

On Tuesday the 8th of December 2015, Quakers Hill High School was host to the Game Training Al Master Class (an extension course of the Roadshow held earlier in the year). The aim of the Master Class is to teach students to use Java Script as a means of embedding basic Artificial Intelligence into their computer programs developed with Unity.

Led by the amazing expertise of Mr Jeff Ayling from Game Training, we had 13 students attend and participate in the 3+ hour, totally hands-on workshop. Students worked from Period 1 into Period 4 and refused to stop for a Recess break. By the end of the session the students were able to give their creations autonomous movement and have game objects respond to the player, based on proximity sensors and NavMesh navigation.

I would also like to extend special congratulations to Kabir Acharya in Year 7 for winning last term's Game Training Best 3D World Contest. Kabir's hard work and creativity earned him a \$100 gift voucher to spend at EB Games.

For all of the students that have participated in the Roadshow and/or the Master Class this year; remember that you can continue to access support from the Game Training staff over the Christmas holidays. The up-coming break is an excellent time to continue to learn and develop new skills in game design and coding.

SCHOOL OPAL CARD

The Minister for Transport and Infrastructure and the Minister for Education have announced the launch of the new School Opal card. The School Opal Card is a new online application for relevant parents and students travelling in the Opal public transport region. The application can be found at: transportnsw.info/school-students. Just like current paper travel passes, the School Opal card gives eligible students free travel to and from school on school days. However, the School Opal card makes travel simpler because now students don't need multiple application forms and passes if they use different transport operators within the Opal network. Students with school travel passes this year will not need to apply for a School Opal card unless they are changing schools, campus, their home address or moving from Year 2 to 3 or Year 6 to 7. Those students who do not need to apply will have a School Opal card sent to the school for the beginning of the first term in 2016.

During Orientation, I was asked many questions, some students were surprised at the subjects we offered, some were unclear of what happened in some subjects, but what was universally clear was that these kids were bright, with enquiring minds. There were contrasts of course, some students were extreme extroverts, whilst others, were not. Later in the day that all changed, as their confidence grew and social groups expanded and new friendships were formed.

In Period 3, one student sat at the back of the Library doing their survey and wouldn't ask for assistance and this troubled me. That girl had apparently isolated herself from the remainder of her group, confident enough to talk to only those she knew from her primary school, her teachers or her Group Leaders. I kept looking towards that girl, just in case, but decided to help her out. Despite her apparent shyness, she was able to share a laugh with me and from that moment, our conversation started. First we talked about things that we feel passionate about and then we reflected on the type of learners we both are, what we do in our free time and different book series we like.

Initially, I was the one pulling the questions out of thin air; but it was that young girl that posed the final one; "Do you know any other series of books I might like?" I swiftly recommended some other series I have either read or am reading at the moment. It was a simple, but satisfying exchange of ideas.

Later during lunch, I asked one of the leaders about how the young lady was faring and it appeared that she was doing really well and was now actively contributing to class discussions and mixing with her peers. That is what the Year Six Orientation day is about; discovering new things and new people, coming out of your shell, making new friends and adjusting to how things are run at Quakers Hill High School. All I can say is, by the end of the day everyone had at least met someone from another school, made a friend from Quakers Hill High School, acquainted themselves with our teachers and our subjects, all which will prove to be assets as they transition into high school in 2016.

A big 'thank you' is to be given to our outstanding and articulate Peer Support Leaders for an exemplary job done during our Orientation Events in 2015.

Transport for NSW

Fact sheet: The School Opal card

Who's eligible?

To be eligible for a School Opal card, students need to be NSW residents and may need to live a minimum distance away from their school:

- Years K-2 (Infants) there's no minimum distance.
- Years 3-6 (Primary) 1.6km straight line distance or 2.3km walking or further.
- Years 7-12 (Secondary) 2.0km straight line distance or 2.9km walking or further.

Students completing secondary studies at TAFE, boarding school students and students temporarily in Australia may also be eligible for a School Opal card. The eligibility criteria for these students is available at **transportnsw.info/school-students**.

A School Opal card is provided to eligible students who need to travel within the Opal network. Paper travel passes are issued to eligible students who need to travel outside the Opal network.

Who needs to apply?

Most students or parents won't need to apply for the School Opal card. The School Opal card will be sent to a student's school automatically at the beginning of the new school year in 2016.

However, a new application is required if:

- The student is just starting school or has not had a pass for travel before.
- The student is progressing from Year 2 to 3, or Year 6 to 7.
- · The student is changing schools, including going between primary and secondary school.
- · The student's personal details have changed (e.g. address).

Applications must be made by a parent or guardian for children aged 15 years and under. Applications must be made by the student if aged 16 years or older.

How to apply

Step 1 Complete the application at transportnsw.info/school-students.

Step 2 Print, sign and submit the form to the school for endorsement.

Step 3 The school will then forward the application to Transport for NSW for processing. Once approved, Transport for NSW sends the School Opal card to the home address given in the application.

The application may take several weeks and the applicant's email address is required.

If the student doesn't qualify for free travel

They may be eligible for a Term Bus Pass which offers travel on buses between home and school at a discounted rate for the whole school term.

STUDY TIPS FOR DECEMBER

7 Ways Mindfulness and Meditation Can be Helpful to Students

Want to try something new over the school holidays? Why not give meditation a go? There are lots of great Apps out there, for example 'Mindfulness', 'Headspace', 'Relax' and 'Positivity'. These will guide you through simple meditation and mindfulness exercises. You could even try the new mindfulness colouring-in books for adults that are all the rage. But what is it all about and why should you try it?



What is Mindfulness?

Headspace (<u>www.headspace.com</u>) defines mindfulness as "the intention to be present in the here and now, fully engaged in whatever is happening, free from distraction or judgement, with a soft and open mind".

What is Meditation?

Meditation is a way of transforming the mind, making it calm and silent. According to the Australian Teachers of Meditation Association meditation is a discipline that involves turning the mind and attention inward and focusing on a single thought, image, object or feeling.

How does meditation and practicing mindfulness help you with your schoolwork?

- 1. **Reduces anxiety and risk of depression** By becoming mindful, a person stops judging themselves and those around them and recognises that every situation "is what it is". When you stop judging and comparing, you are able to reduce anxiety.
- 2. **Increases resilience** resilience is the ability to experience something bad but to not internalise it and to be able to move on, still gaining benefit even from a negative experience. Practicing mindfulness and meditation quietens the mind and enables acceptance without judgement, which is key for achieving resilience.
- Improves ability to learn and recall information research by the University of Miami
 has shown that practicing mindfulness for 12 minutes a day improved attention and
 memory.
- 4. **Improves concentration** regular practice of meditation may help improve concentration by enabling the brain to focus more accurately and to filter out unwanted or unhelpful messages.
- 5. **Improves creativity** practicing mindfulness and meditation has the potential to allow the brain to unlock and unleash creativity. Creativity is of benefit to all students, not just in terms of artistic talents but also in relation to problem solving.
- 6. **Helps manage exam stress** meditation can help you calm and focus your mind which

- helps to manage stress related to exams. This tool can be used in the lead up to the exam and also during the exam if stress levels begin to rise.
- 7. **Leads to better sleep** getting enough sleep is crucial to ensure students have the mental and physical energy to learn. However, as academic and social pressures increase, this can lead to students having difficulty falling asleep or staying asleep. By reducing anxiety and stress you can ultimately sleep better and longer.

STUCK FOR A CHRISTMAS GIFT FOR MUM, SISTER, AUNT OR GRANDMA?

How about some homemade bath bombs as a treat to relax after all the rushing these ladies do to make Christmas and everyday special for the family! In the true spirit of Science...I set this process out as a scientific report.

Homemade Bath Bombs

Aim:

To surprise Mum/Sister/Aunt/Grandma with homemade bath bombs

Hypothesis:

If I made this gift by myself, then I will bring much joy to the recipient/ceiver.



re-

Equipment:

2 cups bicarbonate of soda (baking soda)

1 cup cream of tartar

1-2 tablespoons of olive oil (oil makes the bath water soothing)

Food colouring (optional)

Essential oils (lavender)

Dried lavender (optional)

Water in a spray bottle

Ice cube trays (silicon trays preferably)

Risk Assessment:

I might spill the materials. I would certainly need to clean this up by myself.

Method:

- 1. Mix the bicarbonate, tartar, oils, essential oils and colouring until you have a colour that you are happy with. Your mixture will still look powdery.
- 2. Give it 2-3 sprays of water. It will start to sizzle.
- 3. Mix until it feels a little more solid and a bit like wet sand.
- 4. Make a dent your spoon into the mixture and it leaves a nice shape without crumbling too much, it is ready to be transferred into the ice trays. Hint: you could add a few more sprays of water it needed
- 5. Fill in to trays (silicon trays make it easier to remove)
- 6. Let dry for 1-2 days.
- 7. Remove gently and gift wrap in a small box (see below for tips)
- 8. If the bombs crumble, it is because you did not add enough water in the beginning. Crumble it all again. Spray more water and start again.

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BELL SIGNALS SYSTEM

There are various bell signals which tell students and staff what to do.


SINGLE RING indicates the start of the day, end of lessons or breaks and the end of the day.

DOORBELL SOUND indicates a lockdown is required. All students and staff must remain in the buildings, close and lock all doors and wait for the all clear (which is two rings calling everyone to the quadrangle).
