

Our students were fortunate to have a range of universities, colleges and employee representatives provide workshops and an expo to support them explore the diverse opportunities available to them. I would like to thank our school's Engagement Team for their work in coordinating Seminar Day 2.

This week Year 12 2025 will commence their Higher School Certificate Examinations – and we wish them the very best during this period of time and hope that their hard works pays off. A reminder to students to let the Presiding Office and either Danielle, Leah or myself know of any concerns during the examinations. As discussed at a year meeting in the last week of Term 4, the illness and misadventure process for the Higher School Certificate Examinations moves away from our procedures, with students required to complete the NESA paper work as explained to students by Danielle.

Year 11 (or Year 12 2026) will commence their final year of schooling this term. We have a small number of new students starting Year 12 at St Marys Senior High School, and we welcome them and their families to our school community. There will be some room changes to allow for the Higher School Certificate Examinations to take place. These have been communicated to students. Access to other parts of the school will be limited due to the examinations to support students to achieve their best. This will include the basketball courts.

Our enrolment evenings for Year 11 2026 will take place in Week 1. As existing students know, this is an enormous event as we try to enrol 500 students into courses for their senior years. Thank you in advance to everyone involved for attending this event. These are long nights, but they are vital to assist students and their families in the transition to St Marys Senior High School.

## Changes to bell times - 2026

I need to inform you about important curriculum changes that will be implemented from 2026, which will slightly alter the structure of our school day. These changes have been introduced to provide additional teaching time and better support student achievement of learning outcomes. We will be returning to a seven-line timetable structure, with a transition period throughout 2026 to ensure a smooth adjustment for students and staff. The Year 11 Mentor Program will be delivered through a series of five Seminar Days, spread across Years 11 and 12, allowing for focussed and meaningful engagement. The school day will commence at 8.20am and conclude at 2.40pm each day, except for Tuesdays when the day will finish at 4.00pm. This adjustment responds to the challenges schools have faced in completing the Year 11 Preliminary Course, particularly following an increase in the number of school development days. I would also like to sincerely thank staff and the School Council for their valuable feedback during the consultation period, which has helped shape these improvements. We will be closely monitoring and evaluating the impact of these changes



throughout 2026 to ensure they meet the needs of our students and continue to enhance their learning experience.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge and congratulate one of our non-teaching staff, Rebecca Zinghini who received an award as part of the Executive Director Public Schools Recognition Program. Rebecca is our Business Manager but will leave St Marys Senior High School at the end of the week to take on a new challenge within the Health and Safety Directorate of the Department of Education. We wish Rebecca all the best in her new role and congratulate her on her award.

## **School Attendance**

One of the most important elements of success at school, especially during the years focused on the Higher School Certificate, is regular school attendance.

Research clearly shows that consistently attending school has countless benefits – from learning, to creating social connections and improving wellbeing through access to support and quality education.

Any absences from school accumulate quickly – for example:

- Missing one day of school a fortnight equates to missing five weeks of learning for a Year 12 student.
- Missing five minutes of class, three times every day of the week equates to missing one period of learning each week.

The NSW Department of Education expects that every student attends between 95% and 100% of the school year. Students are required to attend school every day, whether it's the first or last day of the term, Mondays, Fridays or days dedicated to sports carnivals, school excursions and incursions.



In the interests of students spending as much possible time in class, **students no longer need to sign in late or sign out early from the Administration Office.** This saves them valuable time which can be spent learning in classrooms. That is, from Day 1 Term 4:

- A student who arrives late to school reports straight to their class and asks their teacher to record their lateness on the class roll.
- A student who needs to leave school early and will miss a lesson should see the Administration Team before school for an early leaver's pass, supported by a note or email from their parent/carer explaining the reason for the absence.

If a student is absent from school, parents/carers need to let our Administration Team know why as soon as possible, even if it's just a few minutes at the start or end of the school day.

There will be times when a student is unable to be at school, like when they are unwell. Medical appointments should take place outside school hours where possible, and family holidays should be taken in term breaks.

If a period of leave needs to be taken, forms to apply for leave should be sought from the relevant Deputy Principal at least two weeks prior to the start of the proposed leave period. If school-based assessment tasks which are test-like are scheduled for the proposed time period, the leave is not likely to be granted as per our school's assessment policy. The details of assessment tasks can be found in the school assessment booklets provided to students and available on the calendar on our school website.

Thank you to all in our school community for partnering with us to ensure students access the extensive benefits of regular school attendance.

#### Your personal exam timetable

Your personal exam timetable is available from studentsonline. nesa.nsw.edu.au. This timetable lists your written exams and where you will sit for them (usually at your school). It also lists any other exams you are entered for, including oral exams for languages, performance exams and submitted works. Details of your performance exams or projects such as title of work or category (supplied by your school) are also available via Students Online. If you are undertaking oral or performance exams, we will post the time and venue on Students Online later this year. If there are errors or omissions in the exams you are entered for, contact your school immediately to supply us with the correct information. Take special care if you are entered for a VET course that has an HSC exam. If the exam does not appear on your personal timetable, you have not been entered for it. You must be entered separately for the exam if you expect to sit for it.

### Preparing for your exams

When preparing for your exams, find out what to expect in the exam room and the exam paper, including where to write your answers. For each course you are studying, know the rules and requirements, and what to expect in each exam. All equipment you bring is subject to inspection on entry. Make sure any equipment you are allowed to bring, such as a calculator, is in good working order because an appeal under misadventure provisions for equipment failure will not be upheld.

# Major Works Support Program, Year 12 2026

As our Year 11 students 2025 transition into Year 12 2026, there will be a number of students who realise that they have two (or more) major projects to complete as part of their Higher School Certificate studies. These works are significant school-based projects or practical assessments and allow students to showcase their skills and knowledge, contributing a substantial part of the relevant subject's final mark. These projects vary in their type and occur in a range of different courses. For example, the work can be practical, like a Visual Arts body of work, or theory based, like a Personal Interest Project in Society and Culture.

Our Stage 6 subject specialist teachers provide invaluable guidance and support to students in each subject area – but we recognise that students with multiple major works may need additional support in managing the demands of these projects over the coming months. Isidro Alfonso, our Student Support Officer (Relieving) will send students with two or more major projects an email in the first week of Term 4, offering support with time management and organisation. We encourage students to take up this opportunity to help them to effectively manage the demands of their Year 12 studies and optimise their overall performance in the Higher School Certificate.
