Community Connect

In Term 2 we held our first two Community Connect sessions. The first session focused on Stage 4 Assessment Protocols and we explained how assessment works, how to assist students with their assessment tasks, how to apply for extensions, how to submit a misadventure form and so on. The second Community Connect explored Student Wellbeing with a focus on how we manage negative interactions between students and bullying behaviours. Both of these sessions have been recorded and are available on the QHHS Website. 72 parents attended our first session and over 30 attended the second session.

In Term 2 we are looking to have two more Community Connects. One on attendance and a second one delivered by Dr Kristy Goodwin who is an expert in teen technology use. The school delivered ones will continue to run via Zoom on a Tuesday evening from 7pm in order to support attendance.

Staff Development Day Activities

On the first day back for staff we spent a substantial amount of time engaging in professional development focused on our strategic improvement plan goals. Staff had sessions on Numeracy in the classroom, Cold Call Questioning, Attendance and Wellbeing. These areas, combined with embedding technology into effective teaching and learning and literacy development, are all areas of focus for us and staff are working to improve their knowledge, understanding and practice so that all students can improve their achievement. I would like to thank Ms Lawson-Cohen, Mr Daghel and Mr Kantek for their leadership of these initiatives and for the quality sessions that they provided on the day.

Covid Positive and Close Contact Reminders

Reminders of close contact isolation requirements.

- You must notify the school if your child has been identified as a close contact and is intending to return to school.
- Your child should conduct a daily rapid antigen test (RAT) and receive a negative result each morning before attending school for 5 subsequent school days as part of your personal responsibility to minimise the risk of transmission. Your child must also wear a mask indoors for those 5 days.
- Students and staff in SSPs or support classes or utilise assisted transport who are identified as close contacts must not attend school during this time.
- In line with these changes, students with health conditions should speak with their treating medical practitioner or specialist to review their health support plan or COVID-19 action plan and speak with the school around any local considerations.

To support these measures, RATs were handed out to students on Tuesday and we continue to provide masks for those students who wish to wear them in class.

STUDY SKILLS TIP FOR MAY STARTING TO WRITE AN ASSIGNMENT

When helping students with assignments, the focus is often just on the research process. These tips will focus on getting started with the writing.

CHECK REQUIREMENTS

So you have done all your research, collected the information you will need and are ready to start writing your assignment. Before you begin, revisit the requirements, format and criteria for the task. Be very clear on what the assignment is asking you to do and any guidelines you have been given for the assignment. If you are unsure at all, check with



your teacher. It can be good to have the assignment questions written on an index card that you keep next to you while working so you stay focused on answering the question and meeting the requirements.

PLAN A STRUCTURE

Your approach will vary depending on the style of your assignment (e.g. essay, speech, presentation or report) but regardless of this, unless it is explicitly given to you, you need to decide the structure of your assignment. Have you determined the main points, the headings, and subheadings? Have you made sure you have gathered information about all parts of the question? Have you found any diagrams, images, photos, quotes needed to reinforce any points? Before you begin the writing, create a structure for your work listing all of the headings and sub-headings you will write about. Keep checking back with the criteria or requirements to ensure you are answering the assignment questions.

JUST START WRITING

The best thing to do if you have no idea how to begin your writing, is to just start writing. Now this may sound a little strange, but many students do not start writing because they want what they write to be perfect or 'right' the first time. Don't worry whether your writing is up to standard at this stage. Instead concentrate on getting your ideas down onto paper or screen. Choose a section and start putting down ideas on the sorts of things you could include in that section. The hardest part of any writing is starting. Once you start putting down ideas this generates other ideas and before you know it you have some text to work with. So even if you have no idea where to start just write or type 'I don't know what to include here' and even writing this will get your subconscious thinking about what could be included.

USE YOUR NOTES

Once you have started, you can use your notes from the research you did to build your ideas and arguments for your assignment. This mean that you integrate your own thoughts and ideas with the research you have done using this to help support your ideas. Make sure that you reference correctly, this means that when you use materials you have researched, particularly quotes, you make it clear where this material has been sourced from. You may find holes in your research as you progress and have to then do additional research about those areas.

BE CREATIVE


Unlike an essay, you generally have a bit more scope in how you present an assignment. Think about how you can bring the material to life for the reader. Photos (appropriately referenced) are a good start and sometimes diagrams, tables, examples, statistics or flowcharts may be appropriate. You might use lists, bullet points or colour to make the material more user-friendly. Your teacher will be reviewing many assignments on the same topic, so what can you do to make yours stand out or have a unique angle.

REVIEW AND REVIEW AGAIN

Have you ever had that experience where you write something, leave it, come back the next day and read it again and find a whole heap of errors you didn't see the first time? This is why it is important to space out your work on your assignment over a number of weeks and days. You need time to edit your work and you need space between edits. When you come back with a fresh eye, you will be able to look at your work from a different perspective and get ideas on what you could do to improve your work. As you review your work, look for spelling and grammar errors, possible repetition or unclear areas. Reading your work out loud is surprisingly a great way of locating errors or things that don't make sense.

BELL SIGNALS SYSTEM

There are various bell signals which tell students and staff what to do.

SINGLE RING indicates the start of the day, end of lessons or breaks and the end of the day.

TWO RINGS indicate an assembly in the quadrangle has been called. All students and staff should assemble in the quad as quickly as possible.

THREE RINGS indicate that the oval is closed due to extreme heat or rain. Undercover walkways become in-bounds for that break.

WHOOP SOUND indicates that an evacuation is necessary. Students and staff must evacuate the buildings and assemble on the oval.

DOORBELL SOUND indicates a lockdown is required. All students and staff must remain in the buildings, close and lock all doors and wait for the all clear (which is two rings calling everyone to the
