PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

With the introduction of "technology" high schools into our education system, people often ask about the significance of the word "technical" in our school name, Sydney Technical High School.

The answer can be found in the first S.T.H.S. Journal (1916) which includes an address delivered by the Chief Inspector of Schools, Mr. J. Dawson, when the school was opened. Mr. Dawson said that "the task of the Sydney Technical High School is to train youths, from the age of thirteen, for the industries and professions of engineering, architecture, draftsmanship, science, chemical technology and other professions to which mathematics, science and drawing are fundamental".

For many years this was a satisfactory description of the type of education this school provided. It trained youths for the technical industries and professions. But is it true today? I don't believe so. Subjects such as History, Geography, Economics,

Languages, Art and Music all today enjoy equal importance with Mathematics and Science. English, which always has been compulsory, is recognised as being very important no matter what career a student embarks upon.

The school no longer gives priority to any one subject over another. We seek excellence in all areas, in the belief that every subject is important and warrants the best of our abilities.

Our name remains Sydney Technical High School and none of us would want that to change - but let us understand that the name is historical and no longer signifies an education biased towards the technical areas.

The school now provides an education appropriate for students proceeding onto a wide range of careers. The spread of S.T.H.S. "old boys" across all major professions is evidence of this.



MUSIC DEPARTMENT

GENERAL REPORT

This year has been one of consolidation of the Music Department's Programs and one which has highlighted the strength of activities and the ability and achievement of our students. There is a wide range of musical opportunities available to students of this school.

The normal Curriculum activities of the Department are designed to facilitate the realisation of potential of all our students from those beginning in Year 7 to those who have distinguished themselves through a high standard of musical and academic achievement. These activities have been supported by the maintenance and provision of equipment to enable the highest quality of presentation of Music Education possible for students. Additions to the general equipment in the music rooms have included:

(i) Television and Hi-Fi Video (ii) Stereo equipment and Compact Discs

(iii) Specialist equipment, instruments and music for the performing ensembles of the school (iv) Computer equipment. These and other facilities can only be provided given a solid base of support from the school and its administration personnel and the parental organisations of the school - particularly the "Music Support Group".

Some of this equipment was also purchased through a successful application to the Met. East Regional Office for a special "Music Room Equipment Grant". As a result we now have quality reproduction in both music rooms. It has enabled a comprehensive and integrated system of media electronics with the resultant advantages to classroom music.

Many favourable comments have been passed by students on both the quality and clarity of reproduction. This quality and clarity is not only desirable, but inherently necessary in teaching courses that utilize major listening components and aim to train aural awareness.

Students have taken great interest in using this equipment in their free time and will undoubtedly become more skilled in their music endeavours.

Senior students have particularly benefited from this upgrading of resources due to demands of their course.

The Midi Interface has been purchased to allow the running of recently purchased composing and performing software. These programs are designed for the Apple Macintosh and make experimentation, the exploring of possible options, the working of difficult manipulation in composing and performance easier to negotiate and evaluate. It is hoped this equipment will engender a greater interest in composition and resultant ensemble performance.

The search for further worthwhile software and electronic equipment is now taking place and this will be a major growth area for the Faculty.

Year 7 students and Elective Music students have gained from their involvement in the 1989 Musica Viva Performance Project which provides for them a first hand experience of professional musicians who visit the school and present educational programs through performance of music of various styles.

In keeping with the philosophy of the Music Department in encouraging musical performance at all levels of our music education programs, Year 7 participated in our annual "Open Rehearsal" along with the School Bands. They presented to their parents a selection of choral items "in rehearsal". It was envisaged also that this would be a "learning experience" for their parents as well. Elective music students are trained further in this skill of live musical performance through a series of **Performance Evenings** presented throughout the year to their parents, relatives and classmates. In the years that this Program has been operational we have seen a steady improvement in performance ability and confidence.

EDUCATION WEEK

Because of the profile and standard of Music at S.T.H.S. our performing ensembles each year are requested to participate in a variety of community activities designed to present music education to the public. Our students have again brought great credit to themselves and the school through their performances. This year our ensembles featured in:

- (i) District "Opening" of Education Week Stage Band
- (ii) "Education Day" at the Hurstville Civic Centre Concert and Stage Bands
- (iii) Regional "Education Day" at Martin Plaza members of the Regional Concert Band.

REGIONAL FESTIVAL

All of the members of our performing ensembles as well as our Elective Music students participated in the 1989 Regional Festival, held in the Sydney Town Hall. This is a very large presentation of State School Music of the Met. East Region, to the general public. Our boys were involved in the various levels of "Workshop Bands" (Elementary, Intermediate, Advanced) as well as the Combined Choir and Regional Band. Particular mention should be made of Matthew Orlovich (Year 12, 1988) and Matthew Radzyner (Year 12, 1989) who represented the school through their performance of Matthew Orlovich's original composition "Opal Blue", which was submitted for assessment in the 1989 H.S.C. Examination. We are all very proud of the amazing compositional and performance skill of these two boys and take some satisfaction in the knowledge that their achievement has been assisted by the music education programs of this school. Both boys also performed at the Invitational "Director's Evening" designed for the performance of superior standard items of Year 12 students.

TRAINING BAND

There have again been important changes to the organisation of the Training Band in 1989. As the standard of the Concert Band improves, so it places more pressure on Training Band members to achieve higher pre-requisite standards before gaining entry to the main ensemble. There has been the loss of some instrumentalists this year unable to provide enough time and commitment to this activity to justify the continual use of a school instrument. This realisation is often a disappointment to the students concerned, although all prospective instrumentalists are forewarned of the discipline and determination necessary to progress in this activity. Unfortunately there cannot be any such thing as a 'casual' instrumentalist in this program.

It is pleasing to report though, that there is now a strong group of players that are displaying the necessary qualities and seem likely to advance to the Concert Band by the end of 1989 or the beginning of the 1990 school year. This year will witness the loss of many longstanding senior members in the Concert Band and therefore vacancies will need to be filled throughout 1990.

Band members have been asked to purchase a new band tutor this year in the hope it may cover any deficiencies that have existed in their current standard of playing. Although detailed documents have been distributed by the school on the availability and type of support material necessary for a beginning instrumentalist, some students are still relying totally on material from school. The school has neither the funds nor resources to accommodate this demand and therefore a student's progress will be severely retarded. All students are advised to remain active in their pursuit of new stimulus material.

A series of small concerts is planned for Term IV this year concluding with a major performance for Speech Night. It is worth reminding students once again that the Training Band is exactly that, **training** students for the main ensemble. It **should not** be seen as an end in itself. Six to twelve months should be maximum time spent in this group.

We feel confident that the current group will produce some fine instrumentalists in the years to come and hope they are rewarded as much as those players who are now leaving after many years' valuable service to the instrumental program.

Thursday August 17th - Morning Concert - Afternoon Concert Friday August 18th - Return to Sydney - Arrive 6.00 p.m.






PUBLIC SPEAKING REPORT




I.S.C.F. REPORT

We were the first non-graded year; i.e. classes were arranged alphabetically not by results - we were to remain ungraded in most subjects until after Year 8. We had the benefits of multiple languages in Year 7, to try them all out before the selection of electives in Year 8. We also had the benefit of trying out many different sports in Year 7. Then there was the Bi-centennial - 1988. I won't bore you with a reiteration of last year's traumas - suffice it to say that the winds of change were still blowing strongly! 1989 carried on from 1988 with more disharmony, new "initiatives" (the fair discipline code - the Carrick Report - and so on). We were asked to accept more and more changes to the established tenets of secondary education in N.S.W. At least the mass confusion etc had a positive effect - there was a noticeable pulling together by all members of the school community to do all they could to minimise the disruptive effect on the pupils.

My heartfelt thanks to the executive; Mr. Alan Walker, Mr. Bill Tyson, Mrs. June Leach, Mr. Wal Whittaker, Mr. Ian McFarlane and Mrs. Toni Plunkett, for their untiring efforts and assistance throughout the year. There, a student lurched, his dazed face soaked with blood. Everywhere, the bodies fell, how many still unknown, while fires flared, signalling the dawn of China's uncertain world.

Amidst this chaos a lone man stood implausibly resolute in his thin white shirt, an unknown Chinese facing down a lumbering column of tanks. "Why are you here?" he shouted at the silent steel hulk. "You have done nothing but create misery. My city is in chaos because of you." That brief encounter between man and tank captured an epochal event in the lives of 1.1 billion Chinese: the state clanking with menace, halted by the people getting in its way, since it got in theirs.

The seven week-long student protest in Tiananmen Square hit with the impact of a revelation. Its climax a stern reminder of the most ominous and fundamental of all of Marxism's contradictions: the one between people power and the power that Mao Zedong said comes from the barrel of a gun. So it seemed it was not the peaceful democracy protests but rather the massacre on the square which succeeded it that was the unnatural act. It was the party's attempt to reimpose order that brought chaos to the world's most populous nation.

Questions remain abundant - Who was in charge? Would soldiers of the <u>People's</u> Liberation Army fight one another? Had the yearning for political change been snuffed out or merely suspended? What next for an anguished nation?

VISUAL ARTS DEPARTMENT

It was once stated that "The personal nature of art is related to two factors - the source of the subject matter and the manner in which the design is developed". During 1989, the Art Department has been actively involved in a number of activities which were planned to supplement the personal experiences of the art students. As a result, these contributed to the enhancement of their art making.

During March, a combined Visual Arts/Music excursion for all Year 7 and elective students to a performance titled, 'Hello' provided students the necessary stimulus for the creation of their own art works. This excursion also included a visit to a small exhibition of H.S.C. art works at The Rocks.

Other excursions include a visit by all Elective Art Students to Lewers Gallery, Penrith, to view a selection of H.S.C. major works; to Lydham House (a local Georgian style house); to the Art Gallery of N.S.W. and to various local churches near our school.

The Art Department has also been actively involved with the setting up of art exhibitions for the School Parent/Teacher Nights and the highly successful exhibition of our own 1989 Year 12 H.S.C. art works. 

The award carries a prize of \$1000 for the winning student and \$300 for the runner-up.

For art teachers the prizes are \$3000 for winner and \$400 for runner-up.





MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

It is always gratifying for a teacher to see students tackling a challenge with enthusiasm, so I can easily say that 1989 has been a gratifying year.

Among the many challenges our students have taken up this year, have been the J.L.Williams Prize Competition, the I.B.M./University of N.S.W. Mathematics Competition, the Canberra C.A.E. Mathematics Day (Year 12), the Mathematics Olympiad, the Darling Downs Computer Competition and the Westpac Mathematics Competition.



SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Science is a subject much in demand enabling the school to offer a wide choice of Physics, Chemistry, Biology, and Geology in the Senior Years. An essential component of Science in the performance of practical work for which a good stock of essential apparatus and chemicals is available for regular student use. The fact that some of the equipment is quite old speaks praise of the way in which the boys handle their practical work.

The Science Department is building up stocks of a variety of reference books grouped into class sets. The teacher uses these books in class where appropriate, guiding students to seek information and to compile their own notes on a segment of a topic. Students then gain proficiency in simple research and library skills. The eventual aim is that background reading in Science will become a habit rather than an exception.

In the context of developing talented students, participation in state wide competitions has been actively encouraged. Very commendable results have been obtained in the National Chemistry Competition and the Australian School Science Competition. Cash awards for being placed in the top 1% of the state were won by:

LIBRARY

Our major aim this year has been to prepare the library for automation. Eventually all public school libraries in N.S.W. will be provided with the OASIS Library System. The Education Department is providing the software for the library, but the school at this stage must provide the hardware.

Our first priority will be to convert our traditional card catalogue records to OASIS. The complete conversion will require years (not weeks), for in a school library we cannot close down or get in extra help to complete the task, but must fit in automating the library with running it for students at the same time. However, it is hoped that by the end of the year there will be sufficient records - all new materials plus a large section of the fiction collection - for students to begin using the system.

We believe it is essential for students of this school to begin using an automated system. Many will go on to tertiary institutions where such systems are used and card catalogues are a thing of the past. Also many public libraries, e.g. Hurstville, have become automated. More importantly an automated system allows students to find information etc. much more easily and successfully than a manual system. Often the first three letters of an author's name or a word from a title will find the wanted entry.

When all the resources have been entered the borrowing system will also be fully automated. Then it will be possible to know, not only that the library has a certain item but also whether or not it has been borrowed. The library staff is very enthusiastic about this new system and we believe that once the students are given the chance to use it, they will be equally enthusiastic.

INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY - ELECTRONICS

Eight candidates are presenting major works in Electronics for the H.S.C. this year. A variety of skills and talents have been demonstrated with some very ambitious projects nearing completion. They will do well.

Three of the six boys who left the course at the end of Year 11 have carried their interest through into electrical trades apprenticeships.

The prospects for Industrial Technology in 1990 look very encouraging with eighteen boys in Year 11 this year, and enough interest from Year 10 to generate another class next year.

COMPUTER AIDED DRAWING/DESIGN (CAD)

In 1988 a group of our students and one of our Industrial Arts Teachers had the privilege of being involved in a joint TAFE Schools project, "The Workskill Olympics". This involved the loan of an IBM computer and a CAD package - AutoCad. It was this opportunity that launched Sydney Tech. into the real world of Computer Aided Drawing. Earlier this year the School purchased a similar computer enabling us to incorporate CAD into the regular Industrial Arts classes.

Computer Aided Drawing (or Drafting, or Design) is the production of Engineering, Architectural, Structural, Workshop, Cabinet drawings, all those that we label "Technical", with the aid of a computer. Many misconceptions arise when one begins to talk of CAD, some think that it is really only involved with playing games, others think that it means only the glossy three dimensional images that we see on TV programmes such as Towards 2000. The basis of CAD is that the graphic image is stored on a disc just as is a word processor document or a games programme. One of the benefits of this is that when alterations need to be made the file can be retrieved and updated without having to erase lines drawn on a piece of paper. Another major time saver is that commonly used features can be stored in a "library" and copied into any drawing and positioned or scaled to size as necessary. There are many other benefits which involve the computer doing some of the "thinking" for you making accurate work much simpler.

In recent years the Technical Drawing syllabus has been changed to address the changing needs of students and the changes in Industry and Technology. One of these changes has been to make some form of CAD compulsory in all lobes of Technical Drawing. Until this year we have not really been able to fully satisfy these changes. In 1989 both the students and teachers have benefitted from being able to keep somewhere near the forefront of technology in this field.

HISTORY DEPARTMENT

This has been a year of co-operation, change and growth for the History Department. We combined with the Language Department to stage an Ancient Day for all Year 7 students. They were given the opportunity to experience events which occurred in Ancient Greek and Roman times. They were able to fight as Greek soldiers at Marathon or Thermopylae, lug a Roman Legionary's equipment, dress as an ancient Briton, Greek hoplite or Roman Legionary and re-enact an event which did occur in the past. During an "entertainment" in the Colosseum, Emperor Caligula, alias Mr. R. Morgan, made some very serious life and death decisions for which the relevant victims were most grateful.

We were fortunate to be able to have Peter Lee return to show Year 8 the delights, trials and tribulations of living in medieval times. Our "Ancient and Medieval Day" for them was a great success for these students dressed up as characters from the past and experienced many activities common to the period. Mock battles saw much enthusiastic participation and long bow and cross bows were used without injury to others.





Finally, I would like to thank the History Staff for their co-operation, professionalism and enthusiasm.


































SOCIAL SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The Social Sciences Department during 1989 experienced many changes with the introduction of the new Geography Syllabus in Year 12 for the first time and the introduction of the new Economics Syllabus in Year 11. New Syllabi brings many new demands on staff, the need for and development of new resources and the time for staff to present these new syllabi to the student body in a meaningful manner. It is with much credit, dedication and hard work that the teachers of these Senior classes have responded to the challenge. The Junior School saw a further consolidation and once again Social Sciences proved to be a popular faculty with numerous subjects being offered.

Fieldwork is still an important part of the Social Science curriculum with most of the major excursions running again this year. Social Sciences at Tech continued to be characterised by some very fine achievements - in the 1988 H.S.C. Geography had the highest 2U mean scaled mark of all subjects in the school and 2U Economics the third highest mean scaled mark (excluding 3U/4U marks).

Being environmentally aware many of the Social Science Staff under the guidence of Mr. Roper have continued to develop the "Rainforest Area". Our thanks go to Mr. Roper for the many plants, trees, ferns etc he has generously donated.

Finally, I would like to express my appreciation to my staff for their continued commitment, cooperation and their professional approach throughout the year. 
