ENGLISH FACULTY NEWS

It has been a busy fortnight for all years with class assessments and assignments due.

Year 7 have been finalising their study of their Area of Study unit on Gender and the film 'Mulan' and have completed their viewing assessment task this week. The unit this term has focused on gender roles and perspectives with an emphasis on developing students' critical thinking and analytical writing skills.

Last week **Year 8** completed their essay assessment task on the novels they have been studying in class this term. Students spent two weeks in class preparing their essays and learning how to structure each section of their essay. Students have been focusing particularly on how to identify characterisation techniques and to analyse and explain their effects.

Year 9 submitted their creative writing assessment task last week. In this task students created a short story in a genre and style of writing of their choice. Over the term students learnt and practised a variety of creative writing strategies, focusing on their use of vocabulary, descriptive and sensory imagery and figurative writing techniques.

Year 10 have been learning about the concept of justice in their core text - the film 'A Time To Kill'. Students have been learning about different types of justice within our global society and different perspectives associated with it. They have also revised their understanding of film techniques –particularly camera shots and angles, sound, lighting and the use of dialogue. This week they have completed their viewing/ listening assessment task focusing on demonstrating their understanding of how the concept of justice is shown in 'A Time to Kill' and the role that film techniques play in emphasising the ideas associated with justice.


NATIONAL HISTORY CHALLENGE 2016 - TRIUMPH OR TRAGEDY

What is Facebook?

Facebook is a free social networking after that allows users to create profiles, upload, share and view photos and videos and send messages. The after allows users who have common interests to interact, create and manage events and live chat with their online contacts, or "Friends". Facebook is restricted to users aged 13-years-old and above, however some users may lie about their age to join.

What devices can access Facebook?

Facebook can be accessed on any device that has an internet connection such as mobile phones, tablets and computers. It can be accessed via the Facebook website or through one of two apps, the generic Facebook app which includes all of Facebook's features except private messaging, and Facebook's "Messenger" app which is used for private messaging.

Who can young people interact with when on Facebook?

Facebook users have the ability to interact with a wide range of individuals. Through Facebook's news feed users have the ability to interact in public conversations, with people who are not Friends.

What are the potential challenges with Facebook?

As with any form of social media, there are some challenges that young people may face when using Facebook. These can include online grooming (when an adult makes online contact with someone under the age of 16 with the intention of engaging in a sexual relationship) or cyberbullying and harassment. Other challenges include privacy concerns, such as revealing too much personal information on Facebook, reputation management or falling victim to scarns shared through social networking sites.

What are the recommended privacy settings?

By maintaining strong privacy settings, users can limit the amount of information shared with strangers. When setting up privacy features on Facebook there are three options:

- Public any Facebook user to can view personal content and interact with your child.
- Friends of Friends allows Friends and their Friends to view and interact with your child and their content.

 Friends - only accepted Friends can see your content. In the first instance. The Friends option is the safest way to ensure that you are sharing information with people you know and trust, but should not be considered as 100 per cent private.

There is also the ability to change the privacy options for individual posts.

How do you manage Facebook privacy settings?

It may be easier to change privacy settings on a computer rather than a mobile device. To manage your privacy on Facebook (on a computer), access the privacy settings by clicking on the downward facing arrow in the upper right-hand side of the page and select 'Settings'. In the left hand column, click on "Privacy".

To access these settings on a mobile device select the 'More' tab. Scroll down to the Help & Settings section and select 'Account Settings' and then 'Privacy'.

Our Collective Power to Make a Difference

The 2016 St Vincent De Paul Christmas Hamper Drive

Each year St Vincent de Paul (or 'Vinnies' as most people know it), run a Christmas Hamper Drive, in which food donations are given to those in need of a little extra support during the holiday season.

These baskets of food are distributed to families or individuals who are less fortunate and have experienced ill tidings, such as the loss of a job, an illness in the family or family separation.

Quakers Hill High School is a school with a big heart and a big social conscience. We are fortunate that we have a school community that believes in helping others and in our collective power to make a difference. It is because of this sense of community and this sense of compassion that we run our own annual Christmas Hamper Drive in an attempt to support what our local St Vincent De Paul charities strive to do.

Our goal is relatively modest and incredibly achievable; we aim to fill six baskets with non-perishable foods and Christmas themed goods for six families in our local area. We require food stuffs with a 'use by' date that extends into March 2017. Specifically we are calling for pasta packets and sauces, rice packets and chips, chocolates, coffee and condiments and soft drinks as well as long-life milk. Christmas bon-bons, lollies, tinned fruit, mince pies, tuna tins and pancake mix are all equally desirable.

Please avoid donating perishable items that require refrigeration and/or will expire before March 2017.

Remember, all you have to do is take 2 minutes out of your daily routine to help make a difference in someone

else's life. You simply need to go to where ever you keep your non-perishable food, reach in, select at least one delectable item and take it to school and drop it off at the Library. *It is that simple*. (Though of course, if you are kid reading this, it's obviously advisable to ask Mum and Dad what you're permitted to donate.)

The drive kicked off in Week 7 of this term and will run until the 18th of November (Week 6 of Term 4.)

So please, dig deep and donate to these less fortunate and make this Christmas one worth remembering.



- · progressing from Year 2 to Year 3,
- · progressing from Year 6 to Year 7, or
- requesting an additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation.


