#### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

#### COMMUNICATION

In the last Contact I communicated some outstanding data to you all. There has been some positive feedback on this from parents and what that data demonstrates about the teaching and learning that is occurring at Quakers Hill High School. At a recent Thursday assembly I communicated this data to the students. Although the 2016 NAPLAN results only specifically related to two groups of students it is indicative of how the QHHS culture of learning is sustaining and growing. This was further demonstrated that same day by the large number of students who have elected to participate in the newly formed creative writing club, the five sets of chess groups and the journalism days. There are many opportunities to connect, succeed and thrive at Quakers Hill and there is nothing more exciting than seeing our students take advantage of those opportunities.

#### STUDENT VOICE

Student Voice is a focus area for Quakers Hill High School in 2017 and into the future as we move forward into the next school planning cycle. The PBL team has long encouraged the involvement of students in their development. provision teaching of lessons such as anti -bullying lessons, 'R U OK' day and so on. PBL has also encouraged student voice through having two student representatives attend PBL meetings to provide input on SMART direc-Last vear Vaughan, then in Year 9, was an active and valuable member of the Canteen Tender Committee, providing a student perspective in our discussions, comparisons, evaluation and ultimate selection.










In 2017 we have decided to move further with this and now have Oliver Turner on the WHS Committee, Tobey Watkins on the Finance Committee, Laura Towell on the GAT team, Lauren Commins and Josh Andrijich on the Numeracy team. The students at Quakers Hill



are the key stakeholders and it is our goal to place them at the centre of all school-based decision making so that they may see the value in their own voice and recognise our commitment to creating active and interested citizens.

Further to this, on Thursday 16 March, Mr Daghel and Mr Tomlinson took Lauren Commins and Josh Andrijich of Year 8 to the *Cultivating Cultures of Ex-*

cellence Seminar at the Epping Club. The overall goal of the conference is to work with schools on 'bumping up' their middle band NAPLAN results and to further promote visible student learning and student voice. Working together; Messrs Daghel and Tomlinson, Lauren and Josh have outlined an action research learning project that they will be presenting back at the conference in September.



#### **EXECUTIVE CONFERENCE**

On March 17 and 18 the Executive Conference took place at the Novotel Parramatta. This year the sessions included a valuable presentation called 'Accidental Counselling' delivered by a highly experienced Lifeline Counsellor. Although some elements were confronting, the presenter was wise and led the team through a range of practical role plays and question and answer sessions.

Other sessions included providing stronger, more future-focussed feedback, using Google Classroom to strengthen teaching and learning, using the 5P Planning Process for the next school planning cycle, another session on using questions and suggestions to frame feedback and a final session on evaluating the concluding cycle of the school plan as we move towards developing the next round of strategic directions. Friday night involved some team building activities around learning and creating. The weekend was meticulously planned and organised by Mrs Beaty Maricic and all attendees were highly appreciative of her outstanding efforts. Thank you also to Mrs Claus and Mrs O'Connor (College Principal) who spent the day at QHHS to support staff and students in the absence of the executive.





#### **CARPARK**

In the last contact I discussed the visit to the school of a Road Safety Officer and Traffic Engineer from Blacktown Council. Their suggestions have now been discussed in full with the P&C, the Work, Health and Safety Committee and School Executive with staff input.

Essentially it is the suggestion of the council that we lock the school gates at 2.45 and leave them closed until 3.15. The benefits of this are as follows:

- multiple cars will not be entering/exiting the staff car park at a time when students are walking through it thereby improving student safety
- multiple cars will not be driving in different directions around the staff car park therefore inhibiting traffic movement and endangering themselves and other drivers
- traffic will move more quickly from Lalor Road onto Grady Road/ Quakers Hill Parkway when only one set of traffic (from 7-11) is entering Lalor Road

To further expedite this, the RMS has been contacted about reducing the wait time at Quakers Hill Parkway lights so that cars are not backed up into Lalor Road.

Please remember that students are to be collected in the turning bay area provided at the end of Lalor Road. Arrangements can be made in some specific individual circumstances where injury necessitates alternative arrangements.

I know that this will annoy some parents who may question our thinking. Please understand that our only thoughts in this are to keep our children safe.

By the time this edition goes to print we will have trialled closing the gates (2.45 to 3.15) in the last three days of Term 1. This will then be evaluated in consultation with the school community.

#### **TERM 2 STAFFING**

There are going to be some significant changes in our staffing for Term 2. Most of these involve staff going on long service leave, accepting transfers and/or taking temporary roles. The most significant changes are that Ms Selina Fensom has accepted a service transfer to Cambridge Park High School as of Term 2. She will be replaced in the short term by Ms Rachel Pirovic. Mr Michael Brooks, our HT Teaching/Learning Technology, has been selected to undertake a significant IT role with the DoE and his role will be undertaken in Term 2 by Mr Geoff Dacey. Mrs

Maricic will be on LSL for Term 2 and her role will be undertaken by Mrs Karen Critchley whose role will in turn be filled by Mrs Shelley Asgar. Various other staff taking short term leave will be covered by some of our long term temporary and/or casual staff. We recognise that some students do struggle with these sorts of changes but every effort has been made to ensure that disruptions are minimal and student learning and wellbeing remain at the forefront of all decision making.

The loss of Mr Brooks and Ms Fensom is a significant one – though we may yet get Mr Brooks back. Both have demonstrated commitment to the staff and students of QHHS via the many varied roles they have undertaken and through their determination to see their students connect, thrive and succeed. We wish them both well for the future and we are sure that both will continue to be successful quality practitioners whether their practice is in the classroom or not.

#### **CONTACT NEWSLETTER**

In a recent Facebook post I discussed that at a recent extended executive meeting we looked at ways that we could streamline our communication systems and target our audience more effectively. #### SAFE, RESPECTFUL & TOLERANT BEHAVIOUR

Regardless of how your child travels to and from school every day, the expectation is that students will follow the SMART code at all times. Whether they travel by public transport, walk or ride a bike/scooter students are asked to be SAFE, RESPECTFUL and TOLERANT at all times.

If a student is found riding without a helmet, parents will be contacted and asked to come and collect their child and the bike/scooter from school. Students who misbehave on the bus or train could risk losing their Opal card. This will be a huge inconvenience to families as some students depend on public transport to get to and from school.

#### **FEES**

#### NUMERACY

This term all roll call classes have participated in activities to improve Numeracy outcomes. The students completed a pre-test, 3 lessons and then a post-test to assess their progress. Teachers have all been trained in Newman's Error Analysis as a strategy to help students become confident problem solvers. We look forward to all teachers becoming confident users of this technique.

#### UNIFORM

With daylight saving ending and the holiday period upon us, please take the opportunity to consolidate what your child needs to be ready for the cooler weather. The uniform shop is open on Monday morning in Week 1 of Term 2 and I encourage you all to get in quick while stock is available. A reminder that students can only wear their sports uniform on a Wednesday and that the school trackpants are the only trackpants allowed on that day. Full school uniform is expected every other day.

#### PARENT TEACHER NIGHT

Thank you to all the Parents and Carers who came to the Parent Teacher Night on Tuesday 4 April. It was an extremely positive night and it was wonderful to see the rich conversation that was had. 



#### **CAPA FACULTY NEWS**

As the first term comes to a close, creative arts reflects on a successful and productive start to the year. As with all years, the start of 2017 in Creative Arts was an organised flurry of new projects and works being initiated.

Year 7 students in music have just concluded their unit on the instruments of the orchestra and creating musical instruments from recyclable materials as part of their sustainability project. Year 8 students have recently completed their unit on Popular Music experiencing the large differences between the differing styles. Year 7 Art students have continued their studies of the Elements of Design with students in Year 8 continuing to work on their masks in class from the unit Rites, Rituals and Traditions. #### STUDY SKILLS FOR APRIL

#### **CARROT OR STICK?**

#### Are you a 'carrot' or a 'stick' person?

Knowing whether you are motivated by avoiding pain and the pressure of consequences or by achieving pleasure and rewards can help you (and your parents) work out the best way for you to be motivated to do your work for school.

The concept comes from the idea that to make a donkey move forward you can either tempt it with a carrot (a reward) or threaten it with a stick (a punishment).



Now we are not saying that you are a donkey! But we are saying that different things motivate different people.

You are likely to be more of a 'carrot' person if you:

- tend to be focused on achieving goals
- make lots of plans and lists for yourself
- find the concepts of rewards and prizes very motivating often have a clear picture of what you want to achieve

You are likely to be more of a 'stick' person if you:

- tend to leave things to the last minute
- put off unpleasant tasks
- prefer to do things when you 'feel' like it rather than when you plan it like the idea of rewards but aren't keen on doing the work to achieve them

If you are a 'carrot' person, you can get yourself motivated to do the work by breaking down the task, setting targets and goals and making plans. The thought of getting a good mark or achieving a prize is very motivating for you. Your parents can motivate you further by offering rewards for achievements!

If you are a 'stick' person, you find it harder to get yourself motivated to do the work. You are more likely to work when you focus on the consequences of NOT working. When you are putting things off, spend a minute or so brainstorming all of the outcomes if you do not get started on the work. Then decide the first 3 most important things for you to do. Don't worry about the rest at this stage, just focus on the top 3.

For parents of 'stick' children, these students may often require more micro-management. Students may need help in determining what they are going to work on, and parents may need to then check in every half hour or so to ensure students are staying on task. These

students will be more motivated by negative consequences such as removal of technology or other privileges if outlined working conditions are not met. However it is a good idea to always balance the introduction of consequences for not doing the work with rewards for doing it! This may not be the driving force for their motivation, but positive reinforcement for doing the right thing can lead to really good outcomes.

For students who get frustrated with themselves being 'stick' people and leaving things until the last minute, you can start to move towards becoming more of a 'carrot' person. Identify some of your 'carrot' friends, and start to model their behaviour. Ask if you can plan the work together and check in regularly with each so you stay on track. It is possible to switch from one modality to another! However no-one can make you do it, you need to want to change and then you need to work towards switching your mindset.

#### **ENGLISH FACULTY**

Students have completed their English assessment tasks for Term 1 in all year groups. Well done!

Early next term teachers will be helping students prepare for their half yearly examinations by revising the content and skills they will be assessed on.

#### **Half Yearly Examinations:**

**Year 7** will be completing a <u>reading comprehension task and a writing task</u>

**Year 8** will be completing a <u>reading comprehension and creative writing task</u>

Years 9 and 10 will complete a reading comprehension task and an extended response

Each year group will also begin a new unit of work, with Year 7 looking at poetry with a focus on poetic language, forms and features. Year 8 and 9 will begin a novel study with a focus on characterisation. Year 10 will commence a unit on Macbeth with a focus on power and visual representation.

#### Measles outbreak in western Sydney

There is currently an outbreak of measles in South Western and Western Sydney, with at least 9 people having acquired the disease in the region during March 2017.

The reported cases include children and infants who have attended childcare centres and secondary schools. There is potential for the measles outbreak to spread further as the infected young people have large social networks both within and outside of their schools, and some have travelled on public transport whilst infectious. Measles is highly infectious and anyone who isn't vaccinated is at risk of infection if they have had contact with an infectious case.

Immunisation is effective in preventing measles. It is important for everyone to ensure that they have received at least two doses of measles containing vaccine (MMR). Infants and young children are vaccinated with measles containing vaccine at 12 months and 18 months of age. Older children and adults born during or after 1966 should ensure that they have been vaccinated with two doses of vaccine. Unless people are certain they have had two doses of measles vaccine, they should visit their GP as soon as possible for free measles vaccination.

The first sign of measles is usually a high fever, a runny nose, cough, and red, watery eyes. The rash usually starts on the face and upper neck and spreads over the body, hands and feet. The rash lasts for 4-7 days.

People with measles symptoms should seek medical advice as soon as possible phoning the emergency department or GP beforehand, stay home from work or school, and limit other activities to avoid exposing other vulnerable people, such as infants, to the infection.



#### A snap shot of students in Science this term

#### Year 7

Year 7 students started this term with the *Welcome to Science* unit with much excitement and enthusiasm. The anticipation of being able to light the Bunsen burner on their own and gain their licence was at the forefront of all of their minds! Above is a student taking the test, demonstrating the safe lighting of the Bunsen burner.





Year 7 students took on the role of being 'scientists', learning about the different branches of science, analysing safety issues, identifying equipment and how to write practical reports. These skills were put to the test when each student undertook their investigative task, of choice, presenting their evidence and findings as a video recording and a written report.

Year 8



As part of their assessment task for this term, Year 8 students created models of simple compounds showing the elements they are made of and the way these molecules join together. During Wweeks 6-9, the Science staffroom was full of brightly coloured Styrofoam balls carefully assembled and labelled, representing the molecular structure of different compounds. The students are congratulated for the effort they have shown in completing this task.

#### Years 9 & 10



Year 9 students busied themselves with the *Survival, and Keeping it under Control* units of work. A joint assessment task with the English and Geography faculty allowed students to appreciate the relevance of learning across the KLAs. They focused on the biomes of the world, its connectedness to Australia, as well as raising awareness of how we can sustain these ecosystems. A closer look at the sheep's brain facilitated an understanding of how we stayed coordinated in our actions and thinking.

Year 10 students studied the chemistry section of the stage, undertaking practical lessons to simulate the effects of the various types of chemical reactions and its impacts. A take home task on acid-base identification of household products and an in-class assessment on scientific practical reporting writing skills were tested this term.



'Embrace' is a compelling novel about a girl's struggle with her destiny, determined from birth and ultimately unchangeable. Violet's struggles are relatable and readers are able to ride the roller coaster of emotions with her; confusion, doubt, guilt, anger, sadness, pain, heartbreak, acceptance, loneliness, love, achievement and loss. The story keeps you guessing with the addition of new characters, new problems and blood pumping action. The book is written really well, showing how Violet is coping with her new life and the changes it makes to her relationships and life aspirations. This thought provoking book puts you in her shoes and allows you to feel empathy for her position, but also excitement and anticipation for what lies ahead of you.

I would recommend this book to fans of action or romance who don't mind a little fictitious content. I usually don't read books in the fantasy genre, but 'Embrace' is written in such a way that you forget you are reading about angels and can instead focus on the plot, characters and action. The four sequels to 'Embrace'; Enticed, Endless, Emblaze and Empower are equally as irresistible and satisfying, so I highly recommend you read those as well. Other books by Jessica Shirvington, such as the Disruption series and 'Between the Lives', are also great reads. I give this book a well-deserved five stars!




### The Golden Door - By Emily Rodda

Katniss and Peeta have had a double win at The Hunger Games, leaving the Capitol as the joke of the Panem. President Snow has his eye on Katniss, making her feel trapped in her own home and as the 75th anniversary of The Hunger Games (Quarter Quell) arrives, each of the victors from the past games are elected to go to the arena one more time. She can't make a

false move or else everything she has and loves is gone. President Snow says he knows how Katniss really feels about Peeta, and that she sneaks into the woods on Sundays with Gale. In the arena her team makes a plan, however Peeta and other victors are picked up by the Capitol, she learns the truth about District 13, and she becomes the Mockingjay.

I would recommend this book to teenagers, young adults and adults. If they have read the "Divergent" series, they would enjoy the series also.
