### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

### MEMORIAL ASSEMBLY FOR MRS GRANTHAM

I am always proud of the students who attend Quakers Hill High School and I am always immensely proud to tell people that Quakers Hill High School is where I work.

On Friday 17 February my pride in our students and their demonstration of respect was almost overwhelming. In Period 1 of that day we held a memorial service for Mrs Louise Grantham, our beloved friend and colleague. We had a significant number of Mrs Grantham's friends and family in attendance and the memorial consisted of a number of talks and presentations. A group of Year 9 students spoke on behalf of the student community reading messages of gratitude and appreciation. Mrs Diana Towell, Chairperson of the P&C, read messages from the community and Mrs Kuldip Khehra delivered a talk that highlighted Mrs Grantham's humour and passion for teaching. We were then honoured to hear from Mrs Grantham's parents who told us some stories from Mrs Grantham's earlier life. Stories that demonstrated her determination, her compassion and, once again, her humour. Mrs Grantham's parents told one particular story that I shall repeat here. Mrs Grantham and her brother were disagreeing over the merits of two particular animals - her brother was insisting that the penguin was the better animal whilst Mrs Grantham insisted that the Hedgehog was the better because, as she reminded him, the hedgehog has so many points.

It is for this reason that the small statue of the hedgehog has been placed next to the commemorative plaque and the beautiful "Heavenly Scent" rose in the Quakers Hill High School









Rose Garden.

Throughout the ceremony our students behaved with the utmost respect. Respect that was commented on by many guests and our own office staff who rarely have the opportunity to attend formal assemblies.

After the assembly, family, friends and invited guests moved off to the rose garden for the official rose planting where the QHHS Green Team, a team of dedicated students who help maintain the school grounds and undertake a range of environmental projects, had prepared for the planting and the placing of soil.

Overall, the memorial assembly was a wonderful and fitting tribute to a teacher, a colleague and most of all, a dear friend who showed exceptional commitment to Quakers Hill High School and its students. A commitment that will be long remembered and formally recognised each year with the 'QHHS Exceptional Commitment Award' being renamed the 'Louise Grantham Exceptional Commitment Award,' an award previously won by Gemma Hewitson, Louise's daughter.

Thank you to Mrs Khehra, Mrs Romerosa, Mrs Maricic, Mr Brooks, Mrs Tong and Mr Daghel for their work in making the assembly—such a wonderful and fitting tribute.



### LEADERSHIP ASSEMBLY

On 16 February we held our Leadership Induction Ceremony to officially recognise the Quakers Hill HS Leaders for 2017. We recognised the Student Representative Counsellors, the Peer Support Leaders and the House Group Captains. There were many positive elements to this assembly but I think the stand out feature was the enormous number of peer support leaders who were recognised and badged, 85 in total. That is 85 students who sought a leadership/ transition role, undertook two days of training and gave up one day of their holidays to get up early, put on school uniform and come to school in order to help the new Year 7 students more effectively transition into high school. These students also must attend regular briefing and debriefing sessions in their own time. The role of Peer Support Leader is a sacrificial one and it is amazing to see how many students are ready to undertake it.

The role of SRC is also a sacrificial one that requires students to give up lunchtimes and many hours after school to support the QHHS community.

Thank you to all of our leaders and to Mr Meredith for overseeing the SRC and for his and Mr Wright's efforts in organising the Leadership Assembly.

### HSC MINIMUM STANDARDS

There has been a lot of talk and worry about the new HSC minimum standards which state that students who do

not achieve a Band 8 or above in NAPLAN will not be allowed to sit for the HSC.

This was spoken about by the Minister for Education last year and there has been further information about it this year. Year 9 of 2017 are the first year group that will be impacted by this.

This has raised much concern from both parents and students therefore it is important to clarify a few major concerns:

- NAPLAN 2017 is <u>not</u> the only opportunity that students have to meet those standards. Students will have at least two chances a year to sit a comparable online literacy and numeracy test between now and 2020 the year when most of the current Year 9 cohort will sit the HSC.
- Students who do not meet the benchmark will still be allowed to proceed to Year 11 and 12.

These concerns and others have already been addressed with Year 9. If you have further concerns, please contact the school. Remind your child not to worry – rather it is important that they keep focussing on their learning. Their job is to listen, learn, try their best and to bring a calculator on the day.

### **GOAL SETTING**

In our last PBL lesson we focussed on the importance of goal setting. We looked at the difference between specific goals and non-specific goals, realistic goals and less realistic goals. We viewed short clips on step by step goal setting and how it is important to have people in your life who will encourage you to be the best that you can be. At the end of the lesson students completed a series of goals for Semester 1. Students were asked to complete two

learning goals, one wellbeing goal and one extra-curricular goal. They were also required to map out how they could meet that goal and who could help them. These goals will be communicated to parents later in the year.

Goal setting is a major focus area for this year. You can support us in this by discussing how you have set and met goals with your child and by discussing their goals (both short and long-term) with them.

### NUMERACY




### **HOMEWORK CLUB**

Homework Club will operate this year in the school library from 3.10pm to 4.10pm each **Tuesday and Wednesday** afternoon. The supervising teachers will be Ms Fensom (Tuesdays) and Mr Krilic (Wednesdays).

Homework Club is made available to students of our school in order to:

- Provide access to computers for word processing, powerpoint presentations, internet research, printing completed work etc.
- Provide access to all books, encyclopedias, magazines and other printed resources.
- Gain assistance from teachers on the completion of homework and assignments, developing study skills, research techniques etc.
- Provide a quiet environment for school or recreational reading.

In order to attend Homework Club, students are required to complete a permission note for **each afternoon of attendance**. The permission note is to be returned to either **Mr Krilic** or **Ms Fensom** 



- 1. Students must be in the Library no later than 3.10pm.
- 2. Students will not be dismissed before 4.10pm unless written permission to leave early is provided by parents.
- 3. The normal rules of the library apply, eg. Bags left at entrance to library etc.
- 4. Students must be well behaved and attend to their work for the full session. N.B.: disruptive or non-serious students will not be permitted to return to the Club for the remainder of the year.

Please Note: It is expected that parents will **make alternative arrangements** for their child to **get home from school** after being dismissed at 4.10pm. A telephone will be made available to students to use during the Club hours to communicate with parents should this be required.



### **ENGLISH FACULTY NEWS**

This term Year 7 are studying the elements of a short story and what makes an effective story. Students have been deconstructing various stories in class and examining their literary elements in preparation for their assessment due later in the term. They will be explicitly taught how to write a review which will form the basis of their assessment.

Students in Year 8 are doing an Area of Study on the topic of Survival. Currently they are focusing on various survival stories from newspaper articles and examining the elements of a news article that will enable them to write their own article of a survival story. Over the next few weeks they will explore the concept of survival in various other texts in readiness for their speech assessment.

Year 9 are exploring an Area of Study on the Human Footprint where they have looked at the impact of the human footprint on the planet and critically started to focus on whether we have a collective responsibility to reduce our impact. They have been examining how the effects of the human footprint are represented in visual images, songs and other forms of literature. In their Year Assembly they have been spoken to and given an outline of the collaborative assessment that they will be doing with the Science and HSIE Faculties.

In their unit on the close study of the Australian poet, John Foulcher and his poetic work, Year 10 students have been looking at the context of the poet and his thematic concerns. They have analysed his poem, 'Harry Wood', which is a biographical poem based on the struggles of an Aussie battler during the Great Depression. The students have started to examine another of Foulcher's poems 'Kangaroos Near Hay'. In class teachers are focussing on writing structured, analytical paragraphs that will aid the students to successfully complete their essay assessment.

### **MATHEMATICS NEWS**

Year 7 students are going for a camp for 3 days this week. Year 7-10 students are having their Term 1 Test in Week 7. Most of the Year 7 classes have finished 'Computation with Integers' and have just started the new topic 'Data Collection and Representation'. Year 8 is finishing 'Area' and will be starting 'Indices'. Year 9 and 10 are also nearly finished with their first topics or have started the second one depending on their courses.

Students need to prepare a summary sheet using one A4 page for each topic and they are allowed to take it into their test. An excellent summary sheet should contain clear and precise definitions, an example, and an explanation in words on most of the content learnt. The summary sheet will be assessed out of 10 marks and will be included in the overall grading of the assessment. Teachers will be encouraging students to complete the summary sheet at home.

The Homework Club is available on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons and is free of charge for any students who need help with their homework or assessment tasks. Interested students can pick up a note from the library.

Students are expected to come prepared to school with the correct equipment. This includes a **CALCULATOR** and it can be purchased from the front office for \$15, if needed.

### AGRICULTURE NEWS

On 23 - 24/2/17, 14 one day old chicks will be delivered to Quakers Hill Agriculture Plot to be raised as meat birds in the Steggles' Schools Competition for the Royal Easter Show.

The birds will be cared for by the Year 9 elective Agriculture class, their teacher, Ms Ossington and the farm assistant, Ms Parberry. The chicks will be kept in a brooding cage where they will be fed, watered, weighed and measured to assess their development. When they are big enough they will be moved to an enclosure in the poultry shed, where they will have access to an outside run.

The birds will be cared for and monitored for six weeks and then transported to the show for judging.

A photo and development record will be kept and published over the six weeks so the school community can share the experience with the students and keep track of the progress of the birds.



### **NEWS FROM THE TAS DEPARTMENT**

The staff in the TAS department would like to inform parents and students that as the year is well under way now, classes should all be working on first assignments. Onguard safety tests are being carried out in all practical courses in the school, for all grades, and students are responsible for completing these.

Teachers have informed all students of the course fees, and they are able to pay these amounts even while awaiting invoices to arrive at home. Practical course fees are compulsory and are required for students to participate in practical tasks, to pay for materials needed. Any family with a concern about this may address it to Mr Wright, our Deputies Mrs Maricic, Mrs Khehra, or Mrs Mahon if a payment plan is needed for these amounts.

Student book work is beginning the year well presented and students are taking pride in the efforts in their learning. Practicals have started and students are enthusiastically taking interest in new learning.

Barista club has started for 2017, with a large group of students in the city to professional training this week. Students gained both practical and theoretical knowledge and recognised certificate results. They will practise these new skills running the school café at recess and lunch. Teachers look forward to enjoying the results of their growing skills.

### CREATIVE & PERFORMING ARTS FACULTY

Another busy period in the CAPA Faculty with all the year groups and the elective classes well into preparation stages for their substantial artworks in preparation for the CAPA showcase at the end of the year. The Year 7 introduction to the **Elements of Art** is really getting into gear with a blending of artmaking, literacy and a numeracy component learning about scale and proportion. In theory lessons art history and renowned artists are introduced in preparation for the examination next term. Each teacher is taking a different stance on the Year 7 substantial art work which will make exciting viewing at the end of the year.

Year 8 this semester is looking at Rites, Rituals and Traditions in which they will create artworks that are inspired by indigenous art. Students are currently creating inspired designs to be transformed into photograms and then later in the semester they will be creating a mask. Students are learning about the traditions of the indigenous peoples in the theory component of the course.

In Music, Year 8 students are busy preparing for their first performance assessment, playing the classic song 'Last Kiss' by Pearl Kiss. They have worked extremely hard learning how to play basic guitar chords, and will no doubt use these as a firm foundation to learn more challenging pieces in future lessons.

The Year 9-10 100hr Photography classes are in full swing learning photographic darkroom procedures and will be commencing making photograms very soon followed by learning the use of film cameras, digital cameras and the entire processing aspects. Students will also learn how to enhance and manipulate their work through Photoshop. 200hr photography students are capitalising on last year's success with the introduction of a challenging theme: *The still and the mundane things*. Looking forward to seeing how students use the photographic

process to make exciting things that they take for granted. A **big, big** reminder to all elective art classes your **essay assignment is due week 8.** 

The 9-10 electives are also in full swing with preparatory work for their fantasy artwork. Students are enthusiastically engaged in this topic, already showing some fantastic results in their collages and drawings.

### **BELL SIGNALS SYSTEM**

There are various bell signals which tell students and staff what to do.

SINGLE RING indicates the start of the day, end of lessons or breaks and the end of the day.

TWO RINGS indicate an assembly in the quadrangle has been called. All students and staff should assemble in the quad as quickly as possible.

THREE RINGS indicate that the oval is closed due to extreme heat or rain. Undercover walkways become inbounds for that break.

WHOOP SOUND indicates that an evacuation is necessary. Students and staff must evacuate the buildings and assemble on the oval.

DOORBELL SOUND indicates a lockdown is required. All students and staff must remain in the buildings, close and lock all doors and wait for the all clear (which is two rings calling everyone to the quadrangle).

#### TOP 5 HABITS FOR STUDENTS

Recently I was asked what I thought the top 5 habits were for students in their last year of school. I came up with this list below, then realised wouldn't it be great if all students had these habits firmly entrenched before they even reached the senior years of school!



So your challenge for this year, no matter what your year level, is to ensure these habits become embedded as part of YOUR practice for learning to help you become an effective learner at school and in your career and personal life.

Want to develop great habits for learning? Here's what you need to do:

 ENGAGE: Don't just be a bystander, instead be an active participant in your own learning, taking responsibility for what you need to do to achieve your academic best.

#### This means:

- You involve yourself in all of your lessons, staying on task, participating in discussions and trying to absorb as much as you can during your classes (and that means less to learn later).
- You complete all of the set work for your subjects (your teacher gives you this for a reason)
  and you try and keep up to date in this work.
- You seek help on anything you don't understand or can't do. This might be from a teacher, a
  friend, online sources, additional books or study guides. You also do this nice and early, you
  don't let the problems pile up.
- 2. ORGANISE: Being organised means that you can find things when you need them, you don't forget about work to be done and you don't have last minute panics. Much less stressful.

### This means:

- You have a good system for managing all of the paper for school, you file away completed work and sort and organise all of the papers you are given.
- You do the same with your digital resources: well named folders and logical filing structures.
   You do a back-up on a regular basis.
- When you are given an assessment task you make a plan for when you will do the work for this task and you adjust the plan along the way as things change.
- 3. THINK AHEAD: Part of 'stepping up' is that you don't just wait for someone to tell you to do something. You think ahead and work strategically.

### This means:

If you know there will be exams (and there are always exams) then don't wait until exam time
to get your act together. Make your study notes as you go. Every time you finish a topic make
study notes for that topic and file it away at home.
