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
THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS' MESSAGES



PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

2005 has been another highly successful year for Sydney Technical High School. We continue to remain at the forefront of public education with consistently outstanding results in the Higher School Certificate. Results from the 2004 HSC place us as one of the leading schools in NSW. Seven students received The Premier's Awards for Excellence and four students were also awarded scholarships for their tertiary studies at UNSW, the University of Sydney and the University of Technology, Sydney.

We also remain a leading school for gifted and talented education. Throughout this year Peter Heath, the Gifted & Talented Coordinator, and I have spoken at state and national conferences on differentiated curriculum and special projects for gifted students. We have also been involved in the professional development of colleagues in other schools to assist them with the implementation of gifted strategies. Peter's work in this area was duly recognised in late 2004, when he was awarded the Excellent Service to Public Education Award by the Director-General, Mr Andrew Cappie-Wood. Two highly successful projects rate special mention. In the 2004 HSC, the first class of accelerated Year 10 students sat for Information Processes and Technology. Andrew Lilley was Dux of the State and over 93% of the class scored Band 5 and 6 results. Further success in accelerated courses was achieved by Daniel Fernandes (Year 11 2004), Dux of the State in Engineering Studies. The Interdisciplinary Project for Year 8 SEP class was again recognised as state's best practice when the Director-General, Mr Andrew Cappie-Wood visited the school in September to see the DreamSchool Expo designed by the students of 8H.

There have been outstanding individual performances in 2005. Kim Zhou (Year 12) represented Australia in the 37th International Chemistry Olympiad, winning a gold medal. Kim is also a national medal and prize winner in the Australian Schools Science and Mathematics competitions. Harry Xiao (Year 12) received an internship with the Minister of Infrastructure, Planning and Natural Resources. Harry also acted as an adviser to Bob Carr at the Premier's Youth Advisory Council.



Following is an extract from the speech made by Paul Owens, Head Teacher Administration (PE and Careers) at the function:

Jorge Diaz has of course become somewhat of an institution at Sydney Tech, a figure who is synonymous with both the good name of this school and the dedicated people who have helped to build its formidable reputation. Appointed in 1975, Jorge's contribution to the PD/H faculty has indeed been enormous. There are few if any changes in this faculty over the past thirty years in which Jorge has not played a central and significant role. The recent introduction, and in particular. the continuation of Human Movement in Years 9 and 10 owes much to the dedicated efforts of this committed teacher.



SPEECH NIGHT





A remarkable 107 students earned Band 6 results (90% of more in a subject) with 262 credits listed in the annual merit lists published in the media.

Each year the Board of Studies presents The Premier's Awards for Excellence. These awards are presented to students who score 90 or more in at least 10 units of study. These students represent the very best of the 2004 HSC candidature on NSW. For their results in the 2004 HSC, seven students received Premier's Awards.



From information supplied by students, ten students attained a UAI of over 99, ninety-six scored over 90 and 135 scored over 80. Congratulations to all students on outstanding academic success.

SCHOOL CAPTAIN

The notion that "time flies when you're having fun" certainly applies to my time at Tech. 





ENGLISH

In the past I have identified a theme which parallels the experiences of the year upon which I am reporting. This year, 2005 has been so diverse that a theme or any single motif is out of the question. 2005 has been very challenging and rewarding.

The end of 2004 delivered excellent results in both the Higher School Certificate courses studied and in the School Certificate. In Standard, Advanced, Extension 1 and Extension 2 English our candidates achieved results above state average and the best results since the beginning of the new HSC. Congratulations to all our HSC candidates on their diligence and application. Our School Certificate results were also outstanding with 92% of our candidates in the top two bands compared with 32% in the state.

At the beginning of the year all new 7-10 junior programs, in accordance with new syllabus documents, were implemented. As the year has evolved we have continuously evaluated core components and ensured that the learning experiences provided for our students are relevant, inspiring higher order thinking skills. We have also focused on differentiating the curriculum recognising that our gifted and talented students are best nurtured through the provision of choices and interactions with like minded students in seminars and group presentations. Much of our assessment has also evolved to embrace the new programs and provide effective tools for assessing the variety of language modes required by the new syllabuses. However, we have also retained our focus on literacy through the mandatory interaction with all text types in our junior programs.

In our endeavours to continually engage students and provide enriching experiences many extra curricular activities have once again been organised. Drama and English students have attended performances which have included *Old Times*, *Democracy*, *Julius Caesar*, *Give and Take* and *Amajuba*: *Like Doves We Rise* performed by a visiting South African theatre group. Year 9 attended the short film festival and Year 10 were enlightened by *Poetry In Action* whose belief is that "a poem happens when you speak it". This particular experience, which linked techniques with context and imagination, provided enriching insights for our Year 10 Close Study of the pre-twentieth century poetry of John Keats. Such experiences are essential to the development and growth of our students and we attempt to provide as many as possible.

Debating and public speaking also continue to be a focus of the English faculty. Once again we have representatives in all major competitions offered at local and state-wide levels. Our own internal competitions have also inspired much interest and all students appear to enjoy the opportunity to stand and speak their mind whilst participating in an organised argument. Our public speaking competition has also identified many gifted speakers who thrive on an audience and are able to articulate their ideas effectively and convincingly. Detailed reports on all our initiatives in these two areas appear elsewhere in this journal.

2005 is not over but we are nearing the end. Thank you to all faculty members for their passion and dedication, the boys whose enthusiasm is infectious and the school community for their ongoing support.

MATHEMATICS

Over the last twelve months we have been very pleased to see our students continue to achieve excellent results in many different areas. This year we have welcomed Mr Cooper, Mr McNaught and Mr Coulston as part time maths teachers to help cover some of our classes. We're sure they've had an enjoyable time teaching such a precise subject.

We have continued to run two special enrichment classes in Year 8, as well as the enrichment class in Year 7 and these classes have enjoyed the challenge of extra mathematical investigations and enrichment work to broaden their mathematical understanding.

Our students have produced excellent results over the last twelve months. In the 2004 HSC, results were very impressive; the percentage of our students in the top two bands of each course was 74% for 2 Unit, 91% for Ext 1 and 100% for Ext 2. Our Extension 1 and 2 students had a higher average in maths than in all the other courses they studied! The School Certificate results were great too - 100% of our students were placed in the two top bands! All these results show improvement over the 2003 results which were themselves excellent – a remarkable effort. Congratulations to all our hard working students and also to the hard working Mathematics staff.

Our top HSC students were David Starkey (top student in a 2 Unit class), Robert Beaven, Paul Skyllas & Sam To (top students in the Ext 1 classes) and David Phan (top student in an Ext 2 class).

In the Australian Mathematics Competition, results were slightly down on the 2003 results with 43% of our boys gaining a Distinction or better, and two students winning prizes (that's the top 0.3% of the state). Two of our students, Minh Phan and Bruce Wu were selected, mostly on the basis of their Mathematics Competition results, to participate in the Australian Mathematics Olympiad Senior Contest (open to the top 100 students across the country). Minh has also been invited to attend the annual Mathematics Summer School held in Canberra each year to prepare students for the International Mathematics Olympiad. Toby Beckman and Dong Uong were both invited to participate in the 2005 NSW Mathematics Olympiad correspondence program to enrich their mathematics for future Olympiad events. It was also encouraging to see twelve of our students from various years of their own volition signing up for the Mathematics Enrichment Program for Young Australians. Congratulations to all these students!

One small project worth mentioning at this time is the Mathematics site on the school's intranet. This site has been upgraded with new information and resources being added gradually over the past twelve months. Links to external maths sites are now being added and students are welcome to suggest other links we could add. Any other suggestions which might help this site become a helpful and valuable resource for our students would be appreciated.

CANBERRA MATHS DAY


Our team of senior students again participated in the prestigious University of Canberra's Mathematics Day in May this year. Our team members were Harry Xiao, Anthony Hough, Kostia Lubarsky, Kim Zhou and Paul Cheung (the youngest team member ever! Even though Paul is in Year 9, he is sitting Four Unit Maths at this year's H.S.C.).

The day consists of five separate contests. One of these, the Poster Contest, which is completed at school before the Maths Day, was not available this year. We have an outstanding history in this contest because of the opportunity it gives our students to demonstrate their high level of mathematical understanding under conditions where they have time to research and think and present their findings in a creative way. Without this advantage, another contest, the Swiss, took on much greater importance and this worked against us. The Swiss contest is a bit like a cryptic crossword and often relies on luck. We do not have a good record in this contest (maybe Mr Trotman could give advice here!) and again this year the Swiss proved to be our weak spot.

In all other contests our team performed fantastic feats – always in the top few and dazzling in their ability to solve complex problems on the run. In the end we came third; good enough to be officially congratulated and awarded certificates. Unofficially, by coming third, we maintained our status as a leading Sydney school and one which other schools know they have to beat each year to have any hope of winning. I would like to congratulate the Mathematics Day team for their fine effort; they truly operated as a team and displayed all the qualities that have built our school's excellent reputation.

SCIENCE

There have been no changes in staff in the Science Faculty over the last year. We have been fortunate to secure the services of Mrs Ann Kan and Mr John Weir for long blocks of time to replace staff on leave. Thanks to their excellent teaching skills and professionalism, we have been able to keep the Science ship moving strongly forward.

The Science Faculty has completed a new set of junior programs for use over the next five years. The Quality Teaching project and the gifted and talented initiatives have also been incorporated in our teaching programs.

The 2004 HSC results in science subjects continued to show that our students are very well prepared by their science teachers. The variation between Tech and State results showed a very strong positive variation compared with the state. (Biology: +10.54; Chemistry: +8.64; Physics: +7.33). In addition 26.7% of Biology students, 22.4% of Chemistry students and 23.4% of Physics students achieved Band 6 (90 or better). Our results were further supported by the very large numbers of students who achieved Band 5 (80-89) results (55.3% Biology; 37.9% Chemistry; 42.3% Physics).

Tech students continue to perform exceptionally well in the School Certificate Examination. In 2004, 32% of students in Year 10 were awarded Band 6 compared with the State average of 5 %. A further 60% of Tech students achieved Band 5 compared with 26% in the state. Well done Year 10, 2004.

Year 10 students showed considerable originality in their choice and execution of a science research project. The 2004 Year 10 research science winner was Julien Seno for his project on projectiles. He was presented with his research medallion at Speech Night earlier this year. The 2005 winner will be announced later in the year. This year, many Year 10 students produced excellent projects and the best of these will be presented to Year 9 in Term 4.

Kim Zhou of Year 12 has had a very successful year. He was placed first in NSW in Year 12 in the Australasian Science Competition. He received a High Distinction certificate in the Rio Tinto Big Science Competition. Kim also achieved the great distinction of representing Australia at the International Chemistry Olympiad in Taiwan in July. Kim was awarded a gold medal for his performances. We hope Kim will use his success as a springboard to a successful science research career. Kim's report on his experiences appears at the end of this science report.

Once again students at Tech High have performed with excellence in the 2005 Australasian Science Competition. 19 High Distinction Certificates, 148 Distinction Certificates and 159 Credit Certificates were awarded to Tech students. 






37th INTERNATIONAL CHEMISTRY OLYMPIAD

The Chemistry Olympiad experience is... indescribable, but I'll try to put it into words. I was part of the Australian team of four to represent our country in the 37th International Chemistry Olympiad (IChO), held in Taiwan this year. The excitement however, began months ago at the chemistry summer school.


In the beginning there was the national qualifying exam for chemistry, which anyone in Australia could sit for. Based on the rankings, they select twenty students for the Australian Chemistry Olympiad (AChO) program. This program is like a two-week cram school that's fun, held in January in Canberra. Earning a place in the AChO gave me an exceptional opportunity to practise chemistry in a university laboratory. With eighteen fellow chemists, we used exotic labwares, and chemicals that violate Tech's labsafety ten times over. I've always considered myself lucky. The night when Geoff, the head of AChO called and told me that I made the IChO team, is solid evidence. Of course, the whole family was ecstatic.

Skip forward. Finally we flew to Taiwan! It's a beautiful place. where humid tropical heat is occasionally blown away by a typhoon



Having gone through the entire Olympiad experience, I strongly urge anyone with an interest to try their best for the science Olympiads. Whether it is physics, chemistry or biology, the people you meet and the things you learn won't be relived, ever.

HISTORY

This year has been an historic one. It was the year the world commemorated the Sixtieth Anniversary of the end of the War in the Pacific and the dropping of the bomb on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. It was also the year that Australians remembered the events at Gallipoli which occurred ninety years ago this year.

This year's Anzac Day Ceremony commemorated the anniversary of Gallipoli with a tribute to the men and women involved by exploring the event from three different perspectives: the reports of British journalist Ashmead Bartlett, official war historian, C E W Bean, played by Clement Chew and the ordinary soldier, played by Bijoy Joseph, with James Diment as the presenter. As usual the event was attended by a large number of old boys especially from the 1940's and 1950's. The ceremony was preceded by a tribute to Matthew Goodall, an old boy of the school (1997) and air serviceman who died in a tragic helicopter crash earlier this year.

Last year's HSC results were again very pleasing. The Ancient History results were 18% above the state mean with 100% of students receiving Band 5 or 6 – the best results in this subject since the new HSC. In Extension History (I Unit), 93% of students achieved the top two bands (Band 4 and 3). Congratulations to Michael West who duxed both Ancient History and Extension History. In Modern History, approximately 70% of students achieved results in the top two bands with congratulations going to the dux, Nick Kipriotis. Legal Studies has shown a pleasing improvement since 2001, with 76% of students gaining Bands 5 and 6 with Raj Patel dux. Finally, Studies of Religion (1 Unit) results once again were very consistently high with all but one student receiving Band 5 and 6. Duxes were Clarence Brown, Richard Chung, Hua Huang and Daniel Yeung. Congratulations to all students and their teachers for such fine results.

School Certificate results have significantly improved since the introduction of the School Australian History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship test in 2002. Last year, 78% of students achieved results in the top two bands up from 67% in 2003. This compared with the state average of 26%.

In the Les Gordon History Debating, our Year 10 team coached by Mr Short, has performed exceptionally well this year winning all three rounds of the zone competition and are into the quarter finals. Congratulations to our fine history debaters, James Diment, Bijoy Joseph, Clement Chew and Wayne Aguiar. We follow their progress with bated breath.

MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly) is held annually at the Nan Tien temple in Wollongong and this year we represented Spain. Our team consisting of Robert Lay, Li Chen and David Simmonds debated a range of motions on everything from terrorism to free trade. The standard of debate was as high as the standard of dress of our dashing toreadors, for which they received a special mention. Ole.

There were a range of excursions and incursions again this year enriching our students' experience of History and Legal Studies. Three Year 7 History classes in second semester, accompanied by Mr Landsberger, Mr Short and Mr Heath, practised their historical detective work in the very popular "Whodunnit" exhibition at the Australian Museum. They used a range of forensic evidence: including DNA, fingerprints, shoe prints and tyre prints to investigate the death of an animal trainer in a fictitious zoo.

The very best students managed to develop their own hypotheses and scenarios and discover the murderer and the motive. We also visited the Indigenous Gallery at the Australian Museum where we had the opportunity to experience the Aboriginal Dreamtime, walk through a recreation of the Tent Embassy and 'ride' the Freedom Ride bus.

Year 9 World History studying Hitler and the Holocaust accompanied Mr Derwent to the Jewish Museum in Darlinghurst earlier this year. Here they were guided by Holocaust survivors who told their extraordinary stories of courage and sacrifice through the rise of Nazism and its escalation, into the genocide where over six million Jews died in World War II.

Year 8 once again experienced the joys and horrors of life in the Middle Ages with the James Adams' Medieval Show. Volunteers put their head in the stocks and handled replica armour and weapons including swords, shields and mail.

Legal Studies students in Mr Bellamy's Year 11 class gained first hand experience of the legal system by visiting the Downing Centre District Court where a court officer explained how the court system operated and witnessed a trial first hand. They also visited the Justice and Police Museum where they observed a range of weapons and an exhibit of the history of the police force. They also participated in their own mock criminal trial.





SOCIAL SCIENCE

This year faculty members have been busy implementing new programs for Year 7 and 9 Geography and Year 9 Commerce. We have also commenced writing our programs for Year 8 and 10 Geography and Year 10 Commerce due for implementation in 2006. This has involved the development of new resources and learning activities that provide intellectual quality, technological skills and significance to the real world.

Extra curricula activities, excursions and the opportunity for students to enter many state and Australia wide competitions this year have provided an enriched curriculum for Social Science students. The results in the Australian Geography competition were again extremely good with sixty-three students receiving high distinctions and five students in the top 0.5% of Australia. They were Edward Quach, Adrien Lalchere, Patrick Chan, Toby Beckmann, Edwin Cooper and James Diment. Both Edwin and James are being considered for the International Geography Olympiad to be held next year in Brisbane as their results were extremely good.


In the PWC Australian Economics competition Kostia Lubarsky was a national winner and received \$250 in prize money and in the Business studies section Hector Lau, Craig Margetson, Ke Fei Huang and Nathan Low received money prizes as they were in the top ranks of the High Distinction awards. Congratulations to all these boys!

At this stage of the year results have not been received for the Asia Wide competition. Students are still to enter the Sustainable Living competition, the Business Plan competition and the Great Race on line Geography competition. Year 9 Commerce students are presently involved in the ASX on line share trading simulation which provides them with a realistic experience regarding investment. Many excursions have been organized this year including fieldwork at the Royal National Park, Cronulla, Pyrmont, a fish farm to study aquaculture and a harbour cruise.

The 2004 HSC results were extremely pleasing. Business Studies students achieved an average mark of 83.5 which was fourteen marks above state average. Geography students were 9.6 marks above state average and in Economics Nick Kipriotis achieved fourth place in the state. In the third year of state wide testing of Geography, Civics and Citizenship Year 10 achieved outstanding results. 90% of students received band 5 or 6 which was the top 27% of the state.

I would like to acknowledge the work of the Social Science faculty members in providing valuable learning opportunities for the students within and beyond our faculty area. They are a hardworking and professional staff.

Congratulations are also extended to our clever Year 12 2004 students for their superlative performances at the HSC. Students in LOTE, Music and Visual Arts received marks well above state average, with most students achieving results in the top two bands. Of particular note are two Visual Arts students who were preselected for *Artexpress* – John Skola and Chris Lau. Well done everyone!

VISUAL ARTS

The Visual Arts department held several gallery visits throughout the year. Students in Years 10, 11 and 12 have visited *Artexpress*, the Archibald and the Bill Henson photographic exhibition at the Art Gallery of NSW. A saunter through the botanical gardens to the Museum of Contemporary Art allowed students to view the iconic works of optical artist Bridget Riley and postmodern sculptor Lee Bul. Year 11 Photography and Year 9 Visual arts attended a caricature exhibition at Parramatta and Taronga Zoo for digital and drawing studies. Thanks must go to Ms Blake and Ms Nelson for coordinating these events.

Four students from Year 12 successfully completed the National Art School HSC extension courses. They were Joe Jin and Peter Xie who completed the drawing discipline in the Intensive Studio Practice Course and Imteaz Ahamed and Justin Penafiel who attended the inaugural Intensive Critical/Historical Study course.

Several students from Years 9 and 10 were successful in a number of programs and competitions for gifted young artists. To be selected for these programs or create work skilled enough to reach finalist stage in a competitive exhibition is a great achievement in itself, but these students go one step further. They demonstrate their ability and their capacity for intellectual risk taking by having their work - their creative expression, exhibited for public scrutiny.

Sydney Rocks On was held in the Rocks area of Sydney on the 11-14 March, 2005. It aimed to heighten student awareness of the historic nature of the built environment of the Rocks area and encourage excellence in Visual Arts by practicing artmaking in a challenging outdoor environment and in a competitive spirit. On the left of the drawing we have old sandstone buildings, with pulleys and chains, separated by a cobblestone path. On the right side we have the present. Tall brick buildings, electrical signs, skyscrapers and cars. Although in one way this shows conflict, it also shows how the two cultures have meshed with each other.



Now in its second year the *National Environmental Art Competition* is designed to engage young people in creating awareness of the biggest environmental issue our country faces – declining water resources. The Award ceremony on 17 March, was presented at the Australian Museum by the Hon. Bob Debus, Minister for the Environment. Student artworks can be seen on the web at www.planetkidz.biz. National finalists from Year 9 were **Andrew Ta, William Ton-That, Desmond Tan, Jimmy He, Anuj Kumar** and **Matthew Day.**

There were over 2000 entries from 100 NSW schools for the **2005 Harmony Day Poster Competition**, based on the theme of "Celebrating Diversity" and "Moving forward together". Awarded by the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation Commission of Australia and New Zealand, at Sydney Town Hall on 21 March, two students, Jimmy He and Sam Heath, had work selected for the touring exhibition which was exhibited in the lobby of State Parliament during August and the National Gallery in Canberra in September. Participants from Year 9 were **Jonathan Lin, Desmond Tan, Daniel Yeung, Sam Heath** and **Jimmy He**, who won the Regional and High School competition, collecting \$400 for himself and \$125 for the school.

Finally, I would like to thank the Creative Arts/Languages staff for their cooperation, professionalism and enthusiasm.

LANGUAGES

The 2005 school year has been, yet again, a very busy but rewarding one for the languages department. The start of the year saw the return of Mr Brian Reynolds from leave in 2004, while Ms Kim Cross remained as a part time French and German teacher. We also welcomed Ms Annette Harrison from the English faculty, as a member of the languages team this year after she willingly accepted to take on the teaching of both Year 8 Japanese classes.

This year Year 12 students sat for the HSC in Japanese Continuers, Japanese Extension, German Continuers and German Beginners. We also had students studying through the Open High School to complete their HSC in French Continuers and Italian Beginners. The speaking exams for languages were held during Term 3 and by the hard work and dedication that were shown toward their preparation, I have no doubt we will see some very pleasing results. We wish the boys all the best for a successful future after the HSC.

The 2004 HSC results were quite pleasing with nearly all students improving on their school assessment mark. Special mention should be made of David Chau who received a Band 6 for French Beginners, Tetsuro Hunter and Ibrahim Tohidi-Esfahani who came first in the school assessment in Japanese Continuers and Japanese Extension respectively, both receiving the top band in the HSC and Sam To who came first in French Continuers.

Two of our very talented junior language students have been accelerated into senior classes this year. It is the first time we have included an acceleration program in the language department and it has been extremely successful. Antoine Rosse of Year 8 is currently completing the French preliminary course (Year 11), while Yuto Nakayama of Year 10 is studying the Japanese preliminary course (Year 11). Both students will sit for their HSC language exams in 2006.

All students studying languages in Years 9 and 11 sat for the Australian Language Certificates in early August and we once again await some very pleasing results. In last year's competition, our school achieved well above the average in both reading and listening skills. Students who were placed in the top 10% of those taking part in reading and/or listening included: Daniel Ang, Patrick Chan, Uri Chouster, Daniel Kim, Sherman Lam, Edmund Li, Yasutoshi Park, Lionel Puang, Alex Zeng, Alex Zhou, Toby Beckmann, Daniel Fernandes (Beginners Certificate). Tim Dinjar, Petros Darnakis and James Kilford (Intermediate Certificate). In October, Years 9 and 11 Japanese and French classes trial tested the papers that will be used for next year's language certificates.

Congratulations to Scott Janssen, one of our Year 11 German students, who has won a scholarship from The Society for Australian-German Student Exchange, enabling him to spend two months in Germany between November 2005 and January 2006. This will be a great experience for Scott leading up to his HSC year and I am sure he will gain great benefit from this opportunity.



The Year 8 French class also went on the annual visit to 'The Little Snail' French restaurant in Term 4. There have also been cooking days for the German and Japanese classes, as well as calligraphy and bonsai lessons for Years 8 and 9 Japanese students.

With the implementation of the new 7-10 syllabuses this year it has been a very busy time writing programs for new courses while updating current programs. MUSIC

CURRICULUM MUSIC

Foundational to all the music events and activities which occur throughout the year are the music education programs which are offered to all the students in the school. Each year the Music Department evaluates and applies the best possible methods of ensuring that all our students have the opportunity to develop their academic, creative and aesthetic skills as generated through an education in music. The resourcing of a rich and varied program is an ongoing challenge but one that is met well at this school. Most importantly we have students who are willing to be challenged and involved in the process. The music staff are continually proud of the efforts and achievements of our students.

This year we were indeed fortunate to take possession of a new grand piano as part of the *Bill Jelk's Bequest* to the Music Department for the Room 42 performance space. This has been a wonderful addition to our facilities and is used during recess and lunchtime as well as during lessons by many of our developing piano students. Together with the instrument in the auditorium, students can now access two very fine grand pianos to develop their performing skills. Also, as part of the bequest, the first annual awards for performers have been provided and this year's winners are Andrew Wibawa of Year 12 and Blake Robertson - Hall of Year 11.

Music composition is an integral part of all the music programs and the computer / MIDI keyboard laboratories in Rooms 40 and 42 are used extensively by all students in Years 7 and 8 and all elective music students from Years 9 to 12. Both hardware and software has been added to and upgraded in these facilities.

An exciting new program of events was initiated this year with the commencement of a series of presentations and workshops. Catriona Stafford, a highly respected educator and piano teacher, was invited to present a Master Class to our advanced piano students in the elective music classes. John Constable, percussionist and performer with the percussion ensemble *Synergy* presented two Master Classes. One of these classes focused on composing for percussion instruments and the other class focused on percussion techniques and skills and was presented to the percussionists in our bands. All the students involved were most impressed with these special classes.

Congratulations are extended to our Year 12 students who have completed their music course most successfully. Some truly wonderful performing skills have been demonstrated this year and their composition work has shown a sophistication and musicality with which we are all pleased. Throughout their years at Sydney Tech High Samuel Burtt (percussion), Julian Ngo (piano, clarinet and saxophone) and Joshua Scott (trombone) have been outstanding participants in and contributors to the Concert and Stage Bands. Andrew Wibawa is a piano performer of exceptional standard who has represented the school on the stage of the Sydney Opera House. Well done boys! The music staff wish you all the best for the HSC and the future.

THE PERFORMING ENSEMBLES

In 1981 the tradition of student performing ensembles in the form of a Concert Band was established and in 1982 this concert band consisted of eighteen students. This year a concert band of fifty three students featured in Term 1 at the annual Speech and Presentation Night. Further to this there was a Stage Band of sixteen performers playing music demanding outstanding skill. From a promising beginning in 1981 the Music Department now maintains a program of performing ensembles consistently involving almost 120 students. In 2005 our ensembles are a Concert Band, a Stage Band, an Intermediate Concert Band and a Junior Concert Band. To maintain this structure of ensembles and the sequential development of musicians as they cycle through, is a process and one that demands a strong commitment from all involved. The participating students should feel a great sense of achievement as they develop their own instrumental skills and as they assist others to develop theirs. The conductors of the ensembles believe that the students should and do feel a sense of ownership and responsibility for the success of the bands.

As our Year 12 students leave the school and their ensembles they should be able to look back and be proud of their music learning and contribution to the musical life of the school. The music staff and the ensemble conductors congratulate the following Year 12 musicians:

2005 has been another memorable year and we look forward with enthusiasm and expectation to 2006.


MUSIC SUPPORT GROUP

PD/H/PE & CAREERS FACULTY

I am very proud of the faculty's achievements in 2005, all of which are testimony to both the expertise of a dedicated staff and the commitment of the wonderfully talented students with whom they work. It is not uncommon for outsiders to comment on the enthusiasm and energy associated with learning in these subjects, the same factors of course that inspire boys to become fully engaged in all faculty activities. Unsurprisingly, PD/H/PE courses have continued to grow in popularity, in part as a result of the opportunities students are given to develop their skills - cognitive and motor - to very high levels.

It is with extremely fond memories that we recently farewelled our long-standing colleague Jorge Diaz. For over three decades Jorge has been the heart and soul of this faculty and the embodiment of those qualities that have become synonymous with the proud history and good name of Sydney Tech. On a memorable day in August, Jorge was honoured by the students during an emotional assembly in which an overwhelming tribute was paid to the substantial contribution he has made to this school. This was altogether fitting; there would be no better example than Jorge Diaz of a teacher who always placed the interests of others and the school above all else. In this spirit, Jorge, with the support of the faculty, provided on his final day a BBQ for the kids (a trademark phrase), during which many students had the chance to say their personal farewells and no doubt relive what will be for them enduring memories of their time with Mr Diaz.

We, of course, wish Jorge a long and happy retirement. Undoubtedly, having more time to share with family will be for Jorge the most rewarding feature of the coming years. We thank him for his friendship, professionalism and ready support, a more loyal colleague we could not wish to find. Amongst many great memories, Jorge's continual reminder that we are all family will, for all of us, linger long into the future. And for all of those students who pass through the doors of the *Jorge Diaz Gymnasium*, we know there will remain an enduring legacy of this wonderful teacher.

It is so pleasing to report that in 2005 we have continued to witness an enthusiastic response to the Human Movement course. Both Years 9 and 10 groups have enjoyed many highlights this year. A special Year 10 program of visits to Hurstville P.S. allowed these classes to run coaching sessions with students from Years 5 and 6; our boys were great ambassadors for the school and received first hand experience in coaching applications and leadership training. A friendly rivalry also exists between classes as they put theory into practice in order to secure the much coveted *J. Diaz Shield*. This prize follows a number of intra-faculty tournaments that include volleyball, European handball, soccer and OzTag. Needless to say, there is also a competitive spirit amongst teaching staff that motivates classes to perform at their personal bests!

The Year 10 Human Movement trip to Kangaroo Valley (almost 50 students in 2005) is a highlight of the school year. Over two days, the boys paddle approximately 25 km along the Shoalhaven River, camping overnight with no more than what they can carry in and out. As can be imagined, this trip offers students a range of experiences that both challenge and delight, not to mention many humorous memories for all concerned. All these extra-class activities provide an invaluable adjunct to learning in this subject. For this reason I would like to commend the tremendous efforts of Matt Hewett (organiser 2004/5) and the PD/H/PE staff, who continually look for ways of extending our students and ensuring their learning is relevant and engaging.

Similarly, this same commitment has seen a surge in the number of students taking up the senior PD course. For 2007, twenty-four students will complete HSC examinations in this subject. Since its inception in 2000, many students have found senior PD a rigorous and thoroughly enjoyable course. Students study a wide range of topics that include knowledge of biomechanics, universal health issues and sports science. Moreover, they are provided additional opportunities such as the completion at Sydney University of a comprehensive first aid course. I know staff enjoy working at high levels with senior students and look forward to this course remaining a viable addition to the broad curriculum offered at this school.

At the time of writing this article we were fortunate to welcome Rod Carter to Sydney Tech as a permanent member of the PD/H/PE and Careers faculty. Rod is a highly experienced educator whose career spans a range of schools and an extended period as the talent manager for (NSW/ACT) the AFL. Rod was a gifted and long serving player with the *Sydney Swans* and has dedicated his life to nurturing the skills of young sportsmen and women. He is a welcome addition to the faculty and I'm sure will further strengthen the drive and enthusiasm for sports-related subjects and activities within this school. We wish him a happy and productive stay at Sydney Tech.

Careers activities remain an important focus at this school, offering students skills that move far beyond the traditional conception of 'advice' for training and jobs. Careers content is now a fully integrated component of PD/H/PE programs and it forms a significant area of School Certificate assessment. In addition, the *School to Work* program is now embedded in Years 9 and 10 teaching programs across all faculties, requiring students to identify and apply the employer-related skills essential for career and life: fostering the development of higher order competencies such as problem-solving, communication, planning and evaluation (amongst others) is a priority fully compatible with the school's gifted and talented policy. Considerable funds have been invested in the training and development of staff and we thank the faculty representatives for their commitment to this initiative. The invaluable work of Brett Mulholland is a significant factor in the maintenance of Careers programs; his willingness to continually evaluate activities and instigate new strategies is always appreciated.

Within weeks, Year 12 will have departed these hallowed halls and the wonderful years of school will be but the subject of occasional reminiscences. For the current graduating group, Paul Werner will no doubt strongly figure in these memories: he has spent the last six years as their Year Advisor, mentor and friend, sharing their highs and their lows; most of all, he has simply been there. Paul can take great pride in the work he has done with this fine group of young men, satisfied in the knowledge that for these students he has helped lay the foundation for fulfilling lives. Congratulations on a job extremely well done!

In closing, I would like to stress my admiration for all the members of the PD/H/PE and Careers faculty. Individually, they are warm, supportive and talented people; collectively, they form a dynamic team whose presence is felt well beyond the immediate faculty: camps, sport, carnivals, student-initiated events, welfare programs and year excursions are just some examples of the activities that benefit from the goodwill of these teachers. I always value the opportunity to work with them and thank them for the many contributions they have made throughout the year. Bravo!

WELFARE

The six Year Advisers, Student Mentor, School Counsellor and many interested staff have undertaken proactive programs to ensure that all students have had the opportunity to work to their potential in a supportive environment.

Leadership, resilience and resourcefulness have been encouraged through a variety of programs to develop in students the skills that will empower them to better manage the academic and social stresses that confront them. On occasions when circumstances have impacted adversely on students they have been supported with sensitivity and, where appropriate, confidentiality.

Welfare programs continue to be organised on a year basis and are aimed at the learning skills and social needs of each age group. The main programs are outlined below:

Year 7: Camp (relationships, team building, study skills, anti-bullying), Peer Support. Adviser Mr N Melvin.

Year 8: Improved Communication (writing and study skills). Teacher mentor program (time organization and social skills), YouthZone (Hurstville drop-in centre) familiarisation visit. Adviser Mr P Graham.

Year 9: Study skills day (goal setting, first aid, study skills, learning styles), Camp (relationships, team building). Adviser Ms T Blake.

Year 10: 'Elevate Education' (study methods, time management), Youth Leadership Forum, Peer Support Leader training. Adviser Mr N Stokes.

Year 11: Camp (crossroads drug education, relationships), 'Academy Of Excellence' seminars (motivation, career choices, goal setting), Peer Support program leaders. Adviser Ms P Abson.

Year 12: UTS/Royal North Shore Hospital stress lecture, 'Surviving The HSC' seminars, mentoring of selected students. Adviser Mr P Werner.




YEARS 7 AND 8

The Interdisciplinary Project

<u>Director-General Visits DreamSchool Expo</u>

The Interdisciplinary Project (IDP) is an enrichment and extension activity for students in the Year 8 Student Enrichment Program (SEP). The IDP was first introduced in 2000 and other project themes have included: Mir Space Station, The Kursk Disaster, Whale Song, International Games Expo and Futurescape: A 2020 Vision for Sydney. The aim is to develop the effective transfer of learning by encouraging students to design problems and solutions that incorporate knowledge and skills from across the curriculum. Students work cooperatively with their peers on a group-initiated project using a range of strategies to research, resolve and communicate their findings. The Interdisciplinary Project has been recognized as an exemplar of gifted and talented practice and is featured in the support materials on differentiation in the 2005 Department of Education and Training policy for the education of gifted and talented students.



In 2005, the theme was DreamSchool and students researched and designed their own schools. Everyone who ever went to school seems to have an opinion on education. Because our children are so important to us it is also important that they have the best education and go to a good school. But what makes a good school at the beginning of the twenty-first century? What does it look like? How do we judge one? By its physical appearance, by academic results, by its welfare policies, by its social status? And, more importantly, what do our children think makes an ideal school? Just what would a dream school be like? These were the questions tackled by 8 Howell.

An Expo of Dream Schools was presented to other students, Year 5 from Hurstville Public School and parents and staff. The students presented exciting material as part of their expo including: a dream school symposium, role plays, power point presentations and a wide variety of written, graphic and technological displays exploring our students' ideas of what their ideal school would be like. The Director-General of Education, Mr Andrew Cappie-Wood visited the school on 6 September 2005 to witness the presentation of symposia by the students of Year 8Howell for their DreamSchool project.

Boys immediately began a program of Peer Support which continued through to Term 2, establishing links between the Year 7 boys and students in Year 11.



SPORTSMAN OF THE YEAR The Professor Max Howell Award




In swimming he represented the school at zone level for four years, and played first grade water polo for three years just to complete his all-round efforts. A worthy recipient indeed!


DAVIDSON SHIELD

RUGBY LEAGUE - 13 YEARS




