### FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Carers, Students, and Members of Our School Community,

As we reach the half-way point of Term 4, it has been a very busy time for our students and staff.

Last week, our Year 12's finished their last HSC exams with Food Technology being the very last exam. I would like to congratulate all our Year 12 students, your hard work, perseverance, and commitment throughout this important year have been commendable, and we look forward to celebrating your achievements in the weeks ahead.



Over the past couple of weeks, we had the pleasure of recognising and celebrating two groups of staff at our school. Friday October 31<sup>st</sup> was World Teachers' Day, a special occasion to recognise the incredible work our teachers do each and every day. Teaching is a profession that goes far beyond the classroom — it is about inspiring curiosity, building confidence, and helping young people realise their potential. Our teachers at Seven Hills High School demonstrate unwavering dedication, creativity, and care in supporting our students' learning and wellbeing, and I am deeply proud of the work they do.

On Friday 7<sup>th</sup> November we also celebrated School Counsellor and School Psychologist Recognition Day. This is an opportunity to celebrate the invaluable contributions of our dedicated school counsellors and psychologists, Ms Myers, Mr Deljoie and Mr Sunga, our Senior Psychologist Education. Their work in supporting student wellbeing, guiding complex decision-making, and fostering a safe and supportive school environment is vital to the Seven Hills High School community. Though much of their work happens quietly behind the scenes, the impact is profound and far-reaching.

We have recently hosted two big events at our Vocational Innovation Centre (VIC). In week 3 we held the final of the Primary School Innovation Cup. This was our first year running the Innovation Cup and was the brainchild of Ms Matchett. The Innovation Cup is a unique competition for our local Year 6 primary school students and is designed to develop and showcase their General Capabilities and Work Enterprise skills. Last term we had six of our local Primary Schools compete including Quakers Hills PS, Lynwood Park PS, Doonside PS Marayong PS, Bert Oldfield PS, and Metella Road PS. All teams returned for the final and congratulations to Quakers Hills Public School who were crowned the inaugural winners of the Innovation Cup. A big thank you to Ms Matchett and all the staff that supported her in creating these amazing opportunities for our local primary schools.

#### SHHS NEWS | NOVEMBER 2025

Last week we hosted the MiniSkills competition also at the VIC. Miniskills is our version of the WorldSkills competition. WorldSkills is a global competition that promotes technical and vocational education and training and skills excellence through a series of competitions, advocacy, and skill development programs. Over the 3 days. Stage 6 students from across Western Sydney competed in various competitions testing their skills and knowledge against their classmates while being judged by experts from TAFE, Industry and the DoE. Competitions included Drainage, Business Services, Augmented Reality Welding, Electrotechnology and Health. Once again, a big thank you to all the staff for their involvement in what was a fantastic event and an incredible opportunity for our students.

Finally, I would like to inform you of some important changes to the school bell times that will take effect from the start of the 2026 school year. After careful consideration, we have adjusted the bell schedule to simplify the daily timetable. Key changes include:

- All class sessions will be of equal length, providing a consistent and balanced learning structure for students.
- Classes will now begin precisely on the hour or half hour, rather than a few minutes before or after, helping to create a clearer and more punctual routine.
- Lunch and recess breaks will be half an hour each, there will no longer be a Lunch 1 and Lunch 2
- Introduction of the Connect pastoral care program each morning.
- There will no longer be a late start on Wednesday (this is normally when staff professional learning would occur), the day will begin at 8.40am every day.
- Thursday will be an "Early Day" for all students with students dismissed at 2pm. These changes allow for staff professional learning to be moved from the Wednesday morning to Thursday afternoon, ensuring our staff have greater time to engage in development activities that ultimately benefit our students. Students who are unable to leave at 2pm due to reasons such as a parent's work schedule or needing to catch a school bus after 3pm will be supervised by teaching staff on this day until the usual finish time of 3pm.

Connect is a pastoral care program designed to support the well-being and personal growth of every student. Through regular small-group sessions, students build meaningful relationships with peers and caring staff, fostering a sense of belonging and community. Connect provides a safe space for students to explore social, emotional, and academic challenges, develop resilience, and enhance their communication and problem-solving skills. By promoting positive connections and wellbeing, the program helps students thrive both inside and outside the classroom.

We believe that these improvements will enhance both teaching and learning experiences across the school. We will continue to communicate these changes in the lead up to the end of the year via the usual channels. Further details about the Connect pastoral care program will be shared with you all in the coming weeks. ### **EMERGENCY PROCEDURES**

**On-Site Emergency/Evacuation:** One continuous escalating siren and PA announcement

**Lockdown Procedure:** Intermittent (Woop Woop) Bell 10 seconds and PA announcement, and Intermittent (Woop Woop) Bell again

**Lockout Procedure:** Announcement over PA and telephone system

### **Accessing School Systems while Overseas**

The NSW Department of Education is changing the way students access school systems. From the start of Term 4 2025, students will be blocked by default from accessing any department system including things like their school email, the student portal, or online learning platforms from outside of Australia or using a virtual private network (VPN).

# The change will better protect student privacy and the reputation of the department

This is a new policy to help protect student's privacy and reduce cyber security risks for the Department of Education. We need to make sure our systems are as safe as they can be.

# Do not use a virtual private network (VPN) to access department systems

VPNs can resemble unapproved overseas access or mirror cyber-criminal activity, where it might be used to create the appearance of being inside Australia. Students are not permitted use any remote access tool or VPN to access department data.

Any student who uses a VPN at school or home to access department data will be blocked by default and may have their account scrambled or locked.

#### What if my child is away on extended family leave?

We understand that some students may need to travel overseas for extended family leave. If this is the case for your child, the school can grant them an exemption to the new rule to make sure they can continue their learning. Please note if your child is on a family holiday or extended leave there is no expectation that the school will provide any new classwork whilst overseas.

To apply for an exemption, parent or carers can send a request to the school's general email address. Once approved, your child will be able to access their school systems for the dates of their approved leave.




### **Inclusive Education**


Students also competed for Halloween candy in a Spooky Halloween trivia contest based on the library's horror novel collection. An enjoyable day was had by all.

We can't wait to welcome all schools back for an even bigger challenge in 2026!



Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope this message finds you well.

I am writing to kindly remind all members of our school community about the importance of maintaining safe and orderly traffic conditions around our school during pick-up times. It has come to our attention that some parents have been double parking in the bus bay outside our Vocational Innovation Centre on Johnson Ave while waiting to pick up students at the conclusion of the school day.

Double parking and picking up students in this area not only causes traffic congestion but also creates significant safety risks for our students, families, and other road users. The driveway to the Vocational Innovation Centre is often completely blocked by cars waiting to pick up students, stopping deliveries and our school bus from entering or leaving the Vocational Innovation Centre.

To ensure the safety of everyone and to keep traffic flowing smoothly, we ask that parents avoid double parking and picking up in this location.

For your convenience, we recommend using the following alternative pick-up locations which are safer and less congested, see map on the following the page:
