At many QHHS executive meetings, Mrs White has been the voice pleading for understanding of the students who struggle in the conventional classroom and during her time as Head Teacher Welfare, Mrs White has initiated many programs that have been focussed on supporting all students. She has been responsible for the organisation of the Year 7 & 9 Camps, ATSI PLPs, Integration interviews, welfare conferences, the development of the school's house system, Year 5/6 Information Evenings and important student based activities such as student vaccinations.

We wish Mrs White all the very best and will definitely miss the clickety click of her stilettos as she walks the hallways of our school. Good luck and thank you.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT UNIFORM

Unfortunately, some students are not adhering to the school uniform policy wearing unacceptable variations in order to 'keep warm'. It is at this point each year that it is necessary to point out that QHHS does have uniform provision for cold weather. Students have the option in choosing to wear the navy blue woollen jumper, the teal sloppy joe or the QHHS sports jacket. Students are not to wear a long sleeve, coloured top underneath their school shirt. Long pants are available and QHHS track pants are available for sport.

It is imperative that all students wear black **leather** upper school shoes that cover the whole foot in order to comply with WH&S regulations particularly in the Science and TAS labs. Canvas or fabric shoes do not comply with these regulations and therefore are not acceptable footwear for high school.

Also, students in Year 8-10 are permitted to wear **the full QHHS sports uniform** on the one day they have timetabled sport only. This will only be scheduled on either a Monday or a Tuesday. Students are not to wear their school trousers as track pants and vice versa.

The school uniform shop is open on Monday mornings 8:10am – 9:30am. If you are experiencing financial difficulty and you are unable to purchase uniform needs, please contact me so that we can discuss assistance.




THE TIGER'S CURSE - BY COLLEEN HOUCK

TASTER DAY #2 – A Reflection by Jourdan Heintz (Year 10)

On the 19th of May, Quakers Hill High School held its second Year 6 Taster Day for 2014. A multitude of children came to our school to try the variety of interesting subjects the school has to offer, including Maths, English and History, as well as Art, Music, Metal Work, Drama and Dance. Students were brought together in smaller groups with the intention that they would meet new and long lasting friends and would get to know the many faces that they would be seeing next year as they ventured into high school.

It was amazing to see the number of students that turned up, each with a smile spread wide across their faces. As they sat in the hall waiting for everyone to arrive, you could hear them chatting about the activities they were going to do that day, their voices filled with excitement. Many of the students there rushed over to the front table to collect a form for the 'Morning Trivia', in order to try and win a prize. When it was time for the day to officially begin, everyone quickly found their groups and headed off with their leaders. They moved around the school during the day, trying a range of different classes and meeting a few of the teachers they will have over the next four years.

In Science the students got to do small experiments based on chemical reactions and then witnessed the hair of their peers stand on end as they discovered the Science faculty's static electricity ball. In Maths we saw every student immerse themselves in Algebra Bingo, and undertake probability with a pair of die. In History students embraced a trivia challenge exploring the past and Ms Critchley astounded and enthralled students with tales of how brains were removed. In Miss Valatiadis' Art class student did abstract linear designs using geometric or organic shapes and paint. Then students got to learn all about different styles of music and a few small songs through a 5 minute guitar crash course with Ms Tong. In TAS Mr Van Boom helped the students create novelty spinners in the Metalwork classrooms. In the Performance Space the students got to play a variety of Theatre Games and show off their exquisite acting skills through improvisational skits and play building. 




7/8M EXCURSION

A MESSAGE FROM MRS PIRET WHITE

As I am leaving Quakers Hill High School, the Principal has asked me to write about the changes that I have witnessed over my 14 years here and to recall some of my memories of the school.

I started at QHHS when it was still surrounded by market gardens, the Parkway was a traffic nightmare, there was a deer farm at the end of Pye Road and Quakers Hill East Primary School was across the road. The market gardens and farms have given way to housing developments and suburbia but the school, with its vast green acreage still retains a rural feel. The school environment has been made even more attractive and inviting with the addition of outdoor furniture and covered areas for students.

The most amazing change that I have seen not only at QHHS but in my teaching career has been the massive development in technology for students and teachers to access so much information and knowledge. I remember as a student in Year 12 listening to one of my teachers telling us that one day we would take movies home to watch and carry phones in our hands. We almost laughed at him and could not imagine the things he was describing. Now 42 years later I am constantly saying "put that device away" and schools have developed mobile phone policies. Who would have thought? I am constantly asking the younger generation to help me navigate my way through a minefield of new technologies.

The school motto is Quakers Hill High School is a caring educational community shaping a positive future. Through all my time here the staff have worked hard to fulfil this motto. The dedication of staff to meet the needs of students has never wavered. Changes like the introduction of a Support Unit and the establishment of a Learning Centre reflect the commitment of the school to shaping positive futures. I was privileged to start the Support Unit with the now Head Teacher Jennifer Payne and the most endearing group of young people—the now 10W. The Support Unit started in B2 as the demountable was five months late in arriving. Today four demountables later, the teachers and teachers' aides have made this area a welcoming place where students interact and are part of the whole school community.

We now have a learning centre where teachers and teachers' aides help and support our students, who have learning issues, access the curriculum and meet course requirements.

Memorable events have been the school's visit to the Special Olympics in 2000, the school athletics carnivals relocating to Blacktown International Sports Park. A dripping tap, a plug in the sink and two weeks holiday—the result one afloat welfare staffroom and my staff relocating to a storeroom for quite a few weeks. I will be sad to retire. I have had a wonderful and fulfilling life as a teacher. I have had the privilege of meeting and working with amazing, dedicated and hardworking teachers and others who have always worked to make a difference in children's lives. Thank you to Lauretta Claus, Ian Hudson, the executive past and present, my teaching colleagues and the SASS staff, who have supported and guided me over my time here.





ENGLISH FACULTY NEWS

Year 7 is currently studying a poetry unit, looking at a variety of poetic techniques. They are currently working on a visual representation task, creating posters demonstrating their understanding of a poem of their own choice, along with a written analysis of their posters. These assignments are due next week, so Year 7 should be busily working on these at home.

Year 8 is finishing off their unit on Debating and starting a unit on film. There have been some very interesting and entertaining debates over the last week, with students very enthusiastically learning and practising the art of rebuttal. We certainly have some quick thinkers and sharp minds in our Year 8 cohort!

Year 9 is in the final week of their poetry unit, studying poems around the theme of Aboriginal culture and perspectives on land. Students have studied a variety of poetic forms and techniques, focusing on the effects achieved by the different techniques used in poems and critically analysing the effectiveness of these techniques in delivering messages and expressing ideas.

Year 10 is well underway with their Macbeth unit, studying the themes and characters and how they are developed throughout the play. Students are studying visual literacy strategies in preparation for their visual representation assignment due at the end of Week 7.



SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENT TAXFILE NUMBER PROGRAM – THE EASY WAY TO GET A TAX FILE NUMBER

Parent Information Letter

Dear Parent / Carer,

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO), with the cooperation of schools, offers students aged 13 years or over the opportunity to apply for a tax file number (TFN) through school. This is a voluntary program and makes it easier for students to obtain a TFN. Students need a TFN for employment, applying for Centrelink benefits, opening a bank account or deferring university fees.

Applying for a TFN through school is easier because students do not need to show identifying documentation to the ATO. The application form is available from the school and students can complete it at home. The form requires information such as the student's name, address and date of birth. Students also need to provide the following details:

students born in Australia will need to provide their

- -birth certificate number, state of issue and year of registration, or
- –Australian passport number and date of issue.

students born overseas will need to provide their

- -overseas passport number and country of issue, or
- -Australian citizenship certificate number and date of issue, or
- -Australian passport number and date of issue.

It is important that the application form is fully completed and **signed by the student.** All information provided on the form will remain confidential.

The school will certify the application form by cross-checking against the information held on their records. Students are not required to show identifying documentation to school or the ATO.

PLEASE NOTE: Quakers Hill High School will post completed applications to the ATO 2-3 times each term (approximately every 3 weeks). Students will receive their TFN via a notification letter sent to their postal address within 28 days of the application being received by the ATO.

Enquiring on your child's behalf

Due to privacy provisions, parents of children aged 14 or older may enquire about their children's tax affairs only if they are registered as an authorised contact with the ATO. After your child has received their TFN they can authorise you by phoning the ATO on 13 28 61 between 8.00am and 6.00pm, Monday to Friday.
