SMART reminders



All members of the Quakers Hill High School community know that we are a SMART school. However, every now and then we feel it is important to revisit the SMART expectations with our students. They know what SMART means but often they forget what it stands for. While all behaviours are important, we feel that being Respectful ensures that all else can happen. When a student has respect for:

- themselves and others
- their belongings and others' belongings
- the environment

regardless of where they are, they can be safe, motivated, academic and tolerant. I'm sure we have all heard the saying "Good manners don't cost anything, but mean everything". If you are seeing this at home could you share this message in support of what we are doing at school. There will be a focus at our next student address about students being more respectful in the way they interact with others including when they come to the office. Speaking politely and being respectful when they enter the office will go a long way to getting a positive outcome.

Opal cards

Some students are travelling on the bus without an Opal card. If your child has lost or damaged their Opal card, it is important to go online and replace it. The bus drivers have also requested that we remind our students to tap on and tap off. This records the number of students who use the service. If our numbers get low, they will stop some of the buses that come to the school.

Uniform Reminders

In our last newsletter there was a reminder to all parents about the school uniform. We understand that the weather has turned cold this week and we encourage our students to wear the winter uniform. We have spoken to many students this week about wearing hoodies and trackpants and then their joggers instead of the black leather shoes. If any family requires assistance, please contact us so we can discuss your needs. I have added the email that was sent out to all parents this week.

Good afternoon, Parents and Caregivers,

Winter is upon us and we can certainly feel it in the air today, thus I wanted to send out a quick email as a reminder about school uniform.

Hoodies and tracksuits pants, irrespective of colour, are not permitted as school uniform. Any time a student wears a hoodie it will be confiscated and replaced with either a jumper or a jacket from the wellbeing store. Students are allowed to wear long sleeved white undershirts underneath the white polo shirts and they can wear scarves and woollen beanies also for additional warmth – though these need to be in school colours.

Boys are encouraged to wear the school pants or they are allowed to purchase navy blue dress pants.

Girls are encouraged to wear the school pants in cold weather or they may choose to wear navy blue tights under their skirt.

A reminder that shoes must be black leather shoes - this is a state-wide requirement for work, health, and safety (WHS) reasons.

We realise that uniform comes at a cost and we are always ready to work with parents to provide clean, second-hand uniform where available or assist in the purchase of new uniform.

Remember that the uniform shop is open on Monday mornings from 8am and on Wednesday afternoons from 3pm.

We believe that our uniform is an attractive one and our students look very smart and professional when wearing it; moreover, we work closely with the P&C to ensure uniform is a priority for our school community. Whenever we go on excursions or providers attend our school, people always comment on how good our students look in their uniform.

Please support us and your child by ensuring your child is wearing uniform to school each day.

BELL SIGNALS SYSTEM

There are various bell signals which tell students and staff what to do.

SINGLE RING indicates the start of the day, end of lessons or breaks and the end of the day.

TWO RINGS indicate an assembly in the quadrangle has been called. All students and staff should assemble in the quad as quickly as possible.

THREE RINGS indicate that the oval is closed due to extreme heat or rain. Undercover walkways become in-bounds for that break.

WHOOP SOUND indicates that an evacuation is necessary. Students and staff must evacuate the buildings and assemble on the oval.

DOORBELL SOUND indicates a lockdown is required. All students and staff must remain in the buildings, close and lock all doors and wait for the all clear (which is two rings calling everyone to the
