ASSESSMENT TASKS

Teachers are in the process of handing out the first of the assessment tasks for this year. Students have been reminded to listen very carefully to their instructions, make sure they keep all the information related to the tasks where it can be easily found, and most importantly, ask questions if they do not understand. We use assessment tasks to make a judgement on how well students understand the work covered in class and to see the rate at which their skills are developing. I would encourage all parents and carers to discuss upcoming assessment tasks with their children and assist with the organisation process as needed.

YEAR 7 MEET AND GREET EVENING

It was wonderful to see a large number of Year 7 parents at our Meet and Greet Evening on Monday this week. Senior Constable John Bollard from Riverstone Police spoke at great length on practical strategies for parents to protect their children on line. This was viewed by those present as an extremely valuable experience. The evening also involved Head Teachers introducing their staff to parents as well as a brief set of reminders of key dates and processes for the year. Our staff were very well represented on the night and were able to speak with parents at the barbecue afterwards. 

For 2019, the SRC has chosen four charities to raise funds for. These charities are:


- The National Breast Cancer Foundation

School Opal Card

As part of our campaign against fare evasion, and our on-going commitment to provide the level of service needed to transport students to and from your school, Busways conducts regular checks of School Opal card.

All students must be in possession of a valid Opal card or pay a fare.

Students in possession of an Opal card must also tap on/off with their card when boarding our buses.

This is important, because the Opal data collected determines the level of service we are able to provide to your school. If students don't tap on and off, the services will appear underutilised and may be considered for cancellation based on low passenger numbers.
