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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

2004 has been a terrific year for the school. Success has been enjoyed by groups of students and teachers, as well as wonderful individual achievements. Our HSC results were among the best of the past decade with twelve students winning Premier's Awards for All-round Excellence. Nine students were also awarded scholarships for their tertiary studies at UNSW, University of Sydney and the University of Technology.

The school has remained at the forefront of education for gifted and talented students. The Interdisciplinary Project, now in its fifth year, is recognised as an exemplar in enrichment and extension for gifted students. Selected for publication in support materials of the Department of Education and Training's revised Policy for Gifted and Talented Students, the Interdisciplinary Project is recognised for the higher order skills it develops in students. Other projects offered as part of the school's curriculum such as the Year 9 Autonomous Project, single subject acceleration (in subjects such as Studies of Religion, Engineering Studies, Design and Technology, Information Processes and Technology, Modern History and Mathematics) ensure that our gifted and talented students are challenged and motivated. Peter Heath, Head Teacher History and GAT coordinator has led the significant shifts in pedagogy at the school and is recognised as a leader in this field.

Other initiatives for students in 2004 have been a talented musician camp (supported by Music Support Group and teachers), debate coaching and UTS on-line debating.

There have been some outstanding individual performances in 2004. These include Simon Chiu (Year 11) who represented Australia at Intel International Science and Engineering Fair held in the USA, winning the bronze medal in the chemistry competition for his outstanding research, Nick Andrianakos (U16 national shotput champion and second in U18), Nick Kipriotis (3rd in national U20 and U18 shotput), prize winners in UNSW Sustainable Living Competition and Andrew Vonthethoff of Year 12 2003 who was awarded one of the prestigious Federal Government Australian Student Prizes.

My thanks to staff for their support and nurturing of your sons. Many staff spend many hours outside of school time to ensure that the boys are coached, encouraged and supported. We often speak at Tech about the "ways we do things around here", the actions, words and feelings that make Tech such a special place. School spirit and a positive culture are what sets Tech apart. Winning is not the be-all and end all, the important thing is to take part, to represent the school, to take risks and do your best. It's the relationships that exist between students and with the staff and the students, the mateship, the camaraderie, the respect, the sense of justice. This is why Sydney Tech is a great school.

At the start of the year I did not expect to be away from the school for almost two terms. Greg McNaught and Sam Dando have done a fantastic job as Principals while I was relieving as School Education Director, St George Area and then on long service leave. Thanks also to Paul Owens, Jo Wright, Peter Heath, Trevor Trotman, Tina Blake and Kevin Short who also relieved in higher positions and ensured that the good work of the school continued.

Thanks to parents, especially those who support the school through their good work as members of the P & C Association, the canteen volunteers, Music Support Group, Debating Support Group, and the uniform shop.

Education is something that everyone seems to feel they know something about and often claim to be an expert in. After all, everyone went to school and everyone has school stories to tell. "I remember when I was at school we had to ..." or "we had this crazy bloke who..."

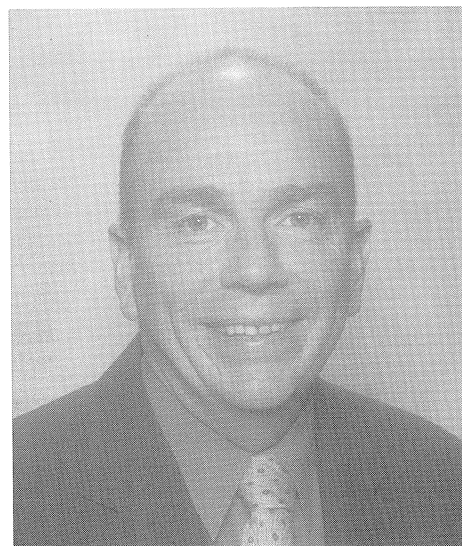
Our reputation has gone before us and continues to be held high.

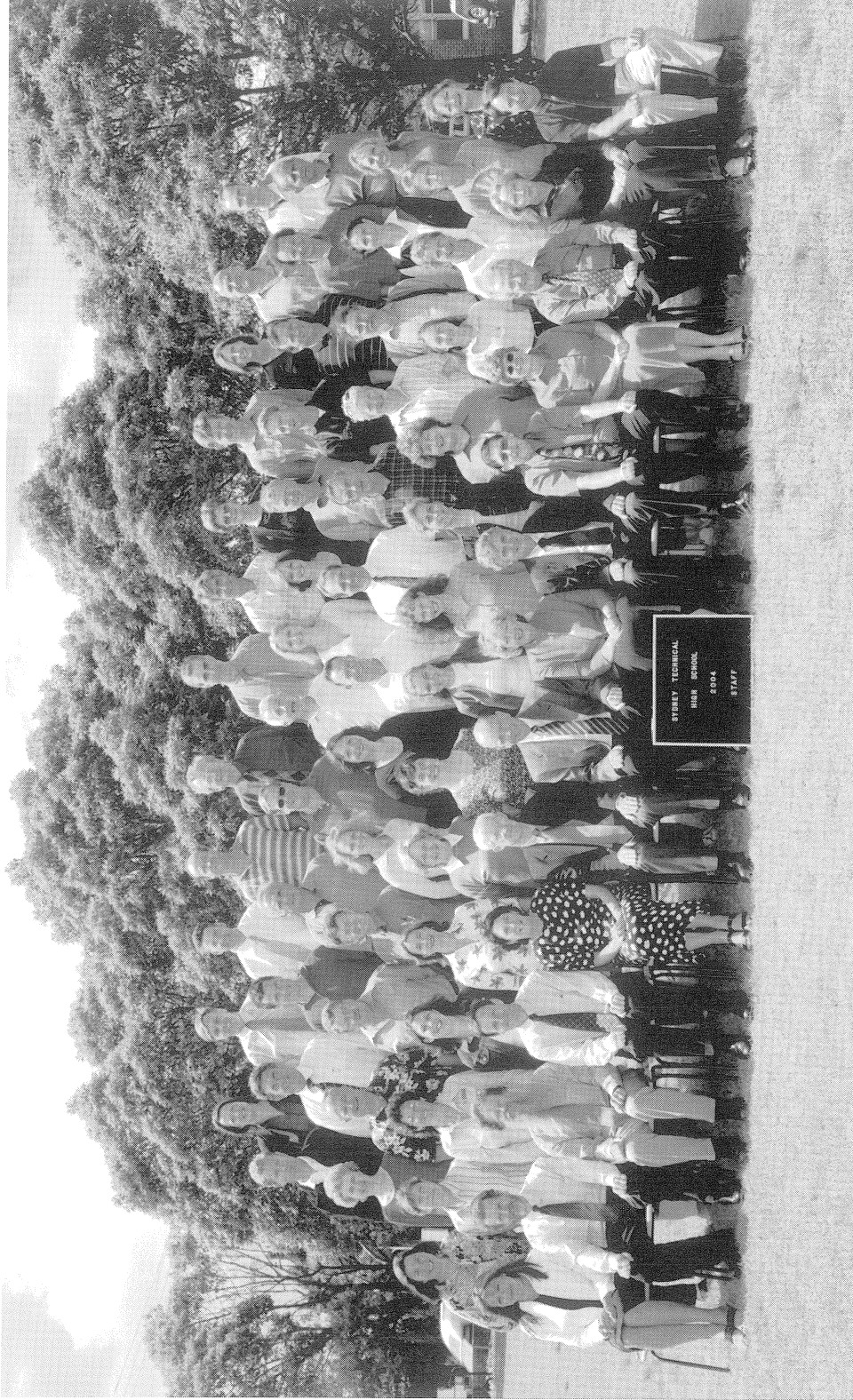

SPEECH NIGHT RECOGNISES STUDENT SUCCESS

Speech night once again highlighted the achievements of our students during 2003. On 12 March we were pleased to welcome back Mr Bob Outterside AO, retired Principal of Sydney Boys High School and an old boy of this school, to give the address and present the special prizes. Dr Phil Lambert, recently appointed Director of Education for Sydney Region, also presented prizes to Year 12.

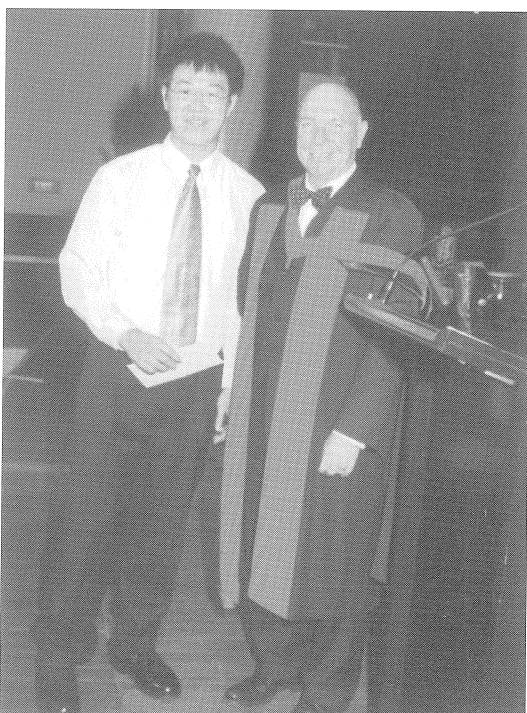
A remarkable 101 students earned Band 6 results (90% or more in a subject), with 266 mentions in total.

Each year the Board of Studies presents The Premier's Awards for Excellence. These awards are presented to students who score 90 marks or more for at least 10 units of study. These students represent the very best of the year's HSC candidates. For their results in the 2003 HSC twelve students received Premier's Awards. They were: Warren Ang, Andy Chan, Thomas Chan, Sam Fanous (fifth in the state in Modern History) , Ben Lau, Simon Lee, Tommy Lim, Eugene Lubarsky, Peter Myat, Michael Shehata, Andrew Vonthethoff (fourth in the state in Engineering Studies) and Colin Zhou.

Six students were successful in gaining scholarships. They were: George Andrianakos, John Hilberts, Edwin Ho, Young Ha Lee, Andrew Vonthethoff and Aaron Waters.

From information supplied by students, nineteen scored a UAI of over 99, 99 scored over 90 and 127 scored over 80. University destinations included UNSW 51, Sydney University 32, UTS 27 and Macquarie 10.

We are justly proud of the achievements of our boys.

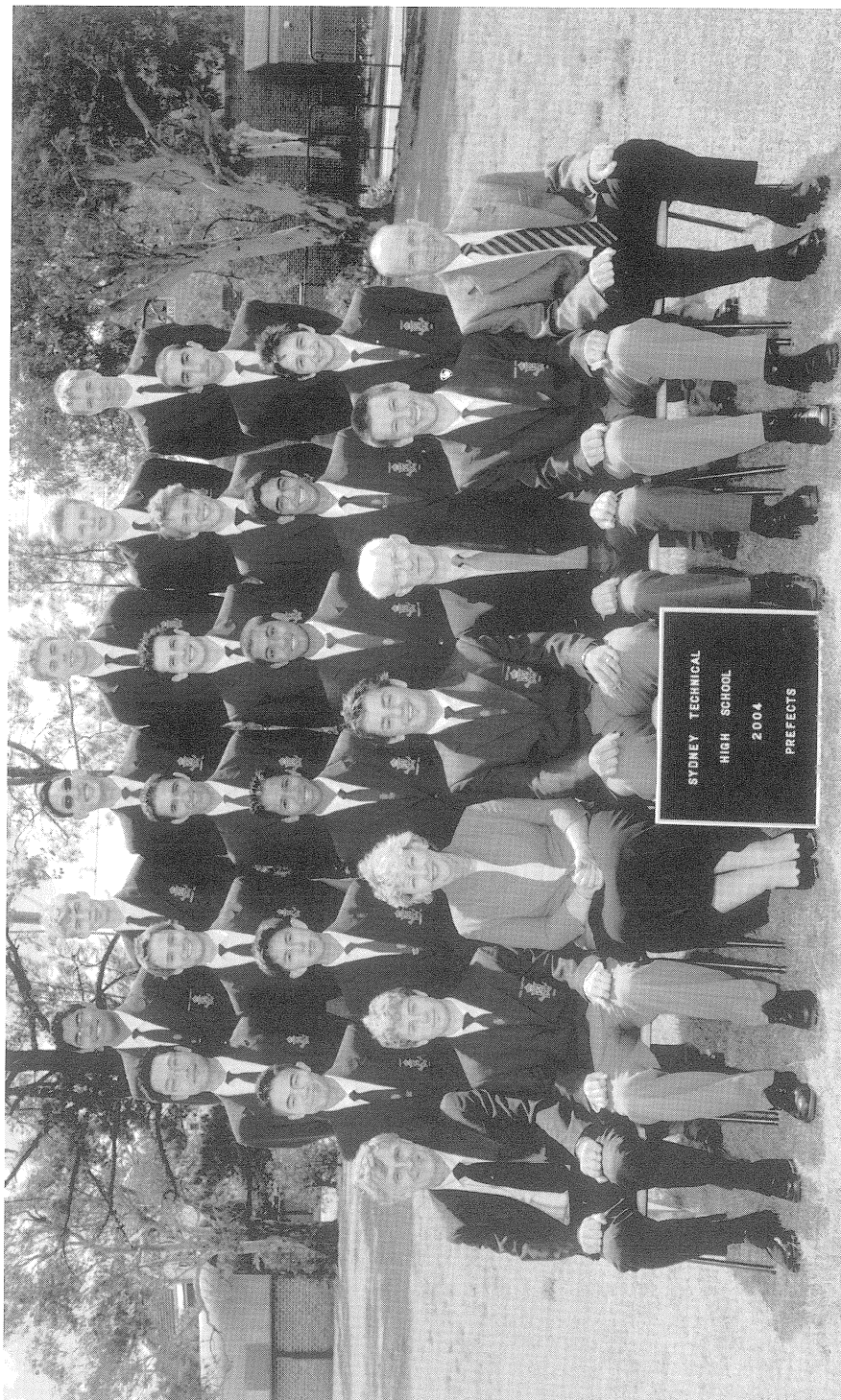

ENDURING CONNECTIONS WITH OUR PAST

The school recognises the importance of maintaining connections with past students and celebrating the history of the school stretching back to 1911. Ex-students are excellent role models for our current students and the school's history is further enriched. For the past three years we have played a far more active role in old boys' functions, attending annual reunions and inviting many ex-students to official school functions.

Anzac Day

2004 was the third occasion that students from 1940s-1960s have been our guests at the annual Anzac Day assembly. In 2004 seventy-five attended, including the organisers of the 1940-1950s group: Ken Henstock, John Booth and Keith Free.

The day began with the signing of the visitors book (donated by Fifth Year 1958) and a chance to meet up with old friends. The ceremony commenced with a procession of past students to the strains of the school song (first sung in 1926) into the auditorium for the Anzac Assembly. This year the theme, ***Our Boys Our Anzacs***, was particularly poignant. This moving presentation paid tribute to the boys and teachers of the school who served Australia at Gallipoli and on the Western Front during World War I. We are fortunate indeed to have such a wonderful collection of archival material and we were able to use the actual photographs of these men and the words from school journals 1916-1919 to personalise the presentation. Three current students represented student soldiers. At the conclusion of the ceremony, our visitors enjoyed morning tea with the school staff and prefects, followed by tours of the school conducted by Year 10 students. A very special thank you to Peter Heath, Head Teacher History for making this year's ceremony so memorable.

Annual Reunion Lunch for 1930s -1950s Old Boys

For over fifty years the ex-students from the 1930s and 40s, and now the 1950s group, have met annually for lunch. The Principal and Deputy Principals have been fortunate enough to be their guests. For the past two years the current school captain, vice captain and senior prefect have also been invited and these students have addressed the one hundred ex-students in attendance. This is a lovely fusion of the past with the present and gives our current students an insight into the affection in which the school is held.

At the 2003 luncheon the guest speaker was Keith Free AOM, school captain 1947, who regaled the group with stories from his school days and from his illustrious career as a bookmaker and President of City Tattersall's Club.

Hall of Fame

In 2003 the school launched the Hall of Fame project. Successful and prominent ex-students were invited to submit a photograph of themselves and a 200 word summary of their careers. The school has had these framed to provide a living record of role models for current students. In 2004 the first six were inducted - Arthur Buchan (1941; Assistant Director-General Department of Education in the 1970s), Emeritus Professor Maxwell Howell AO (1944; author, leader of sports history and education), Les Gock (1971; music publisher), Keith Free AOM (1947; past president City Tattersalls), Bob Outterside AO (1949; former principal of Sydney Boys High School; leader in education of gifted students) and Professor Mohamed Khadra (1978, Professor of Surgery Australian National University, Canberra). The framed photos and citations will adorn the walls of the corridor downstairs in A block . We look forward to the induction of more men into the Hall of Fame.



Reunions

In order to make the school more accessible for ex-students we have provided our facilities for reunions. In the past two years three very successful meetings have been held. Each year group is provided with tours of the school and archival records, conducted by the principal, Lynne Irvine and deputy principal, Sam Dando. Thank you to the students of 1971, 1972, and 1983 who have not only held their reunions here but have donated funds which have been used to build upon the displays of our proud history. The beautiful timber and glass display cases in the front foyer, the heritage corridor and the auditorium have been purchased with funds from reunions. We look forward to hosting more reunions and furthering the strong bond between the school and its former students.

Heritage Gallery

Visitors this year were able to view the school's new photographic collection from each of the school's sites as displayed in the administration corridor. The Ultimo collection features the very first prefects and head master, staff, examinations in 1914 and the first school tuck shop. The Paddington Collection commemorates the cultural life of the school, music, sporting and debating groups, along with photos of the Paddington buildings and playground. The Bexley Collection shows the current site during construction.



DR MAXWELL LEO HOWELL – DISTINGUISHED OLD BOY

Sydney Tech has produced both outstanding sportsmen and respected academics. Dr Maxwell Howell has uniquely combined both sport and academia.

Tech journals record, for the first time, young Maxwell Howell's name in 1941 for his achievement in junior long jump. His abilities in rugby and cricket were also noted early. He was selected for CHS rugby in 1943 and 1944. The journals describe him as "a most illusive and unorthodox player" and "a real inspiration to his team. A brilliant field and a fearless opening batsman." (1944). He was elected school captain in 1944.

Sport was a passion for Tech boys. Their unofficial motto was: "If study interferes with your sport, give up your study!" Young Maxwell did not follow this advice and left Tech with a first-class pass in English in the Leaving Certificate.

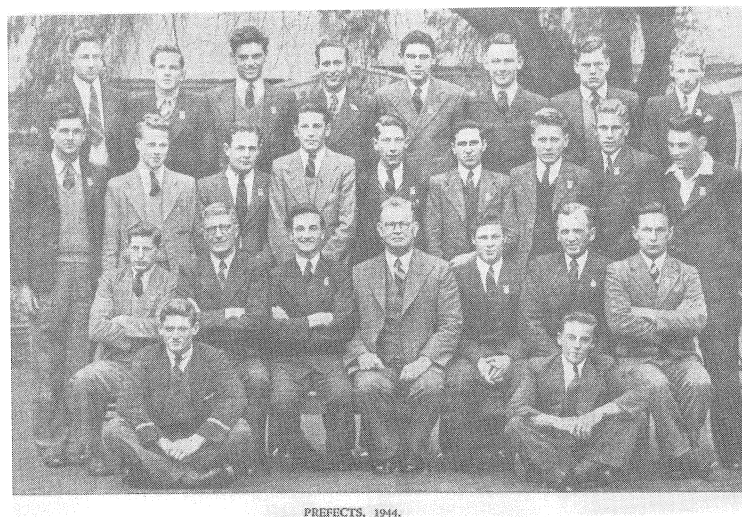
In subsequent years, Dr. Howell continued to combine sport and study. At the age of 19, he was selected in the Wallaby team which toured New Zealand. In 1947 he played against the All Blacks when they toured Australia, and was selected for the Wallaby team which toured the British Isles, France, Canada and the United States. Continuing with his studies, he gained a Diploma in Physical Education and then completed a BA at Sydney University. At the University of California, Berkeley, he gained an MA in 1952 and a Doctor of Education in Motor Learning and Educational Psychology in 1954.

Eventually, Dr Howell progressed to a full professorship at the University of Alberta and subsequently to San Diego State University. In 1979, he moved to the University of Ottawa where he was Director of Human Kinetics. Finally, he spent eleven years at the University of Queensland.

Professor Howell also found time to write over fifty books and three hundred research articles in physical education, health and the history of Australian sport. The awards and honors gained throughout his life, such as 'Officer of the Order of Australia' are too numerous to mention. He believes, however, that one of his finest achievements was marrying Dr Lingyu Xie. Dr Xie-Howell holds a Doctorate in Physical Education and has collaborated with his books since 1995.

School captain, outstanding sportsman and academic, Professor Howell has "been a real inspiration to his team" at Sydney Tech High.

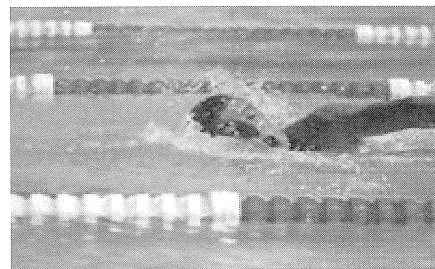

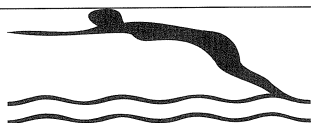

ENGLISH

Last year my theme was 'change'. For 2004 the theme is 'journeys' and once again the HSC is having an influence on my direction. Journeys can take many different forms, physical, spiritual or imaginative. Some may be momentary and others lengthy. However, it is the experiences along these journeys which have the greatest impact and provide the most worthwhile outcomes.

2004 has been a journey. Brief but valuable. Implementation of the new junior syllabus has occurred in Years 7 and 8. The programs we prepared in 2003 are up and running stimulating both critical and creative thinking. As we implement each new unit we are presented with even more challenges as once in practice we see countless learning experiences available in new texts across a range of mediums.

In Term 4 we will focus on the final draft of the new 9 – 10 programs which will be implemented next year. Already much planning and discussion has reflected on combinations of texts, author studies, inclusion of pre-twentieth texts as well as the latest developments in popular mediums like film and CD Rom.

Throughout 2004 we have also continued to engage our students and enrich their experiences through extracurricular activities. Students have attended performances of *Blithe Spirit*, *Amigos* and *The Miser* by the Sydney Theatre Company and *Twelfth Night* by Bell Shakespeare. Our most recent and most motivating experience was a video workshop by Colin Schumacher from Charles Sturt University who spent a day inspiring our Year 10 and 11 drama students and illustrating for them the intricacies of video making. Students were engaged with considering conceptualising their ideas and how to present them in an entertaining and technically progressive format.

Debating and public speaking initiatives continue to flourish. This year we have added the new Premier's Debating Challenge to our agenda. We have four teams participating and it has so far been an invaluable experience. Our continuing participation in such in-school, district and state-wide competitions provides many avenues for our students to articulate their thoughts and vent their passions and ideas in forums which are conducive to gifted learners.

HSC and SC results for our 2003 candidates were again exceptional, Students gained results well above state average in all courses offered for the HSC and the majority of our students achieved results in bands 5 and 6 for the School Certificate.

Special mention must be made of our English Extension 2 and Drama candidates. The major works produced were a tribute to their dedication and remarkable abilities both creative and critical. Some may think that writing is a feminine art or that the new syllabuses are feminised but the short (8,000 words!!) stories of the majority of our students proved otherwise. Their final products were indicative of their sensitivity, creativity and exceptional talent in the manipulation of narrative. Many embraced the freedom of postmodernism whilst others remained more traditional. Other project mediums selected included film, critical response, poetry and script writing. These works also reflected the talent and ability that are sometimes not able to be expressed in other courses. Our drama students also staged performances which were engaging and entertaining. The script 'The Lucky Country' by Sebastian Gimenez was selected for On Stage and performed by professional actors. Sebastian worked with the director so that his own rationale for how the play should be performed was embraced. The script was witty, topical and humorous and there was no doubt it deserved such an accolade. The major works of 2003 were the products of a valuable and worthwhile journey for each composer.

This year we have also welcomed two new faculty members. Ms Lynn Turnbull has been permanently appointed to the school and she imbues our faculty with rich experience in drama and theatre constantly finding new and creative ways to deliver syllabus content. Ms Debbie Coleman has joined us as a part time ESL teacher and she too is inspirational and dedicated. We welcome them both and hope their time at Tech is rewarding.

The year is drawing to a close and yet it feels like only a moment ago that I wrote the report for last year's journal. Life itself is one long journey and whether we measure it in years, months, days or minutes there never seems to be enough time. Once again I would like to thank all faculty members for their tireless dedication and goodwill, the boys whose passion for learning makes all our efforts worthwhile and the wider school community for their support.

MATHEMATICS

This year we welcomed to our ranks Ms Mikl who replaced Miss Goodman for two terms while she helped out as Maths Consultant at the district office of the DET. Ms Mikl is an experienced teacher who has been able to complement the diverse talents of the Mathematics Staff in a very pleasing way.

Sadly, our team of senior students was not able to win the University of Canberra's Mathematics Day Trophy. However, they maintained our status as a leading Sydney school and one which other Canberra schools know they have to seriously contend with. I would like to congratulate the Mathematics Day team for their fine effort and Mr Trotman for his willingness to give his time to help organise our team.

Again, our students performed extremely well in the 2003 Australian Mathematics Competition (2004 results are not available yet) with 5 students gaining cash prizes and over half of all participants gaining distinction awards (top 30% of the State) or better! Prize winners were: Bo Chen & Justin Cheong (Y8), John Xu (Y9), Brian Ip (Y10) and Adam Tran (Y11). Overall deserve the highest praise for their results.

Other Maths Competitions entered by our students gave them opportunity to achieve meritorious results: Harry Xiao (Y11) in the Annual UNSW Maths Comp., Stephen Mak (Y10), Minh Phan (Y9) and Kim Zhou (Y10) gained distinctions in the 2003 Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad (2004 results not available yet); Ning Song (Y9) gained a High Distinction for his work in the 2003 Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians (2004 results not available yet)

Our H.S.C. results for 2003 were again excellent with most students finding Maths was their best subject. Over 96% of our Extension 1 students were placed in the top two bands while the results for the other courses were 94% for Extension 2 and 73% for Mathematics (2 Unit). The percentage of Maths students who scored 90% or above in each course meant we were again strongly featured in the Sydney Morning Herald's list of top schools for Mathematics. This wonderful result is a tribute to the hard work of our students and the dedication of the Maths staff.

These results should encourage all students to work hard and not give up. Many of our students find, after years of patient, conscientious work, their H.S.C. results have finally rewarded them with the success they thought was beyond their reach.

To our departing Year 12, may I extend the best wishes of the Maths staff for a happy future.

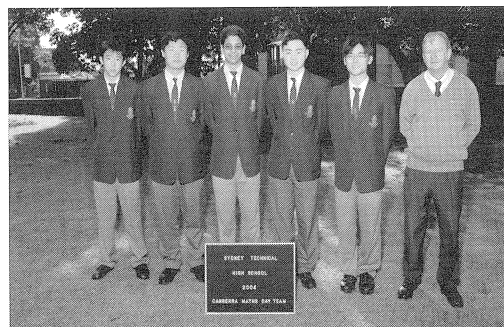
CANBERRA MATHS DAY

SCIENCE

At the end of February, Ann Stanford, our long serving laboratory manager, retired. We have been fortunate to obtain her services on a casual basis this year and so her valued association with Tech continues. Her name is now permanently associated with the medal presented for the best Science research project in Year 10 and each year Ann will present that medal to the winner on Speech Night. Mrs Kerry Joseph acted as temporary lab manager until our new manager, Mrs Soon Tee Lepherd was appointed in Term 2. Kerry achieved many wonderful changes to the way the labs ran in her time at the school. Mr Tony Hayes, who spent 2003 at Tech as a full time casual has been appointed full time to this position. Welcome to both Soon Tee and Tony.

The Science department has begun a two year program of junior program revisions as a response to revisions and deletions in the Board of Studies syllabi. The Quality Teaching project is also driving some of these changes. Its aim is to ensure that students achieve deep knowledge in their studies as well as develop skills and make connections between science and the world. Several inservice courses have provided valuable insights into implementing these new ideas.

The 2003 HSC results in Science subjects were of a very high standard. The variation between Tech and state results showed a very strong positive variation compared with the state: (Biology: +10.85 ;Chemistry: +12.12 ;Physics: +10.88). In addition 22.2% of Biology students, 21.3% of Chemistry students and 33.3% of Physics students achieved band 6 (90 or better). Our results were further supported by the very large numbers of students who achieved band 5 (80-89) results (55.5% Biology; 42.6% Chemistry; 41.2% Physics).

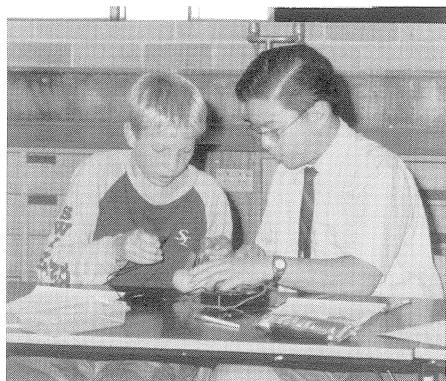
Tech students continue to perform exceptionally well in the School Certificate examination. In 2003, 24% of students in Year 10 were awarded Band 6 compared with the state average of 3 %. A further 66% of Tech students achieved band 5 compared with 25% in the state. Well done Year 10, 2003.

Year 10 students showed considerable originality in their choice and execution of a Science research project. The 2003 Year 10 Research Science joint winners were Simon Chiu and Dean Kaladelfos who were presented with their research medallions by Ann Stanford at Speech Night this year. The 2004 winner will be announced later in the year.

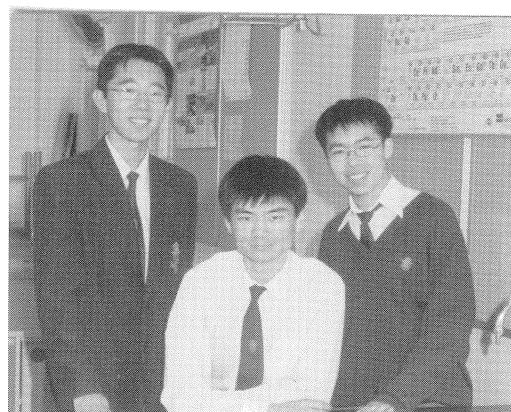
Simon Chiu of Year 11 travelled to Portland, Oregon, USA in May to attend the Intel Young Scientist world final. Simon's research on the chemistry of double salt crystals was selected by the Australian judges as worthy of being presented at the world competition. Simon was successful in winning a medal for third place in the Chemistry section. The judges, who included Nobel Prize winning scientists, were very impressed with Simon's research. Congratulations, Simon, on this well deserved award.

Four teams of Year 12 students and one team of Year 11 students participated in the regional Titration Competition at Sydney University in June. The year 11 team (Simon Chiu, Harry Xiao and Kim Zhou) came a close second in the regional competition and will proceed onto the finals later in the year.

Excursions continue to feature strongly in our teaching program. Some of the excursions included this year include: Year 7 studied vertebrate classification at Taronga Zoo in early Term 2. 8S Science undertook a Gifted and Talented incursion involving a series of investigations with the CSIRO *Labs on Legs* program and Year 9 visited the Powerhouse Museum and the Imax Theatre as part of their Astronomy program. They also investigated the marine ecology at Kurnell. Year 10 visited the Australian Museum to extend their studies on evolution. Year 12 Chemistry students extended their senior studies by performing a variety of practical activities in the Kickstart Science program over several days at Sydney University. Year 11 Biology conducted a field study at Homebush Bicentennial Park.

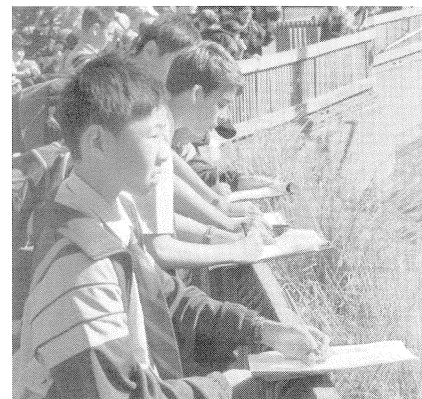

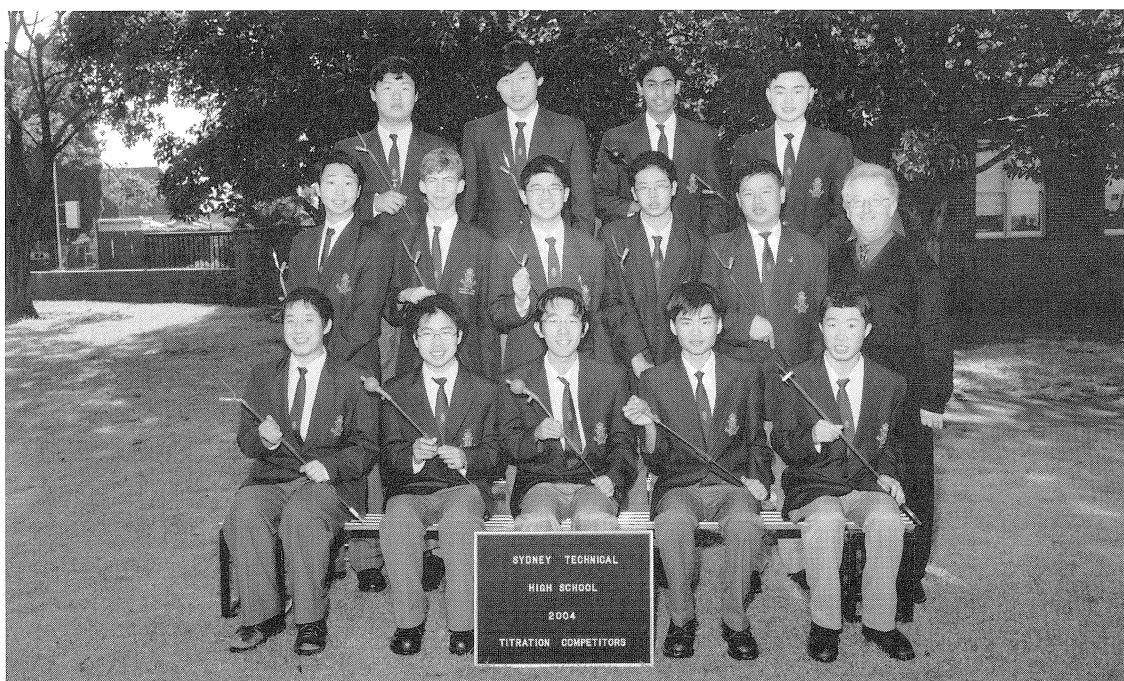

HISTORY

This year was the 90th anniversary of the outbreak of World War I – ‘the war to end all wars’. The school commemorated this important event in the school’s Anzac Day Ceremony in a presentation entitled: ‘Our Boys – Our Anzacs’ - a tribute to those Tech boys and teachers who fought in the Great War at Gallipoli and on the Western Front. The war broke out only two years after the founding of the school in Mary Ann Street, Ultimo in 1911 and the presentation focused on five individuals, three students, Eric Evans, Septimus Walker and Harry Maze, and two teachers, Charles Harrison and William Tonkin. The presentation followed their experiences through the war years and was accompanied by photos of the school, students and teachers of the time accompanied by readings from journal articles read by Blake Jones, James Ward and Robert West. The audience consisted of the school and invited guests, Old Boys from 1932 -1962. It was a memorable occasion for all. Thank you for all those staff and students who contributed.

Last year’s (2003) HSC results were especially pleasing. Modern History results were excellent with Sam Fanous gaining a mention on the merit list with 98% in Modern History and 49/50 in Extension History. Ancient History results were once again especially impressive with over 15% of students scoring above the state average and 75% in the top two bands. Congratulations go to our dux, David Ma. Legal Studies had 63% of the candidature in Bands 5 and 6 with an average well above the state mean. Warren Ang was dux. Studies of Religion, a 1 Unit accelerated course, consisting of both Year 11 and Year 12 students, results were also striking. 100% of students achieved results in the top two bands in the HSC. The dux was James Pearce. History results in the 2003 School Certificate Australian History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship Test showed a dramatic improvement over the previous year with the number of Band 6 students increasing to 25% (up by 300%) with 97% in the top three bands.

The Year 10 Interschool History Debating consisted of James Ward, Stephen Tan, Scott Robertson, Scott Janssen and Imran Haque. They successfully won debates against Penshurst Girls and International Grammar but went down to St George Girls debating the topic ‘That the Whitlam Government deserved to be dismissed’. Imteaz Ahmed, Eugene Lubarsky, Robert White and Justin Penafiel competed in the Model United Nations (MUNA) competition as South Africa and performed outstandingly. The annual school dig was once again carried out by a band of intrepid archaeologists from Mr Derwent’s Year 11 Ancient History class. The site was Wykham Paddock and students used the Wheeler-Kenyon method to discover what lay beneath the top soil and clay to unearth the wonders domestic life in early Bexley.

Year 9 World History studying Hitler and the Holocaust, accompanied by Mr Heath and Mr Short, visited the Jewish Museum. The testimony of our guide, Harry Fransem, who was a holocaust survivor, provided a sobering insight into the human experience and complimented our classroom studies of this dreadful period of history. In the words of Edmund Burke, ‘those who forget the past are condemned to repeat it’. James Adams’ Medieval Show once again allowed Year 8 History students to gain ‘hands on’ experience of life in the Middle Ages. Students discovered the ‘joys’ of punishment in the stocks, the power of the cross bow and the weight of a William Wallace’s sword. They dressed in medieval armour and engaged in mock battles to gain insights into the lives of people from the past.

The site study this year for Year 7 was the local area and students visited Hurstville Historical Society’s St George Museum in an investigation of twentieth century domestic life including a range of artifacts including old irons and washboards. This was followed by a visit to National Trust listed Gladwyn House. Class 7W travelled to the Nicholson Museum in Sydney University with Ms Newett which included a hands on examination of ancient artifacts and an exploration of the museum’s fascinating display of Egyptian, Greek and Roman exhibits.

2004 has proved to be another rewarding and enjoyable year. Thanks once again to my staff for their dedication, passion and professionalism. Remember, no history, no future!

SOCIAL SCIENCE

This year, 2004, faculty members have been busy working on programming for Stage 4 Geography and Stage 5 Commerce and Geography due for implementation in 2005. This has involved the development of new resources and learning activities that provide intellectual quality, technological skills and significance to the real world. They have also provided extra curricula activities, excursions and the opportunity for students to enter many state and Australia wide competitions this year which have provided an enriched curriculum for Social Science students.

The results in the Australian Geography competition were again extremely good with thirty eight students receiving high distinctions and three students in the top 0.2% of Australia. They were James Diment, Bijoy Joseph and Blake Robertson. At the time of writing other competition results have not been received.

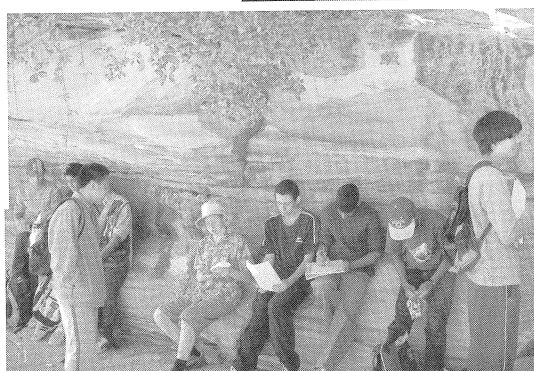
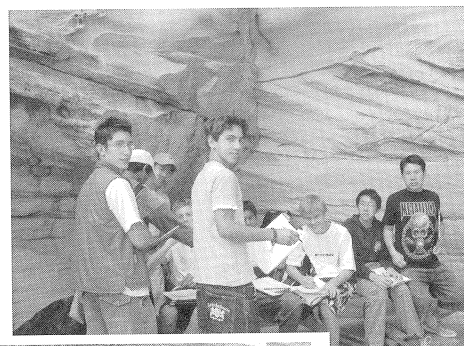
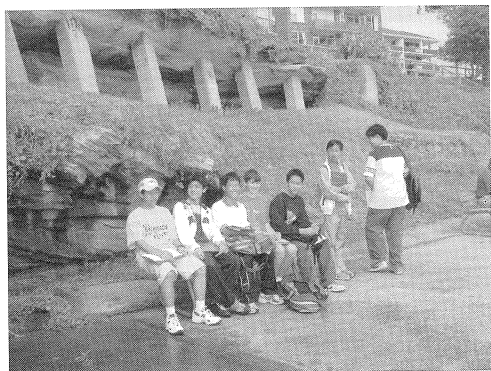
Last year we received some excellent results in the Sustainable Living Competition run by the University of NSW – this is a project with an interdisciplinary approach aimed at creating a solution to a real life environmental problem. Winston Yang, Richard Chung, Thomas Xu and James Xu won the Dean's award for the Built Environment for their project on Hurstville.

The 2003 HSC results were extremely pleasing. Business Studies students achieved an average mark of 82.4 which was eleven marks above state average and 77% of students were placed in bands 5&6. The average mark in Economics was 84 and 76% of students were placed in the top two bands. In Geography 89% of students were placed in the top two bands with an average mark of 84.3.

In the second year of state wide testing of Geography, Civics and Citizenship, Year 10 achieved outstanding results. 32.7% of students received band 6 which was the top 3.9% of the state. 83.3% were placed in the top two bands compared to 21.4% state wide.

The Year 10 Canberra excursion provided students with fieldwork crucial to their study of Commerce, History and Civics and I would like to thank the staff that supervised that overnight excursion. I would also like to acknowledge the work of the Social Science staff in providing opportunities for the students beyond the faculty area. They are involved in organising the SRC, Speech Night, on-line debating, TAFE courses and contribute to welfare activities such as year camps, study skills days and peer support.

CREATIVE ARTS

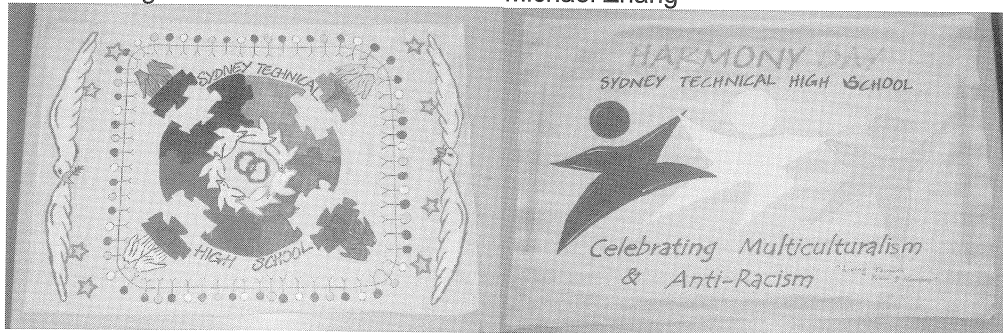

In conjunction with our existing part time linguists, Mrs Laylim and Mrs Cross, Ms Abson has coordinated Language activities this year, including preparing students for the Australian Language Certificate, organising a Japanese student visit and homestay and supervising Japanese assistants throughout the year. Our Music department has seen a flourish of performances this year, including school assemblies to encourage our new Year 7 students, Year 6 Open Day, Speech night, Musicale and several competition performances. Mr Towner (whose Music report follows) and Mr Owens have been ‘instrumental’ in nurturing this musical maelstrom, and have been ably assisted by Mr Gary Smith, who has covered Mr Owens’ leave.

He was replaced by two part-time teachers – Mr Alain Albert, a French native speaker who has certainly brought much enthusiasm to the Junior French classes, and Mrs Jan Webster who is well known to the students due to her regular contact with our department on a casual basis over many years. Both Mrs Kim Cross and Mrs Belinda Laylim remained as part-time teachers again this year.

This year in Year 12 we had students sitting for the HSC in Japanese Continuers, Japanese Extension and for the first time in many years, French Continuers and Beginners. A big thank you must go to Mrs. Cross who so willingly took on the role as senior French teacher and diligently worked on producing programs and much needed resources for the senior French course.

The 2003 HSC results were extremely pleasing with overall achievements above state average in all courses. Congratulations must go to all the boys for their hard work and effort throughout the year. Special mention needs to be made of Matthew Townsley who came first in Japanese Continuers and Extension, achieving the top band in both courses, and Hassan Salem who was first in the German Continuers course, also achieving a Band 6 in the HSC.

All students studying languages in Years 9 and 11 once again sat for the Australian Language Certificates in early August and we await some very pleasing results. In last year's competition our school achieved well above the average in both reading and listening skills. In February, Years 10 and 12 Japanese classes were used to trial test this year's certificates and Years 9 and 11 will trial test next year's certificates toward the end of the year.

The opportunity to converse with a native speaker is always beneficial to anyone learning a second language and our Japanese classes were fortunate enough to have an assistant teacher in Term 1. Shohei Miura helped students with their writing and speaking skills and provided valuable insight into the culture of his country. We also welcomed students from UTS, who were completing their Diploma of Education, into the French and Japanese classes in Terms 2 and 3. As these teachers were also native speakers their knowledge and expertise in all skills areas were of great assistance to all students, especially the senior classes.

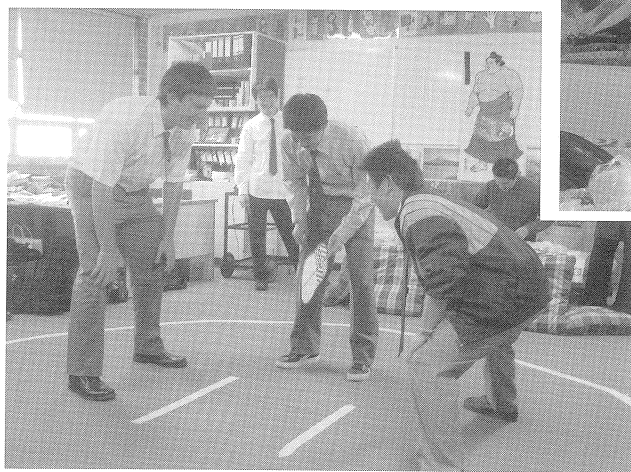

MUSIC

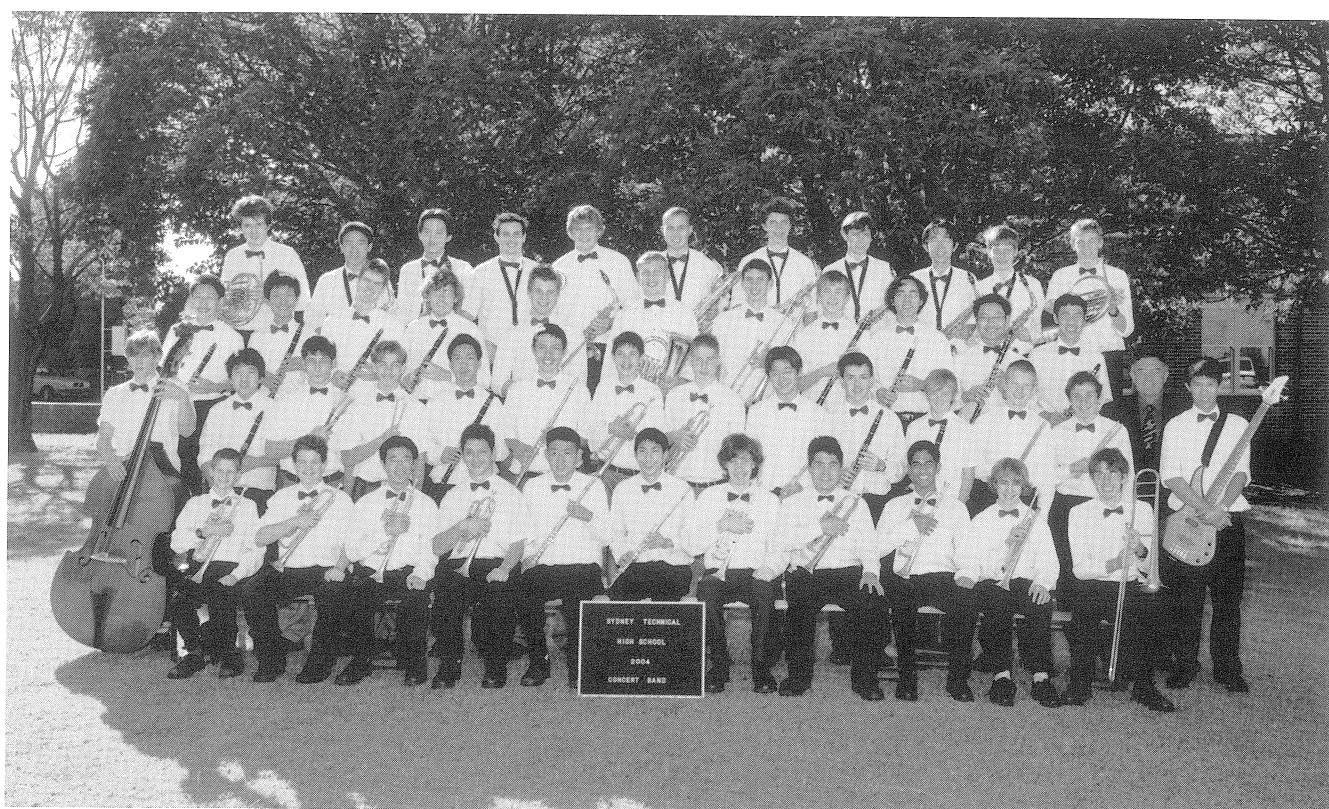

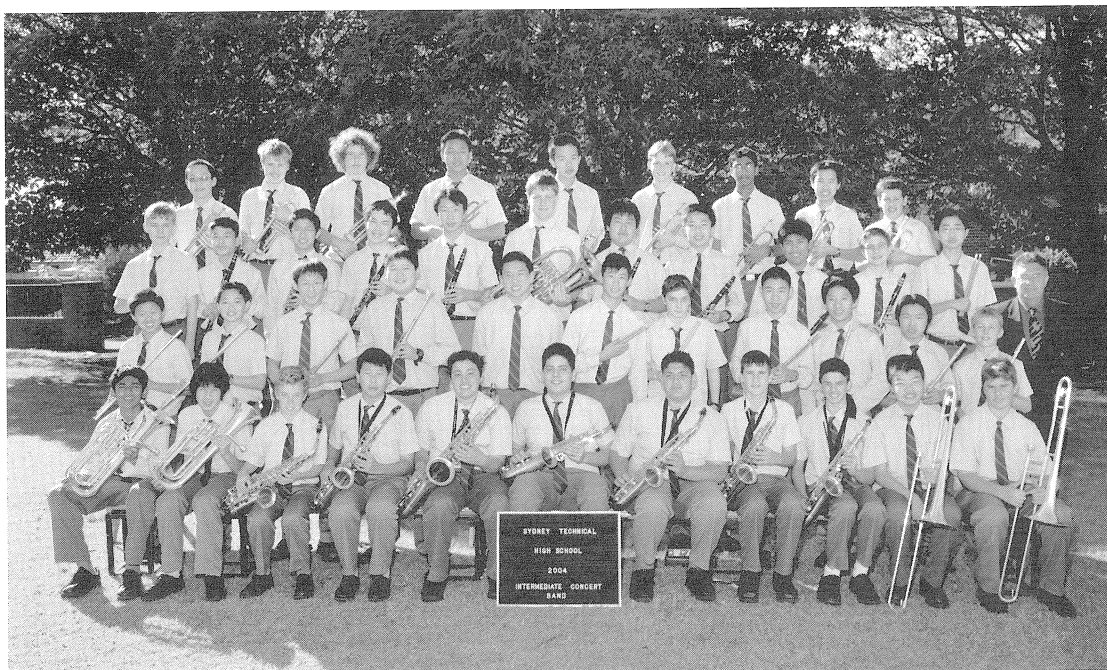

PD/H/PE & CAREERS

2004 has seen a continuance of the achievements of the previous year. This faculty has the unenviable task of coming into contact with and reporting on the entire junior school in the form of the PD Health and PE programs, as well as running elective subjects in Years 9 to 12. The purposes of these two areas are diverse, and the staff involved have worked hard to ensure that a broad range of learning has occurred.

The Human Movement courses continued in Years 11 and 12 and the boys will present themselves well for the upcoming HSC, having worked hard at this course which is more intense and demanding than most of them would have realized when first choosing the elective. The junior courses are along similar lines, but without the rigour required for the aforementioned courses, and include looking at training techniques, aspects of fitness and physical well-being and the bio-mechanics behind human movement in general.

The School to Work program has continued its momentum since its recent introduction and provides students with the knowledge and skills to develop a comprehensive careers' plan. School to Work incorporates a range of developmental activities over high school years empowering students to make informal decisions in relation to a wide range of post school destinations.

This year, the program has consolidated further the cross-curriculum perspective with all Year 10 teachers identifying employment-related skills developed in their subject during a 'careers week'. Students use this information to complete a school to work planning assignment. 2004 has seen the ongoing development of the Careers Learning Centre with an upgrade of computers expected soon. The use of the centre continues to increase with lessons, guest speakers, seminars, special activities and meetings.

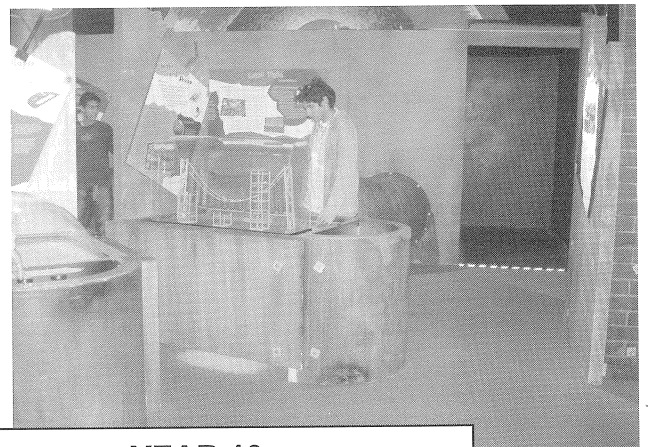

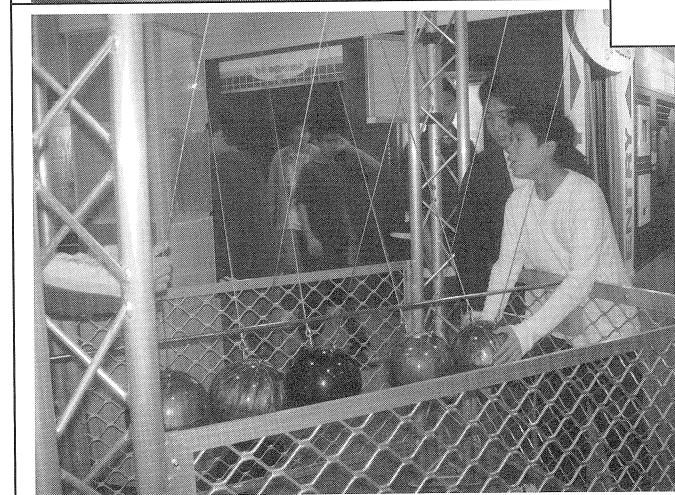

TECHNOLOGICAL AND APPLIED STUDIES

The TAS faculty has had another enjoyable year in 2004. The year has been characterised by the continuing development of the senior HSC courses and we have been really encouraged by the excellent success of our 2003 HSC students in both Design and Technology and Engineering Studies.

Students in the Senior Design and Technology class have worked extremely well. Each year the students seem to generate more innovative concepts. The class group proved to be very diverse in personality and interests and their choices of project reflected this. 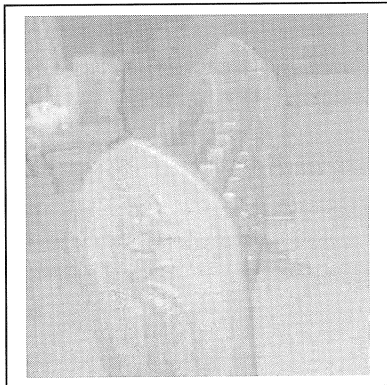

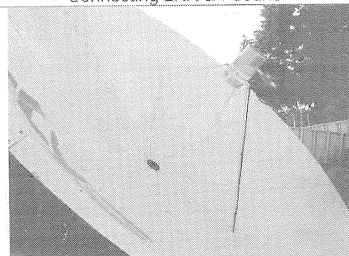
Preparations are under way for the development of the new programs for the junior school starting in 2005. Already we have trialled some of the modules in 2003/4 to ascertain what areas of the options available in the new syllabus will be most relevant to our students. Our present Technics courses (Timber, Electronics and Metal) will now be known as Industrial Technology. Mr Stokes, Graham, Edwards and Gowan have done a lot of work in the development of these courses. We anticipate that the new courses will be received very enthusiastically by the boys with a continuing emphasis on design and problem solving coupled with a greater opportunity to use current technology. The 3D CAD software with associated animation and manipulation features will certainly help in the implementation of the courses, especially in Graphics Technology, as will the milling machine linked to the software that allows scaled models to be produced which should get a lot of work in Design and Technology.

I am very indebted to Mr Riley, Mr Simmonds and Mr Cooper who have worked tirelessly in the continual development of the network facilities that enhance the delivery of our courses in the TAS area. To have the flexibility that allows students to move from the practical class to computer and graphics facilities, and back again, is tremendous.

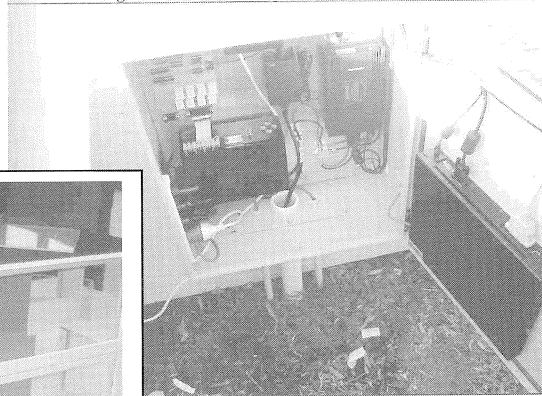

COMPUTING STUDIES

The year just gone has been like so many recently: increasingly busy keeping up with the new developments in this fascinating area of study. The class work and extra-curricula work has continued to challenge the students (as well as the teachers). We find ourselves at times reflecting on the constant pace of change in the computing field, but it's good to keep moving forward. Thanks to the diligence and concern of the computing teachers, who are keeping abreast of the latest and greatest.

The first year of the Accelerated Information Processes and Technology class has just completed the HSC. The results are unknown at the time of writing but congratulations need to be extended to all the boys for trying something new. It will be good to follow the progress of these boys over the next two years and seeing the long term benefits of having two HSC units already under their belts.

This year has been a preparatory year for a new computing syllabus. The junior Computing Studies syllabus has been updated. It is now known as Information and Software Technology. It is a much more project based course. As well as the basics it focuses on Web development, Multimedia, Artificial Intelligence, Software programming, Database Design, Networking and Robotics. This is a very attractive course and will be rewarding for all the students that enrol in it.

Forty students competed in the University of NSW Computing Studies Competition this year. The majority of these achieved a distinction or higher. One team, Sandeep Koniki, Simon Liang and Edmund Tse, entered the UNSW Programming Competition and achieved a distinction (13th position in the state) in this very difficult challenge. I am constantly encouraged by the high levels of interest and ability the boys display. The intranet team has had a very productive year providing and maintaining a great resource for all the school. This year a forum has been developed which allows feedback and discussion. It is planned to make use of this forum as a computer based discussion for coursework. There is evidence that this type of activity can enhance learning and enable deeper debate on topics than can be achieved in the classroom.

On a network front we are progressing with the addition of wireless technology around the school. We are now in a position where each of the faculties has a laptop computer. With the WiFi cards this allows a greater degree of freedom of movement while still being connected to the network. To enable the multimedia studies we have recently purchased a site license for a multimedia authoring suite. This software allows the students to progress beyond PowerPoint and create multimedia applications such as interactive tutorials and other interactive applications. We are hoping that this will form a solid part of the Information and Software Technology course in Years 9 and 10.

It is encouraging to see that a large number of the class of 2003 have continued their studies to tertiary level in computing. Such a large number of University courses incorporate computing into their curriculum. It is important to know that the students are gaining a sound basis for their future education here at Sydney Tech.

WELFARE

The welfare team have had another busy year in maintaining existing programs and introducing new initiatives. The six Year Advisers, School Counsellor, Student Mentor and a large number of interested staff have been heavily involved in working with students and the broader school community to provide all students with the opportunity to achieve their potential in a supportive environment.

The school continues to promote student resourcefulness through a variety of proactive programs as a means of empowering students with strategies to cope with the pressures that confront them. During the year a number of students with concerns as divergent as family break-ups, illness, time management and behavioural problems have been supported by the welfare team. Such instances usually have a dramatic impact on the student and require considerable time, skill and finesse from staff to effectively manage the situation.

Welfare programs, as outlined below, have been organised on a year basis and have targeted identified needs of our students such as developing relationships, building tolerance, coping with stress, leadership skills, personal goal setting and improving study skills.

Year 7 Year Adviser Mr P Graham: transition program, Year 7 camp (relationships, team building, study skills), Peer Support, anti-bullying workshops

Year 8 Year Adviser Ms T Blake: Improved Communication (writing and study skills), mentoring with teacher volunteers (time organisation, social skills)

Year 9 Year Adviser Mr N Stokes: Year 9 study skills day (learning styles, goal setting, study methods, first aid), Year 9 camp (relationships, team building)

Year 10 Year Adviser Ms P Abson: Elevate Education (study skills, motivation), Youth Leadership Forum (12 students), Peer Support Leader Training in Term 4

Year 11 Year Adviser Mr P Werner: Year 11 camp ('Crossroads' drug education, relationships, homophobia), Academy Of Excellence seminar (goal setting, motivation), Peer Support leaders, Mentoring for selected students, Youth Leadership Forum (13 students)

Year 12 Year Adviser Mr B Derwent: study skills, time management, interview skills and stress management workshops, 'Surviving The HSC' seminars, mentoring for selected students.

I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the dedication and efforts of the year advisers, Ms. Cristofolletti (School Counsellor), Mr A Gowan (Student Mentor) and the teachers who have helped by running seminars, attending camps, mentoring students or just helping out during the year. 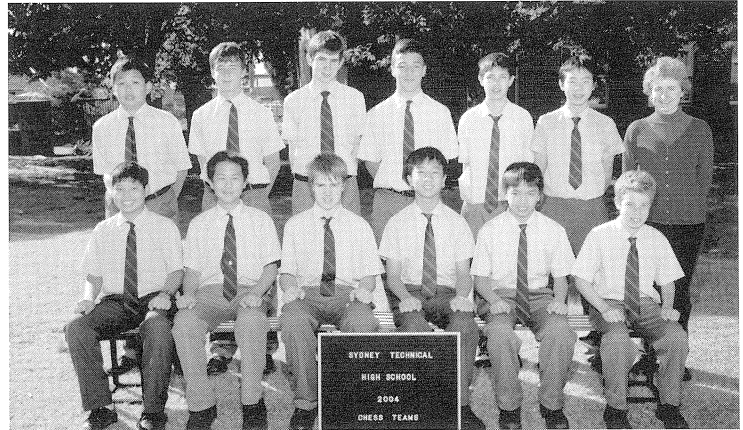


CHESS

ISCF

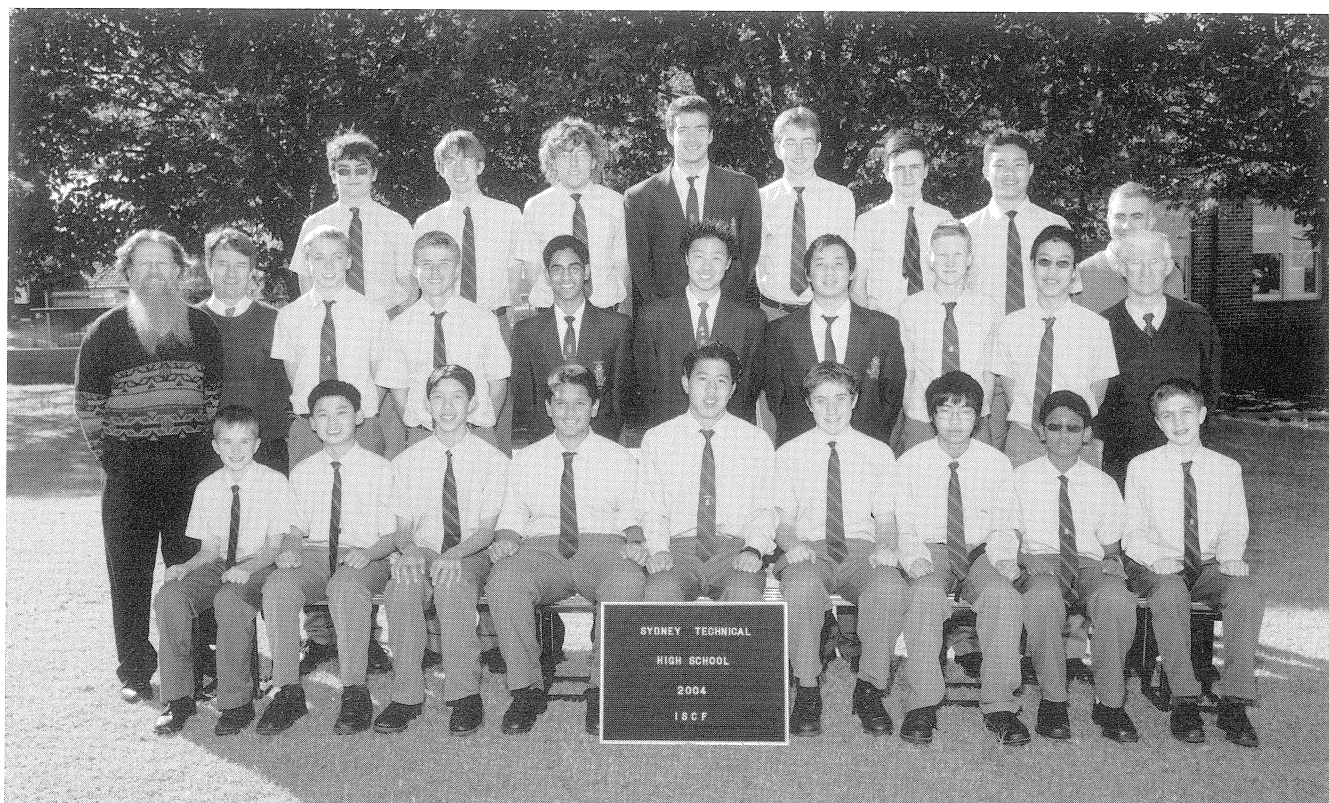

The RSL club put on a great morning tea and lunch with plenty of food which satisfied us until we could eat no more.

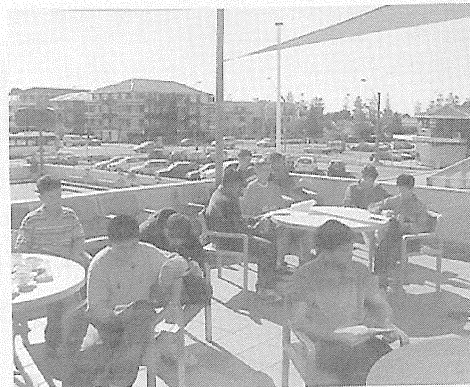
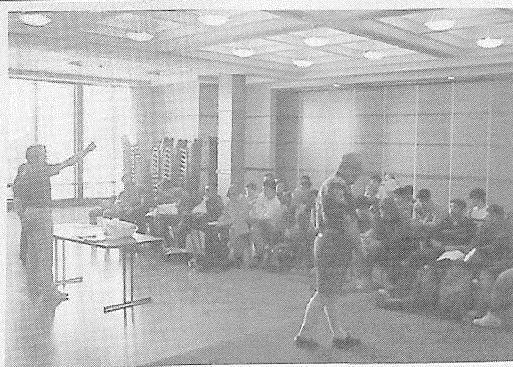

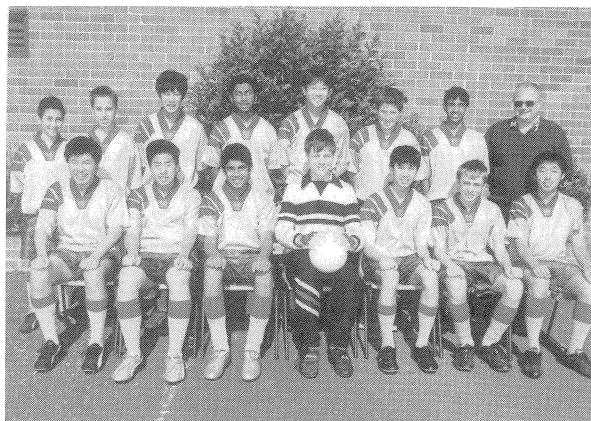
SOCCKER - 14A

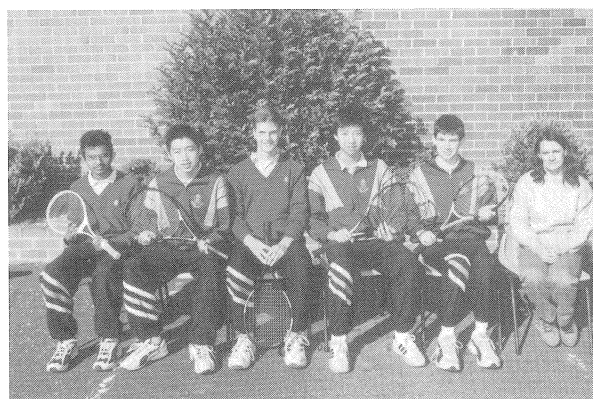
