DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

SEIZE EVERY OPPORTUNITY

One of my favourite movies, and a favourite for many teachers is the Robin Williams

classic Dead Poets Society. This film focusses on a class of boys at a private American high school and their inspirational English teacher who constantly encourages them to "Seize the Day". By this he means that they must take advantage of every opportunity, that they must strive to excel and he exhorts them to 'make their lives extraordinary.' One of the reasons why teachers love this movie so much is that he pushes the boys to be the best that they can be and it is this that all teachers want for all students. That our students will strive to do their personal best in everything that they undertake.

One of the main ways we want to see students doing their best is by seeing them seize all of the opportunities that are offered to them. At Quakers Hill High School we have long offered students opportunities in extra-curricular sporting activities such as carnivals, knockout competitions, grade sport and the Collegiate Cup. Students have the opportunity to engage in student mentoring via Primary Prosperitas and they have the opportunity to complete their own sustained Prosperitas project in an area of personal interest. Students can compete in ICAS competitions, play Chess, seek election in the SRC, volunteer as a peer support leader or a peer counsellor. They can undertake the Premier's Reading Challenge, they can get involved in groups, musical and dramatic performances. They can try out their arguing skills in debating, they can seek publication of their creative writing in the school magazine or on the school website. They can even get involved in cross-collegiate activities such as theatre sports and MADD nights.

For this reason it can be somewhat disappointing to see how many students do not take the opportunity to engage in the extra-curricular opportunities offered. Parents, when you receive your child's report this Friday take a few minutes to see whether or not your child was involved in any extra-

curricular activities. If they were not, and they are not involved in anything outside of school, please encourage them to seek out some of the opportunities that QHHS offers. It will help them in all sorts of ways, not least of all in developing new and wider friendship groups, building confidence, developing a stronger sense of connection and belonging to school. They will also develop skills and abilities that help them to stand out when it comes time for them to write a resume for a part time employment.



TEACHERS LOVE LEARNING TOO

On the 23rd June, the QHHS teaching staff stayed at school until well after 6pm engaging in a variety of activities around numeracy and providing feedback. Mrs Maricic opened the Twilight Session with a presentation on Numeracy before all staff went off to their KLA groups to work on creating class lists and using these to determine which areas of numeracy their class needed the most work on. Mrs Critchley then separated the staff into 8 groups to go off and prepare presentations on a range of aspects of Feedback, based on a variety of readings and articles in this area. Improving feedback is one of our focus areas as "when Professor John Hattie, the Director of the Melbourne Education Research Institute reviewed over 500,000 research studies, he found that feedback had more impact on student results than any other teaching strategy." Thank you to the staff who contributed to making it such a useful and productive afternoon. Thank you also to Mrs Maricic for organising the food – a task which she always accomplishes with grace and apparent ease.

Next term our Staff Development Day will be held at Wyndham and it will be a Nirimba Learning Community (NLC) joint initiative with Dr Justin Coulson speaking to the staff from all nine schools on issues such as positive psychology and building the emotional classroom.

Semester 1 Reports were issued today with Semester 2 timetables. If your child was not at school today, they can pick it up first day back next term from the front office.

To all staff, students and parents, have a wonderful holiday and enjoy some time relaxing and catching up with your loved ones. Be safe and we look forward to seeing you next term refreshed and ready to embrace the challenges of Term 3.

Remember, school resumes on Tuesday the 19th July and it will be Week A of the timetable.


After such a busy semester have a safe and restful break. We will see you all next term.

Reading Recommendations from Our Library Leaders

Rainbow Rowell-Carry On

Simon Snow is the worst 'Chosen One' ever chosen. He can't pronounce spells properly, he can't control his magic, he sets fires when he 'goes off' and he is roommates with a vampire that is hell bent on killing him; his sworn arch nemesis, Baz. Then Simon entangles himself in the mysterious 'Watford Incident', helping his enemy Baz to find his Mum's killer and fighting the Humdrum as it devours magic. This book captures a journey full of mysteries, whiteboards, mythical creatures and fluttering kisses.

Carry On is a witty take on fan fiction writing, having being composed by the protagonist in author Rainbow Rowell's novel Fangirl, as a satirical homage to Harry Potter. This book contains many character's perspectives and yet the main action still centres

around Simon Snow, the greatest, most powerful magician that ever walked on Earth. The book is engrossing, as it engages its readers with the character's complex and continually evolving relationships. The plot line featuring countless magical expeditions heightens the thrill, with the protagonist and his friends facing the Humdrum. As new characters are introduced, the mystery intensifies. The heightened suspense left me with huge expectations for a sharp and decisive ending, which unfortunately the book did not entirely deliver. (Hence, the two missing stars.) Overall, the book was enjoyable. Not for a hard-core fantasy book reader, but for teenage readers who enjoy a little romance on a battlefield.



An Eagle in the Snow-By Michael Morpurgo

This is the story of a man who could have stopped World War 2 with a single bullet.

An Eagle in the Snow is the story of a solider in World War 1 who could have prevented World War 2 from occurring with a single bullet through a man's head. When Barney and Ma meet a stranger in the train, he tells them the story of William "Billy" Byron, a solider in World War 1. When Billy meets little Christine and views firsthand what the horror of war can do to people, he is determined to end the war as soon as he can. Billy earns many medals and honours along the way, becoming more and more famous as the story unfolds. One fateful day there is a battle, and on the spur of the moment, he makes a decision which he thought was the right one. However, this decision turns out



to be the biggest mistake he has ever made. Will he be able to live with the resulting grief or will he have to finish what he started all those years ago?

An Eagle in the Snow delivers a rich story with a unique point of view; this is undoubtable an intriguing and dramatic novel, with thought provoking ideas. As the story unravelled, it kept you guessing as to what the 'event that could have stopped World War 2' could have been. This book is extremely well written. The author begins with a minimalist style and then slowly begins adding more complex detail to the scenes, the characters, and the action, compelling you to read on. The mysterious scenes were extremely well composed, delivering a sense of drama and creating a tense atmosphere with emotive language.

I would recommend this book to fans of Michael Morpurgo's work or people who enjoy reading historical fiction

about World War 1 and 2. It encouraged readers to take on a different perspective and I give it four out of five stars. I would also recommend reading other books by Michael Morpurgo, such as War Horse, Kensuke's Kingdom, Waiting for Anya, Why the Whales Came, Friend or Foe and Twist of Gold.

Me Before You – By Jojo Moyes

IMe Before You is a romantic novel about the unlikely pairing of 26-year-old Louisa Clark and a wealthy man, Will Traynor. Will was very successful and enjoyed all aspects of his life, until he became paralysed. Then Lou makes an entrance into his life, on her quest to find work she gets offered a job as Will's personal carer. Suddenly Will's world changes, his despondency, unhappiness and disconnection from life is challenged by this woman who feels deeply, laughs loudly and reawakens his thirst for life.

This book is thoroughly engaging and very thought provoking; you become completely invested in the characters and their dilemma. Jojo Moyes presents a complex juxtaposition of a stirring love story set against great personal tragedy. Even though it was a little predictable or clichéd

at times, the ending of the book contrasted beautifully with the beginning. The novel challenges the reader in many ways, inspiring us to reflect on how we would fare in a similar situation. This emotional tale explores a rich tapestry of themes, such as acceptance, family, friendship and life. I encourage you to read this novel, before viewing the recent film adaptation.



The Ice Dragon - By George R.R. Martin

The Ice Dragon by George R.R. Martin is a fantasy novel about dragon's, endless war and the cold, harsh winter. Adara is a winter child, born in the coldest of winters ever seen. Isolated from others, she grew up counting the days until the arrival of winter, when she could visit the Ice Dragon who came every year. Then war erupted, soldiers mounted upon terrifying dragons threatened her village and in the midst of terror Adara was required to make a pivotal choice.

This short novel is an easy read that keeps you on the edge of your seat in anticipation of what's to come next. It has wonderful illustrations that depict scenes of terror and wonder, making it an excellent read for all years. The accessible language ensures that it is easy to understand and can be well appreciated by all lovers of quality fantasy.

SCIENCE MATTERS

Students of Year 9 enjoyed a day at the University of New South Wales, taking a tour of the campus, attending a lecture and viewing specimens in the Museum of Human Disease. The lecture included information about the causes of diseases, strategies to prevent diseases developing and the need to treat specimens with respect and dignity, remembering the pain



and distress caused to the patients who experienced the illness.

This year the SRC went to Bundilla Scout Camp. We went on 26 and 27 May and spent our time studying and analysing how to be an effective leader through fun learning based games and activities. We all really enjoyed it and we all learnt new things.

One of the activities we did at camp was a teamwork building activity. Overall this activity was very enjoyable for everyone and we all had a great time.

Mr Meredith ran a session on goal setting which we all found excellent! The best thing from this session was learning about the SMART rules of setting a goal. He taught us how to use an acronym to help us remember how to set personal and school based goals.

S- Stands for *Specific*, which means that you have to know in detail of what, how, when and why you want to achieve this goal.

M- Is for *Measurable*, this means that there always should be a way to evaluate whether or not they were accomplished.

A - Is for Attainable, meaning your goals must be something you are capable of reaching.

R- Is for *Relevant*, which means that you must make your goal be about the important thing/s to you and your lifestyle.

And lastly, **T**- is for *Time*, make sure that you have a time set as a 'dead line' so your goal is not unending.

In the days after the camp the SRC students had to think of a goal about something we wanted to accomplish, like learning a new skill or improving on a current one. We have all selected a goal using this framework and plan to accomplish them by the end of the year! Watch this space!

Part of being an effective leader is being able to develop good communication skills. Across the span of the camp Ms. Khehra, Ms. Critchley and Mr. Meredith taught and explained to us the importance of knowing how to utilise both of these skills. We learnt how to apply good communication and use it to resolve



conflict and to get our point across to large audiences or small groups. We practiced this across the span of the camp. We developed good posture, clear vocal projection and engaging ideas and we try to apply these in SRC presentations at assemblies and roll call announcements. We understand that conflict resolution is important if we as a collaborative group ever wish to make a positive impact on our school.

The cabins at Bundilla were very clean and well kept. They were large and spacious, with many bunk beds for everyone. The food was all made and prepared by Ms Portelli and Mr Kantek, with help from Mr Meredith and the SRC students. We had delicious meals and great hospitality over the duration of the two-day camp. Another thing we enjoyed was the free time we got at night where



we got to sit around the campfire and roast marshmallows while playing fun camp games.

Overall camp was interesting and taught us some useful skills including leadership, communication and teamwork, in order to become a successful leader and repre-

sentative for this school. It was a great experience and we would like to thank all the teachers involved! Especially Mr Meredith for organising the camp, Ms Portelli for looking after the food preparation and Mr Kantek, Mr Head, Mrs Critchley and Mrs Khehra for running our sessions!

SUPPORT UNIT NEWS

SCIENCE: Year 7 students have been studying 'Living Things' this semester. They have learnt the differences between living and non-living organisms and the characteristics of living things. The class performed an experiment to determine whether yeast released carbon dioxide during respiration when given ideal living conditions. In the experiment yeast, sugar and warm water were placed in one conical flask while only sugar and water were placed in another flask. Each flask had a balloon stretched over the top. After a 15 minute wait, students measured the circumference of each balloon to determine the extent of inflation and to test their theory. Students have enjoyed the scientific discoveries they have made this term.

POTATOES: the potatoes planted in Term 1 are ready for harvest! Year 7 students from S1 will harvest potatoes from one of the three large containers tomorrow and leave the rest to keep growing until after the holidays. We shall discover the difference a few extra weeks of growing can make to *size* (new potatoes) and *flavour* (old potatoes). We are expecting approximately twenty potatoes from each plant; if all goes to plan, expect some little spuds tomorrow afternoon!

MINI MARKET GARDEN: speaking of harvest, Work Education students will begin planting for their Mini Market Garden early next term! This will take place in specially prepared beds down in the Agriculture plot. Plants will be fertilised courtesy of the kindly chooks and ducks (and maybe even a little extra help from Fred and Jupiter; QHHS resident goats!)

TERM 2 EXCURSION: a wonderful and exciting time was had by all students attending the excursion to *Planet X Indoor Trampolining* this week. Students bounced and jumped and had a great time wearing themselves out on the wall-to-wall trampolines (including two Olympic quality ones) for an hour in Richmond. Students were impeccably behaved both on the train and at the venue. Everyone adhered to the safety rules, were friendly to each other, respectful to staff and thanked the trampoline supervisors profusely on their way out. This was a most successful outing.

OPAL CARDS: as advised previously, all students in the Support Unit will need to purchase an Opal Card in the near future. As we found out at this week's excursion, tickets can no longer be purchased from the ticket office at the train station. Staff members were forced to buy tickets from the electronic ticket machine *one by one!* This was a frustrating experience that took a great deal

of time and will not be an option in any future excursions. Opal Cards are readily available and all students will be required to purchase one during Term 3 and ensure that adequate credit is maintained.

TRAVEL TRAINING: a Travel Training program is currently being developed for all students in the Support Unit. We expect to begin travel training in Term 4 this year. Students will take public transport to a variety of locations, learning about appropriate behaviour, safety, reading timetables, troubleshooting and other vital independent living skills. We are planning a dynamic program where students have the opportunity to access a variety of places in the community. *Individual student Opal Cards will be a requirement of this program.*

MRS PAYNE'S VISIT: staff and students were delighted to see Mrs Payne when she dropped in to visit last Tuesday! Mrs Payne stayed for the morning visiting each support class and chatting with students.

PARENT COMMUNICATION: parents and carers are reminded that they are most welcome to communicate with Support Unit staff via student diaries, the school telephone or email system. It is a requirement that any face-to-face meeting needs to be arranged ahead of time and visitors cannot present at the staffroom or classroom without an appointment. Visitors also need to sign in at the front office before proceeding through the school grounds. We are always happy to discuss any issues with you.


