SCHOOL PRIORITIES 2015

One of the school priorities for 2015 is the improvement in our students' writing skills using the ALARM scaffold. ALARM stands for **A Learning and Responding Matrix** developed by a teacher Max Woods from Freshwater High School. This learning scaffold empowers students giving them the tools they need to approach writing and problem solving within an explicit framework. It empowers teachers via strengthening the intellectual quality of their instruction, raises expectations and enables more specific feedback.

The scaffold focuses on a series of verbs that the students use to develop a comprehensive written response to a question:

- Name/Define: Identify the components of this topic.
- Describe: Describe key features of

- each component.
- Explain: Explain the purpose of each component.
- Analyse: Outline how each component operates to achieve its purpose.
- Critically Analyse: Identify positive and negative features of each component.
- Evaluate: Make a judgement about the extent to which this component achieved its purpose.
- Critically Evaluate: Provide an overarching judgement about all the components.
- Appreciate: Why is the subject matter worth learning/relevance to life/importance


It has been amazing to see how many students have been able to write significantly more in their extended responses by using this scaffold. The ALARM scaffold is being used by all teachers in all KLA areas as obviously the ability to compose a detailed, well organised written response is a fundamental skill required by all subject areas and very important for all students entering Stage 5 & 6.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

SPREADING RUMOURS

One of the biggest issues that we have been dealing with towards the end of Term 1 and the beginning of this term is with threats and rumours about fighting. Although these rumours spread throughout the school, the main epicentre of rumours and threats has been Year 7. Although the majority of Year 7 have transitioned very successfully, there is a small core group of students who have been looking to cause trouble via spreading rumours, saying unkind things to each other and making threats. This can be worrying for some students and difficult then for parents who can see and hear that their child is concerned about what is happening. In such circumstances it can be tempting for the parent to approach another student or parent about the problem but this rarely solves the problem and most often leads to further issues and can, in extreme cases, lead to the police getting involved.

At Quakers Hill High School we take bullying very seriously and we are always looking for ways to strengthen our anti-bullying stance. We have an anti-bullying referral sheet that has been implemented to support victims of bullying and to help students who engage in bullying behaviours to change their behaviours. We also have a flowchart that systematically outlines how to handle bullying. Both of these documents have been reproduced in the student diaries.

Please remember that parents play an enormous role in combating bullying. If you discover that your child is being bullied, please contact the school immediately and you will be connected with their Year Adviser or the appropriate Deputy Principal who will deal with the situation.

If you discover that your child has bullied others, then we would encourage you to

talk to your child about respect and responsibility. Encourage your child to treat others respectfully at all times. Consider your own actions and always strive to approach conflict in a positive way – remember you are your child's best and most influential role model.

Finally, if your child is aware that one of their friends or classmates is being bullied, encourage them to speak up, to support their friend by going with them to report the bullying to a staff member. Please never use language such as 'dobbing' or 'snitching' at home as this helps to build a culture of silence which allows bullying and harassment to continue and creates a society where people choose to look the other way

Remember, we can only take action if we know that the bullying is happening.

STUDENT REVIEWS

Mrs Maricic, myself and all of the Year Advisers have been working hard on the Term 1 student reviews. The student reviews are an opportunity for teachers to provide feedback on students who are causing concern in areas such as attendance, incomplete work, experiencing difficulty with the work and exhibiting inappropriate behaviours. Students who have been referred by more than two faculties will be formally interviewed by the Deputy Principal and their Year Advisers. Parents will also be contacted and may be requested to attend interviews with their child.

Teachers were also asked to refer students who have demonstrated positive behaviours in areas such as motivation and consistently striving to improve as well as students who are working hard and demonstrating the SMART code of conduct. Once again the numbers of positive referrals significantly outweighed the negative referrals and this is indicative of the SMART attitude to school that is demonstrated by the vast majority of our students. Students who have been referred by one subject will re-

ceive a Merit Award, three or more will receive a Bronze Award and a Letter of Commendation and those with more than 4 positive referrals will also be invited to a Morning Tea later in the term.

Although not yet finalised, there are currently 47 Year 7 students who have been commended in three or more subjects; 62 Year 9 students have been commended in three or more subjects with a further 63 being commended in 2 or more subjects. This is an outstanding achievement for many of our students.

NAPLAN AND QHHS EXAMINATIONS

QHHS examination timetables have been published and all students have received a copy and been encouraged to stick it into their diaries for future reference. Students who have misplaced their timetable can get a new one from the front office. The examination period will begin in Week 3.

SOME IMPORTANT REMIND-ERS FOR YEAR 10

The Wyndham Subject Selection Evening will be held on Wednesday 6 May. This is a valuable opportunity to pick up subject selection materials, hear from some of the school executive and begin considering the subjects that you will choose.

Year 10 students are invited to Wyndham College on Monday 11 and Tuesday 12 May 2015 to participate in a series of 'Taster' lessons across all subject areas. Students will be able to obtain specific course information, ask any questions they

may have about the demands of courses, and meet the teachers at Wyndham College.

Students are to arrange their own transport and arrive at Wyndham College by 8am and proceed to the Hall. Both days will conclude at 2.45pm. There will be **no** classes for Year 10 at Quakers Hill High School on these days as attendance at Wyndham College is compulsory.

ASSESSMENT TASKS

Towards the end of Term 1 we had to send out a significant number of N Award Warnings. Many parents and students were understandably concerned about this and requested extensions. Obviously unexpected issues crop up and students are encouraged to submit a Misadventure Form in these circumstances but it is important to note that we all need to prioritise. Some students can work or train 3 nights a week and still maintain their school commitments but most cannot. If students are struggling to complete their tasks due to out of school commitments, then it is time to reassess and set priorities. Most young people lack the level of maturity needed to make these sorts of critically informed decisions and it is up to parents and caregivers to lead these discussions. Parents, as well as students, need to familiarise themselves with the school assessment policy and to recognise that failing to complete assessment tasks can lead to students being forced to repeat Year 10 or leaving the school system without a ROSA (Record of School Achievement).

SPECIAL RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (SRE)

This term Scripture will continue to be provided once a week to Year 7 and 8 students. Scripture will continue to be delivered to Years 9 and 10 students in a conference format once a term. Parents/caregivers must notify the school in writing if they wish to withdraw their child from SRE. Students who are withdrawn from SRE will receive no academic instruction or formal school activities during the time set

aside for SRE. They will be supervised in an alternative classroom and expected to complete quiet independent activities.

Students who have not been formally withdrawn from SRE via a written communication from a parent will be expected to attend SRE and to behave in accordance with our SMART expectations.

TEACHERS LOVE LEARNING TOO

On the first day back this term, the staff of Quakers Hill High School joined with the staff from the eight other schools that comprise the Nirimba Collegiate to focus on Key Learning Area specific sessions. These combined staff development days are a valuable opportunity for staff to engage in professional development that is focussed on specific KLA needs. Sessions were highly rated and external professionals who were engaged for the day offered expertise in a range of areas.

BIG DAY OUT

Our Big Day Out to Jamberoo has been booked for early December and we will once again be hoping for a fine day of water slides, beautiful sunshine and vast quantities of ice cream. This year we have booked for 200 students as we have decided to allow for a Year Adviser's Choice Selection. YA's choice students may not have received the requisite number of merits but they will be students who have demonstrated significant improvement over the year. The majority of students chosen will be those who have received approximately 35 merits or more. In 2014 there were well over 200 students in this category so it is important to be SMART, collect your merits and submit them for the higher awards. Start collecting NOW!

NAPLAN

What you need for NAPLAN 2015?

Only Year 7 and 9 do NAPLAN.

Each student is given a pencil but it is suggested they bring their own eraser and sharpener rather than have to wait for a teacher to bring one to their desk. Now is a good time to check your calculator is working.

The examinations are held in the Hall.



NAPLAN is only one part of our assessment. It is used in class placement and identifies areas of strength in student learning and areas to focus on. This is particularly useful for Year 9 as they move into their last years of High School.

For students the examination should not be treated as comparing one student to another. Students should be focused on trying to beat their personal best.

NAPLAN is held in Week 4 (13 May-16 May).

Tuesday is Writing and Language Conventions, Wednesday is Reading and Thursday is Calculator/Non Calculator - don't forget to bring a working calculator. They can be brought form the school before the examination - not on the day of the examination.

If a student misses any exam, they can sit it on any Wednesday or Thursday and Friday is catch up day. The examinations are then mailed to be marked.


HISTORY NEWS



As you are aware, any Year 10 student who completes the Nirimba Collegiate of Schools Stage 5 Certificate this year at one of the Nirimba Collegiate Group of Schools, has a right of entry into Wyndham College in 2016 assuming of course, that they qualify for their end-of-Year 10 Record of School Achievement/Collegiate Certificate.

An important information evening has been organised at Wyndham College for Wednesday, 6th May, which we encourage all parents and students to attend. Wednesday 6 May 2015 at the Wyndham College Hall 6.30pm – 9.00pm Please arrive at 6pm to register and collect the Subject Selection booklet.



Restoring Harmony – By Joelle Anthony

Restoring Harmony is a post-apocalyptic novel written by Joelle Anthony. Set in 2041, it shows a world that has almost run out of oil, where society has all but totally collapsed and where crime, poverty and food shortages dominate the world. Amidst all of this, a brave sixteen year old named Molly must undertake an impossible rescue mission and come back home in one piece before the crucial deadline. With only her musical talents, farming skills and bravery to aid her, she must learn who to trust and when to sacrifice, so that she can get back home. Tension escalates after Molly comes under the radar of a



crime organization, but luckily there's a handsome stranger willing to help. It's not your typical post-apocalyptic tale, because though the landscape is dark and perilous and there are destructive and violent elements at play, the author ensures the story is action focused, with a romantic through-line and that there are twists and turns at every corner to keep you guessing. Halo: Fall of Reach - Bootcamp - By Brian Reed

When John is taken away from his family at the age of 6, he is placed into a program that aims to help the world for generations to come. In the new facility, he is ordered to undergo demanding simulations and tough situations that will ultimately affect his life forever. Alongside John, are 74 other 'special' children, handpicked and unique in their own way. Even in his new life surrounded by exceptional peers, John quickly proves himself to



be one of the program's top candidates during his training and was awarded the rank of Squad Leader at age 6. At age 12, John underwent Spartan Augmentation, a trial that was executed on the original 75 to see whether they were eligible or not for genetic modification. John passes, and is then put on his first 'official official' mission, the assault on Eridanus Secundus. Halo Bootcamp is an astonishing graphic novel and the first story arc of Halo: Fall of Reach, created by the dynamic duo of Brian Reed and Felix Ruiz. It compellingly explores the struggles that John faces, struggles that test his perseverance, his notion of self and pit him against fate and destiny. This book has a rich main plot, and features flashbacks as a narrative device that helps us understand more about John, his history and key moments in his life. The book truly explores John's transformation into an epic soldier. The writing and artistic value of the graphic novel were truly astounding and this book proves to be a visual feat. It is emotionally powerful in both text and visual form.




Middle School: The Worst Years of My Life Vol. 1 – by James Patterson

MATHEMATICS FACULTY NEWS

All students should be preparing for their Half Yearly examinations. These will be held in Week 3 - Thursday for Year 9 and Monday for Year 10. The Year 9 and 10 classes will be sitting their examination in the school hall. The Year 7 and 8 classes will sit their examination in Week 4 and should check with their class teacher for the exact day of the examination. All students must remember to bring a scientific calculator for the calculator section of the examination. The Year 7 Mathematics examination will be on the topic of Fractions and the Year 8 examination will be on the topics of Pythagoras' Theorem, collecting, representing and interpreting data and analysing single sets of data using measures of location and range. The Year 9 and 10 students need to check with their class teacher regarding the topics for their examination.

Some tips in taking a Test

- First look over the entire test. You'll get a sense of its length. Try to identify those problems you definitely know how to do right away, and those you expect to have to think about.
- Do the problems in the order that suits **you!** Start with the problems that you know for sure you can do. This builds confidence and means you don't miss any sure points just because you run out of time. Then try the problems you think you can figure out; then finally try the ones you are least sure about.
- Time is of the essence work as quickly and continuously as you can while still writing legibly and showing all your work. If you get stuck on a problem, move on to another one you can come back later.
- Work by the clock. On a 50 minute, 100 point test, you have about 5 minutes for a 10 point question. Starting with the easy questions will probably put you ahead of the clock. When you work on a harder problem, spend the allotted time (e.g. 5 minutes) on that question, and if you have not almost finished it, go on to another problem. Do not spend 20 minutes on a problem which will yield few or no points when there are other problems still to try.
- **Show all your work**: make it as easy as possible for the Instructor to see how much you do know. Try to write a well-reasoned solution. If your answer is incorrect, the Instructor will assign partial credit based on the work you show.
- Never waste time erasing! Just draw a line through the work you want ignored and move
 on. Not only does erasing waste precious time, but you may discover later that you
 erased something useful (and/or maybe worth partial credit if you cannot complete the
 problem). You are (usually) not required to fit your answer in the space provided you
 can put your answer on another sheet to avoid needing to erase.
- In a multiple-step problem **outline** the steps before actually working the problem.
- **Don't** give up on a several-part problem just because you can't do the first part. Attempt the other part(s) if the actual solution depends on the first part, at least explain how you **would** do it.
- Make sure you read the questions carefully, and do all parts of each problem.
- Verify your answers does each answer make sense given the context of the problem?

If you finish early, **check** every problem (that means **rework** everything from scratch).
