DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

TRIAL NAPLAN EXAMINATIONS

Last week Years 7 and 9 completed Trial NAPLAN examinations. The purpose of this is to prepare students for the examination conditions that they will face in NAPLAN. In Primary School most students will complete the NAPLAN assessment in their classroom with their usual teacher. In High School most Year 9 students will complete the NAPLAN assessment in a large hall with up to 200 other students in the hall with them. Year 7 students will also complete the assessment in a larger setting with an unfamiliar staff member hence it is important to prepare the students for what this feels like. Overall, the students were outstanding with a very small percentage of Year 9 students choosing not to behave in accordance with the examination expectations.

This year's NAPLAN will be held between 13 -15th May. Letters will be sent home and more comprehensive information will be provided closer to this time. ASSESSMENT TASKS

Assessment Tasks are an essential part of school and education. Assessment tasks allow students to demonstrate their skills, understanding and knowledge. Assessment tasks enable teachers to determine student areas of strength and areas for further improvement. Assessments tasks allow teachers to grade students against the syllabus outcomes and to write comprehensive, specific and outcome based reports.

It is for all of the above reasons that parents and students need to familiarise themselves with the school assessment policy and to recognise that failing to complete assessment tasks can lead to students being forced to repeat year 10 or leaving the school system without a ROSA (Record of School Achievement).

In the past week all students have been emailed their relevant assessment booklet. The booklet contains essential information such as the Faculty, an approximate due date, the task number, how much the task is worth and the outcomes that are assessed by each task. Below is a sample of what the information looks like.

The booklet also contains the Assessment Policy in full, misadventure forms that need to be copied and filled in by students if absent or unable to complete a task. The booklet also contains a clear flowchart that outlines what actions are taken by the school at each step of the assessment process.

At Quakers Hill High School we take bullying very seriously and we are always looking for ways to strengthen our anti-bullying stance. We have an anti-bullying referral sheet that has been implemented to support victims of bullying and to help students who engage in bullying behaviours to change their behaviours. We also have a flowchart that systematically outlines how to handle bullying. Both of these documents have been reproduced in the student diaries.

Please remember that parents play an enormous role in combating bullying. If you discover that your child is being bullied please contact the school immediately and you will be connected with their Year Adviser or the appropriate Deputy Principal who will deal with the situation.

If you discover that your child has bullied others, then we would encourage you to talk to your child about respect and responsibility. Encourage your child to treat others respectfully at all times. Consider your own actions and always strive to approach conflict in a positive way – remember you are your child's best and most influential role model.

Finally, if your child is aware that one of their friends or classmates is being bullied, encourage them to speak up, to support their friend by going with them to report the bullying to a staff member. Please never use language such as 'dobbing' or 'snitching' at home as this helps to build a culture of silence which allows bullying and harassment to continue and creates a society where people choose to look the other way.

Remember, we can only take action if we

know that the bullying is happening.

STUDENT REVIEWS

Over the last week Mrs Maricic and I have been collecting information from classroom teachers of Years 7-10 about how students have transitioned into those years. Teachers are asked to provide feedback on students who are causing concern in areas such as attendance, incomplete work, experiencing difficulty with the work and exhibiting inappropriate behaviours. Students who have been referred by more than one staff member will be formally interviewed by the Deputy Principal and their Year Advisers. Parents will also be contacted and may be requested to attend interviews with their child.

Teachers have also been asked to refer students who have demonstrated positive behaviours in areas such as motivation and consistently striving to improve as well as students who are working hard and demonstrating the SMART code of conduct. Once again the numbers of positive referrals significantly outweighed the negative referrals and this is indicative of the SMART attitude to school that is demonstrated by the vast majority of our students.

CONGRATULATIONS ON IMPROVED PUNCTUALITY!

Our strong focus on the importance of punctuality as a life skill and a student responsibility is paying off with increasing numbers of students arriving to school and roll call on time. Please remember to write your child a note if they are late with your knowledge. Please join with us in encouraging your child to always be on time.

ROAD SAFETY

Road safety is always of paramount importance to us and it is therefore very disappointing to see students impacting on their own safety and that of others whilst in transit

to school. Specific concerns include crossing against red lights, running out into traffic, walking across the 7-11 driveway without looking and not using the pedestrian crossing. Please join with us in encouraging your child to always behave safely and responsibly on and around the roads.

PBL - REASONABLE REQUESTS

This week's focus lesson for PBL (Positive Behaviour for Learning) was on following reasonable requests. A reasonable request is defined as a direction that is in line with the school expectations of Safe, Motivated, Academic, Respectful and Tolerant. So an example of a reasonable request would be to take off your hat in the classroom, to face the front and listen to the teacher, to hand over your phone if you were using it in class and so on. Sometimes students, and even some parents, can disagree about what constitutes a reasonable request. An example of this might be a student being asked to pick up a paper that is not theirs. Most QHHS students recognise that as members of a community sometimes we do need to pitch in and help to clean up a mess that was not of our own making, that sometimes we do need to wash a dish that we did not use and so on. At QHHS we strive to promote the ideal of community - that we are all responsible for, and to, each other. Please join with us in encouraging your child to be focussed rather than community selffocussed.

<u>Music</u>

The Music department is also continuing its busy start to the term, with both the junior and senior students engaging in various topics across the Music program. Our Year 7 students are currently studying the Instruments of the Orchestra and participating in hands-on demonstrations on the violin and flute. These interactive lessons are proving very popular with the students as they can see, feel and play the instruments and experiment with the different playing sounds. They are also building up their performance repertoire on the acoustic guitar, with the majority of students being able to play at least six or seven songs already in such a short time.

The Year 8 class is studying elements of Rock Music, with students currently working on a composition in pairs using various guitar chords.

Our two senior elective classes have also been hard at work, with the mandatory class studying Popular Music, starting with the history of rock 'n' roll and the extension class has been analysing music of the Baroque Period.

Mr. L. Cole is currently training student leaders for the extra-curricular guitar group which will commence at the beginning of Term 2. The choir will also be commencing in Term 2 and Mrs. A. 2014 ASSESSMENT BOOKLETS AND SPREADSHEETS

I am pleased to advise you of some very important information that you should find very useful in helping your child complete their Assessment Tasks in 2014. On the school's website under Assessments and Reporting there is a booklet relating to Assessments as well as a spreadsheet. The Booklet has an enormous amount of relevant information which will assist your child in their learning this year. It has a message from Mrs Claus, it explains what happens when you are sick and they need to complete a Misadventure Form or lodge an appeal; it has the QHHS Assessment Policy, examples of how to do an assessment task, a flow chart explaining "N" awards, an example of the Nirimba Collegiate Certificate for Stage 5 and a sample of Stage 5 assessment tasks. More importantly, it also has a detailed assessment schedule for all subjects outlining what types of assessments your child will need to complete and when they are due in 2014. There is also an Excel spreadsheet that allows you to filter information about due dates, subjects, types of tasks etc.

π DAY

On Friday 14 March Quakers Hill High School celebrated this momentous Mathematical day with of course the selling of Apple pie with ice cream. It was great to see students see the funny, yet tasty side of Mathematics. Also some teachers really had some great fashion sense in the T shirts they came up with. Some interesting facts about π :

"Pi Day" is celebrated on March 14 (which was chosen because it resembles 3.14). The official celebration begins at 1:59 p.m., to make an appropriate 3.14159 when combined with the date. Albert Einstein was born on Pi Day (3/14/1879) in Ulm Wurttemberg, Germany.

Pi is the most recognized mathematical constant in the world. Scholars often consider Pi the most important and intriguing number in all of mathematics. In the Greek alphabet, π (piwas) is the sixteenth letter. In the English alphabet, p is also the sixteenth letter.

Pi is an irrational number, meaning its digits go on forever in a seemingly random sequence.

Pi was first rigorously calculated by one of the greatest mathematicians of the ancient world, Archimedes of Syracuse (287-212 B.C Ancient mathematicians tried to compute pi by inscribing polygons with more and more sides that would more closely approach the area of a circle. Archimedes used a 96-sided polygon. Chinese mathematicians Liu Hui inscribed a 192-sided polygon and then a 3,072-sided polygon to calculate pi to 3.14159. Tsu Ch'ung and his son inscribed polygons with as many as 24,576 sides to calculate pi (the result had only an 8-millionth of 1% difference from the now accepted value of pi).fBefore the π symbol was used, mathematicians would describe pi in round-about ways such as "quantitas, in quam cum multipliectur diameter, proveniet circumferential," which means "the quantity which, when the diameter is multiplied by it, yields the circumference.

In 1995, Hiroyoki Gotu memorized 42,195 places of pi and is considered the current pi champion. Some scholars speculate that Japanese is better suited than other languages for memorising sequences of numbers.

Much thanks go to the SRC and members of the Mathematics staff for their assistance on the day. Also thanks to those students who got behind the event.

We also raised \$100 which will go to Stewart House!

TAS FACULTY NEWS

Quakers Hill High School has been experiencing some technological developments in the TAS faculty of late, with the introduction of 3D printing into the teaching programs. Mr Adam Watson has been working towards 3D printing being implemented across most TAS subjects and the faculty has so far seen the technology used for prototyping in Design & Technology, Engineering and Timber.

So far we have sourced and set up one machine for the faculty, and have just put in an order for another more advanced model. 3D printing and CAD modelling is very relevant for TAS students because the application of this technology will be seen across many aspects of design and problem solving in society very soon. It is a big hit with our students because they love the idea that virtually any shape they can think up can be created in durable plastic.

One example of this is the students in Year 8 Technology, who are currently designing and printing their own balloon powered racing cars.

ENGLISH FACULTY NEWS

The English Faculty has had a very busy and productive fortnight, preparing for and completing assessment tasks across all year groups.

Year 7 has been working on their reading journals as part of their class novel study and autobiography unit.

Year 8 has just completed their Bloom's Taxonomy matrix assessment task. This involved students choosing a variety of tasks using a combination of linguistic, visual/spatial and kinaesthetic skills. All tasks were in some way a representation or analysis of themes within their class novel. Some of the assignments that have come in are extremely impressive, with students showing huge amounts of creativity, particularly in the model-making task. The staffroom is currently full of these exciting and colourful models!

Year 9 has just completed their Trial NAPLAN examinations in Reading, Writing and Language Conventions. All students put a commendable effort into completing these examinations to the best of their ability and staff were very impressed with how students conducted themselves during the examinations. Well done, Year 9.

Year 10 is currently working hard on their class novel study in preparation for their Essay Assessment Task in Week 10. Students have received their essay task notifications in which they are required to prepare an essay on one of the two set questions. Students will have some time in class to prepare their essays and to receive teacher support and assistance in doing so, however, they will also need to do some significant preparation for this task at home. For this particular task, as a training tool, students have been provided with a 'quotes sheet' on which they can write up to 10 quotes to take into the examination room with them, rather than relying purely on their memory for this. Students are encouraged to seek teacher assistance for any support or help they may need in the process of preparing for this important assessment. Good luck in your preparation, Year 10.

INDEPENDENT WRITER - HISTORY ELECTIVE

This year a new elective course in History has been established for students who are interested in extending their writing skills in a variety of genres and text types. The course focuses on themes and issues within society from both past and current perspectives, using a variety of source and text types to analyse these societal issues and events. This term, students are looking at issues associated with the theme of 'protest' and have studied and written a variety of texts so far, from memoirs, posters, poems, blogs, short stories, and historical protest songs. It is exciting to see the standard of work coming from this class along with the energy and enthusiasm shown by students as they explore topics that are currently relevant to them in society. Below is a blog entry written by Nathalie Despois of Year 9 on the topic of education and equality. Students had to choose an issue within society and analyse it in terms of the concept of 'equality', providing evidence and reasons for their arguments as well as possible solutions to any problems associated with their chosen issue.

Nathalie's response was very inspiring:

Nathalie's Blog: Education

The year is 2014 and the world isn't equal.

We all have dreams of what we will be when we grow up and these dream then become a reality because of the education we receive. However have you realised that there are thousands even

millions in this world today that are denied the rights to an education? Of course in first world countries such as Australia, America & the UK, we are given an opportunity to gain an education. Everyone in these countries has access to education whether you're from an upper class family or not. Nevertheless in a majority of third world (developing) countries & continents such as Africa or Asia some of the children cannot receive an education while others have very little schooling due to a lack of funds and resources and because of traditional customs etc. So it the world equal in education? No!

Many girls who live in these countries cannot attend school because of the tradition they have been brought up in. Their parents do not agree with the fact that women should be educated but instead think that the role of a woman is to stay at home and learn to do the cooking, washing etc. Many of these young ladies desire to obtain an education and be equal in their opportunities but they are not permitted. That is why we have people like Malala Yousafzai fighting for the rights to an education not only for her but for all women. Fighting to be equal with the rest of the world and continuing to try even after being shot in the head by the Taliban. She realises the importance of gaining an education and she wants everyone to have an equal opportunity and access to education.

In most developing countries, the budget that they have to start schools and buy resources are very low and they are not efficient in providing for the needs of the children. Reasons for this are bad governance, inefficient use of funding, lack of management and organisational skills are other obstacles in the way of providing children with an education. In some third world countries there are not enough schools and therefore it is sometimes too far away for the children to attend. And unlike other countries where there are nice paved roads and cars, in many of these countries the only way to attend school is by foot and it can be a long way to walk. Many schools are poorly equipped. They do not have sufficient text books and materials and even if they do receive them they are often out of date. Many of the schools also don't have access to water or electricity making it difficult to learn. The world is not equal in education because while in some countries there are well experienced and properly trained teachers, in other parts of the world the teachers are unprepared and poorly trained.

Equality in education is important because you cannot be what you want to without it. It is not fair that children in developing countries want an education but can't get it because of the little resources that the schools have. In the future if we are not equal in education it can create problems because some people won't be able to read and some can. Those in the developing countries without an education cannot move forward in life and access better jobs because education turns hopes & dreams into reality.

If those who already have access to adequate education see the need for education and schools in other countries, people could volunteer and go and help out in the countries and provide resources for them. Or they could provide gender equality and that could raise awareness on equality of girls gaining an education. I feel so strongly for equality in education because the entire future depends on the education you've received.

!!BIG SCIENCE COMPETITION!!

In 2014, the Science Department will provide an opportunity for Science students to challenge themselves in the Big Science Competition. This one-hour international competition is open to students of all abilities at three different levels: Junior (Years 7 and 8), Intermediate (Years 9 and 10) and Senior (Years 11 and 12). Questions test students' critical thinking and problem-solving skills as well as their Science knowledge. Each student who takes part will receive a certificate as well as detailed feedback on their performance in the competition. They also go into a draw to win hundreds of iTune and movie vouchers. Our school will receive a comprehensive report for each paper level showing how each student performed on each question, the percentage of students in the cohort who answered correctly, and a comparison with the national results. The Big Science Competition will be held in school on the 28 May 2014. Students who are interested in taking part must collect a permission note from their Science teachers. The cut-off date for the payment of \$8.00 is on the 11th of April. The Big Science Competition is organised by Australian Science Innovations, a non-profit organisation committed to providing high quality science extension programs that inspire, challenge and raise the aspirations of students in Science. 



SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENT TAXFILE NUMBER PROGRAM – THE EASY WAY TO GET A TAX FILE NUMBER

Parent Information Letter

Dear Parent / Carer,

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO), with the cooperation of schools, offers students aged 13 years or over the opportunity to apply for a tax file number (TFN) through school. This is a voluntary program and makes it easier for students to obtain a TFN. Students need a TFN for employment, applying for Centrelink benefits, opening a bank account or deferring university fees.

Applying for a TFN through school is easier because students do not need to show identifying documentation to the ATO. The application form is available from the school and students can complete it at home. The form requires information such as the student's name, address and date of birth. Students also need to provide the following details:

students born in Australia will need to provide their

- -birth certificate number, state of issue and year of registration, or
- -Australian passport number and date of issue.

students born overseas will need to provide their

- -overseas passport number and country of issue, or
- -Australian citizenship certificate number and date of issue, or
- -Australian passport number and date of issue.

It is important that the application form is fully completed and **signed by the student.** All information provided on the form will remain confidential.

The school will certify the application form by cross-checking against the information held on their records. Students are not required to show identifying documentation to school or the ATO.

PLEASE NOTE: Quakers Hill High School will post completed applications to the ATO 2-3 times each term (approximately every 3 weeks). Students will receive their TFN via a notification letter sent to their postal address within 28 days of the application being received by the ATO.

Enquiring on your child's behalf

Due to privacy provisions, parents of children aged 14 or older may enquire about their children's tax affairs only if they are registered as an authorised contact with the ATO. After your child has received their TFN they can authorise you by phoning the ATO on 13 28 61 between 8.00am and 6.00pm, Monday to Friday.
