PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

TELL THEM FROM ME SURVEYS

Again this term our school will be participating in the Tell Them From Me Surveys. This term we will be targeting Year 7 to get their feedback about the school and what they have learnt about high school so far. Their feedback will provide the school with invaluable information as we begin the planning cycle for 2015.

1. What is the *Tell Them From Me* student survey?

The *Tell Them From Me* student survey provides school Principals and school leaders with insight into student engagement, wellbeing and effective teaching practices at their school, from the perspective of students.

The survey is confidential and can be used either as a one-off survey or over time to identify trends within schools and better inform school priorities. The survey is held once a year, with an optional second survey within the year.

More than 78,000 secondary students from over 170 NSW public schools and students in 55 NSW public primary schools participated in a pilot of the survey in 2013-2014.

2. What are the benefits for my school?

The *Tell Them From Me* student survey provides school Principals and school leaders with insight into student engagement and wellbeing, and the impact of teaching practices at their school, from the perspective of students.

Data reports are provided to school leaders within three business days of the surveys closing. Reports include a 'one click' pdf summary report of their school's results; interactive charts which look more closely at their school results for specific groups of students (e.g. by gender or year group); and reports that allow comparisons against external data. The Learning Bar's system enables comparison with a replica school – a virtual school of students who have similar characteristics (year, gender and

socio-economic characteristics). Currently, this consists of data collected during the NSW pilot surveys.

STUDENTS ON SCHOOL BUSES

Just recently there has been an increase in complaints I have been receiving from members of the public about the inappropriate behaviour of <u>some</u> of our students using the school buses. I have included information about the code of conduct all our students have to adhere to when using these school buses:

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR SCHOOL STUDENTS ON BUSES

It is every student's responsibility to behave in a manner that ensures the safety and comfort of passengers and drivers. This includes:

- respect the needs and comfort of other passengers (e.g. no use of offensive or racist language, fighting, spitting, placing feet on seats, throwing things in or from the bus, eating or drinking except water unless the bus operator gives written permission)
- give up seats to all adults and any disabled passengers
 - adhere to the law that bans smoking on buses
 - obey reasonable directions from the driver (e.g. where to sit or to remain in the bus)
- keep arms, legs and heads inside the bus
- refrain from attracting the attention of the driver except in the case of emergency
- protect bus property
- ensure that buses are not vandalised
- report any vandalism, e.g. graffiti and window etching
- show travel passes or tickets to the driver on boarding and when requested
- use the travel pass only for its in-

- tended purpose
- keep your pass for your own use you should not lend your pass to other students or borrow one from them.

Roles and Responsibilities

Students will:

- behave courteously and responsibly on buses in accordance with the Code of Conduct
- follow reasonable instructions from drivers (e.g. where to sit or to remain in the bus when the driver is awaiting assistance from the police).

When in possession of a school bus travel pass, students must: show it to the driver when requested

Consequences for breach of the Code of Conduct

- Depending on the gravity of the offence, students may be required to give up their school bus travel pass or may be refused travel on the bus for a period of time determined by the bus operator.
- Heavier penalties may apply to students involved in group misbehaviour.
- School Principals have the right to take additional disciplinary action against a student under the school's discipline code or student welfare policy for any breach of the Code of Conduct.




The 30 primary school students have been planning their extended projects since the end of last year. To be accepted into the program, students who were nominated by their primary school teachers completed an application process in which they pitched their project idea and outlined the planning steps they envisaged would be needed to complete their project. Students were encouraged to choose the subject area they were most passionate about and to outline the skills they wanted to develop. QHHS student mentors and teachers were then assigned to each student to fit their skill and project requirements.

The program has several aims:



40 HOUR FAMINE RESULTS

This year Quakers Hill High participated and supported World Vision's 40 Hour Famine in its 40th year. Started by World Vision in 1975, the 40 Hour Famine is one of Australia's biggest youth events. This year it was expected that tens of thousands of young people from all



over the country will have participated to make their stand against global hunger. Over 40 years, Quakers Hill High School has raised \$17425.00 for the 40 Hour Famine. In total, we have participated 6 times. This money is enough to have helped 6,790 farmers to grow their village's food during a drought. Our record was set in 2009, when we raised \$4,632. This year, we were quite close to our

target of \$5000, raising a total of \$3620.70.

The participants gave up a variety of important items to them for 40 hours to raise awareness and much-needed funds to help fight global hunger, for example furniture, watching TV, playing computer games or eating junk food. The results can be seen via our team page

THE TELL THEM FROM ME STUDENT FEEDBACK SURVEY

I am delighted that this term, our school, like many other public schools in the state, will participate in a Department of Education initiative: the *Tell Them From Me* student feedback survey. The survey aims to help improve student learning outcomes and measures factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other student outcomes. The focus of the NSW-wide survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

The survey is a great opportunity for our students to provide us with valuable and quick feedback on what they think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them From Me* survey to help improve how they do things at school.

I want to assure you that the survey is confidential. The survey is conducted online and will typically take less than 30 minutes to complete. It will be administered during school hours between 17 August and 16 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary.

A consent form and FAQs for parents/carers about the survey is being sent home with students. If you **do not** want your child or children to participate, please return the form to school by the 17th August. Copies of the form and FAQs are available from the website above.

The Partners in Learning parent feedback survey

Our school will also be participating in the *Partners in Learning* parent survey, another part of the *Tell Them From Me* suite of surveys (student, teacher and parent surveys) on student engagement. The survey asks parents and carers questions about different factors that are known to impact on student wellbeing and engagement.

Running this survey will help our school understand parents' and carers' perspectives on their child's experience at school. These include: communication between parents/carers and staff, activities and practices at home and parent/carer views on the school's support of learning and behaviour. This valuable feedback will help our school make practical improvements.

The survey is conducted entirely online at home or on public computers. The survey will typically takes 15 minutes or less to complete and is completely confidential. The parent survey will be conducted between 17 August and 16 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary, however, your responses are very much appreciated.

On Monday 10 August, 156 Year 7 students attended the *Snake Tails* reptile incursion in the school hall. This incursion was in conjunction with the Term 3 unit, *We Bought a Zoo*. Having the live specimens available gave students a better understanding of how external characteristics of organisms are used by scientists in classifying them into different groups. The students had the opportunity to have hands-on experience and got to handle some of the reptiles that they would not necessarily go close to in the wild. The students were certainly enthusiastic during the incursion, and contributed by asking questions and eagerly volunteering to assist the presenter! In the lessons following the incursion, students were able to recall the information from the presentation and actively participated in the lessons on *Classification*.





A Year 6 Transition Announcement – Final Diagnostic Testing Afternoon - Tuesday 25 August

All prospective students must undertake a diagnostic test in Literacy and Numeracy prior to starting at Quakers Hill High School, in order to support our Executive Staff in creating appropriate classes that support effective learning. The tests, in conjunction with our Student Interest Survey (see above), equip our teaching staff with a pre-emptive understanding of the unique needs of each learner and their preferred learning style(s) and empowers them to plan the best ways to support learning within their KLA, through acceleration, remediation and structured extra-curricular activities. Traditionally students that attend our partner primary schools (Barnier, Hambledon, Quakers Hill and Quakers Hill East Public Schools) access these papers in Term 2; students from non-partner primary schools must undertake the exams during an assigned Diagnostic Testing Afternoon. So far, in 2015, we have run three such afternoons. If your Year 6 child is enrolled at QHHS for 2016 and has not undertaken these exams so far, we invite you to attend the final session in order to expedite the enrolment process.
