entering Uni for half a year or a full year. The table given here summarises what each Uni considers and what you may need to do. Deferment allows you to bank the degree for which you were accepted and to start it at the end of this break.
- Accommodation. Check each University to find the most suitable accommodation to fit your needs.
- · <u>Overseas Exchange.</u> Select a university of your choice and find out how you can study part of your chosen degree in one of your favourite countries.
- · <u>Interstate.</u> Each State in Australia has its own version of our NSW UAC (Universities Admission Centre). If you wish to consider studying in another State, click on the State which interests you and follow their instructions. Each State has their own course search area.

<u>Apprenticeships.</u> At the top you can find a simple to read explanation all about how Apprenticeships and Traineeships work. This is followed by an interesting short video about Apprenticeships and Traineeships. If you click on the bottom option you will see a listing of Apprenticeship and Traineeship career areas with easy to do quizzes to see if you are suited.

<u>Earnings.</u> There are 300 careers listed on the left hand side with their earnings in weekly and annual amounts. To select any career you must first read and consider the short advice in the bubbles and then click 'OK'.

<u>Jobs.</u> When you click on the drop down word <u>Jobs.</u> you will see a listing of all of the careers on the left hand side. 

Review by Saraf Hossain (Year 8, 2014)



# SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENT TAXFILE NUMBER PROGRAM – THE EASY WAY TO GET A TAX FILE NUMBER

#### **Parent Information Letter**

Dear Parent / Carer,

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO), with the cooperation of schools, offers students aged 13 years or over the opportunity to apply for a tax file number (TFN) through school. This is a voluntary program and makes it easier for students to obtain a TFN. Students need a TFN for employment, applying for Centrelink benefits, opening a bank account or deferring university fees.

Applying for a TFN through school is easier because students do not need to show identifying documentation to the ATO. The application form is available from the school and students can complete it at home. The form requires information such as the student's name, address and date of birth. Students also need to provide the following details:

students born in Australia will need to provide their

- -birth certificate number, state of issue and year of registration, or
- -Australian passport number and date of issue.

students born overseas will need to provide their

- -overseas passport number and country of issue, or
- -Australian citizenship certificate number and date of issue, or
- –Australian passport number and date of issue.

It is important that the application form is fully completed and **signed by the student.** All information provided on the form will remain confidential.

The school will certify the application form by cross-checking against the information held on their records. Students are not required to show identifying documentation to school or the ATO.

PLEASE NOTE: Quakers Hill High School will post completed applications to the ATO 2-3 times each term (approximately every 3 weeks). Students will receive their TFN via a notification letter sent to their postal address within 28 days of the application being received by the ATO.

## Enquiring on your child's behalf

Due to privacy provisions, parents of children aged 14 or older may enquire about their children's tax affairs only if they are registered as an authorised contact with the ATO. After your child has received their TFN they can authorise you by phoning the ATO on 13 28 61 between 8.00am and 6.00pm, Monday to Friday.
