CONSEQUENCES FOR INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOUR

It is important for me to remind







parents that as part of our school Welfare and Discipline Policy we have a series of detentions that are attempts by the school to allow the students to reflect on their behaviour and accordingly address this behaviour. So students who come late to school without supporting justification from parents will be given a lunchtime detention. Similarly students who fail to adhere to our full school uniform expectations will also be placed on a lunchtime detention. Many faculties also have lunchtime detentions so the student can report back to the faculty and attempt to address the behaviour in a lesson which has impacted negatively on their learning and the learning of the rest of the class.

Students who fail to attend a detention, or who simply forget, are given another chance to redress this and are issued with a second detention. If they fail to attend the second detention, they will then be given an After School Detention (held on a Tuesday afternoon from 3.05 to 4.05 in B9). If a student fails to attend an After School Detention without a satisfactory explanation, they will be issued another detention or it may be escalated to a Deputy Principal's Detention (held on a negotiated afternoon in the front Admin Office). If a student fails again to follow these expected consequences, a caution to suspend or a suspension may be imposed by a member of the Senior Executive.

This system of detentions is about the school working with our young people to address their behaviour and ensure everyone works within our SMART expectations, so that we can continue to be a caring educational community shaping a positive future.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

THE IMPACT OF MOBILE PHONES ON STUDENT PERFORMANCE

Many of you may have seen the recent results of a decade of study into the effects of allowing mobile phones in schools. The results were quite staggering and reinforced what many teachers and parents have long suspected - mobile phones have an overall negative impact on student performance. In England, which has similar technology policies to those in Australia, it was found that "schools that banned mobile phones saw an increase in test scores of students aged 16 by 6.4% of a standard deviation, which means that it added the equivalent of five days to the school year." (Murphy and Beland, 2015) There was little impact on the achievement of higher performing students but students who struggled with literacy and numeracy were the 'most likely to demonstrate significant gains.'

Most of the research indicates that these results are due to students being distracted by their phones, sending texts and receiving texts, looking at images and videos. It is also no secret that mobile phones can be used to cyberbully, to film and thereby promote anti-social behaviour and to contribute to other social problems. At QHHS we have a clear technology policy that we feel recognises working parents' need to feel that their child is safe by allowing them to bring the phone to school yet minimises any impact on learning by not allowing the phone to be taken out in the classroom.

A quick reminder of the policy. If a student has their mobile out in class (without the permission of the teacher) then it will be confiscated and delivered to the supervising Deputy Principal. The phone can be collected at the conclusion of the day and the infraction will be recorded on SEN-TRAL (our student record database). Should the student refuse to submit the phone, it becomes a more serious matter of defiance and will lead to more significant consequences. Having your phone confiscated three times will result in an after school detention; four times will result in a Formal Caution of Suspension and subsequent infractions indicate repeated failure to follow the policy and may lead to a short suspension for continued disobedience. Students are expected to submit their phones during examinations and students who do not do so and are caught with any form of communication technology, will receive a zero and an N Award Warning.

Please support us by not calling or texting your child throughout the day. Please join with us in reminding your child to always have their phone turned off in class. Please monitor your child's mobile phone use and try to limit the amount of time they use it each day, being mindful of the correlation between mobile usage and overall achievement.

BULLYING NO WAY

In recent months QHHS participated in the "Tell them from Me" survey that incorporated returns from schools all over NSW. Some really exciting results were around bullying with QHHS students indicating that they experienced significantly lower rates of bullying than students in similar schools. This further corroborates our own surveys at the end of 2014 wherein over 90% of QHHS students indicated that QHHS takes bullying very seriously. Taking bullying seriously and eradicating bullying are not the same thing and it is unfortunately true that our rates of bullying spike each year around this time and the main culprits and victims are students in Year 7. International research shows that bullying peaks in the latter years of primary school but that covert bullying, the more hidden kind, is most prevalent in Year 7 and is least likely to be reported. (Cross et al, 2009). Boys in particular are less likely to report bullying and I have already had Year 7 boys tell me they didn't report because 'people will think I am a snitch.'

At Quakers Hill High School we take bullying very seriously and we are always looking for ways to strengthen our anti-bullying stance. Our anti-bullying referral sheet helps teachers to counsel students and assists students in 'unpacking' bullying situations. Our anti-bullying flowchart systematically outlines how to handle bullying and is published on our website.

Please remember that parents play an

enormous role in combating bullying. If you discover that your child is being bullied, please contact the school immediately. You can verbally report what has happened and do encourage your child to write a report wherein they say what has been happening, where and when it has happened, and who has been involved. You can locate an anti-bullying report in your child's school diary.

If you discover that your child has bullied others, then we would encourage you to talk to your child about respect and responsibility. Encourage your child to treat others respectfully at all times. You may also wish to refer your child to the counsellor or our student support officer to help them develop more pro-social behaviours.

Finally, if your child is aware that one of their friends or classmates is being bullied, encourage them to speak up, to support their friend by going with them to report the bullying to a staff member. Please never use language such as 'dobbing' or 'snitching' at home as this helps to build a culture of silence which allows bullying and harassment to flourish.

Bullying is a complex problem and solutions are often multi-faceted but if we all work together we will continue to make progress in this area.

OUTDOOR LEARNING CENTRE

Work is continuing to go ahead in our outdoor learning space. Mr Anthony Head (HT Social Science) has been working very hard each Friday with a team of selected students to get this space operational and ready for classes. This has been a wonderful initiative for the students involved who have gained real work experience and spend the last session of each Friday writing the employment skills they have accumulated that day. Our goal is to have the space ready for use by classes by the beginning of Term 3. From here staff will be trained in 8 Ways of Learning which is a teaching and learning framework that allows teachers to include Aboriginal perspectives by using Aboriginal learning techniques. All key learning areas will then begin looking at effective ways of incorporat-

ing the Outdoor Learning Space into their units of work.

RECOGNITION OF STU-DENT EXCELLENCE

This Wednesday we celebrated the first Recognition of Student Excellence Day, a celebration of student achievement and excellence that we hope will continue for many years to come. Students and their parents were invited to the breakfast on the basis of referrals from the Student Review with students who were referred by 4 or more faculties receiving an invitation. Approximately 120 Year 7 and 8 students and their parents were in attendance to celebrate the hard work and consistent

ENGLISH FACULTY NEWS

In English, Year 7 have been exploring different novels, looking at the context of the author and themes in the novels. They will have an informal, in class assessment later in the term based around an ALARM scaffold. Year 8 have recently moved onto a new unit of work, exploring the persuasiveness of media and how it represents issues in the world. With a strong focus on widening the students' views on the world, they have been looking at media representations based around factory farming and social justice. Year 9 has also been studying different novels, focusing on how characters grow and develop throughout the novel. They have an assessment coming up in Week 7 which will be done in class. Year 10 are currently studying Macbeth, with a focus on power representation throughout the play.

Drama has been progressing well this term, with the school's Theatresports team, JGNA, competing in the Western Region's Heat. Although JGNA did not win, they performed admirably and learned many new improvisation skills and what they need to improve on to go further in the future. The Year 9 drama class has been exploring Brechtian Theatre and currently rehearsing pieces from "The Threepenny Opera" to perform in class. Year 10 have also been studying Brecht, looking closely at the forms and features of Brecht's ideas and how they can be applied to any script.


The packs will give details of the vaccinations being offered with contact details for the NSW Department of Health if you have any questions about the vaccinations being offered.


Reading Recommendations from our Library Leaders

Hereafter - by Tara Hudson

Haunting and eerie, 'Hereafter' is both a touching love story and a supernatural mystery. It's engrossing from the very beginning and Hudson captivates readers with her vibrant characters, remarkable writing, and heart-rending

drama. The relationship between the central characters Amelia and Joshua is enthralling and heartbreaking. A ghost and a handsome 'human' in a relationship is so unique a premise for a story and Hudson was able to capably pull it off, weaving a tale that is surprisingly realistic and believable. The Red Pyramid – by Rick Riordan

Do you like ancient mythology? Have you read Percy Jackson and are you hungry for another RICK RIO epic series that will capture your imagination and keep you thirsting for more? 




