At Sydney Technical High School, homework is not simply a set of tasks to complete. It is an intentional and structured process that develops self-regulation, resilience, curiosity, and a lifelong love of learning. Homework bridges classroom learning with independent practice, ensuring that students not only consolidate their knowledge but also develop essential skills for success. Parents, teachers and students work in partnership to uphold these standards, reflecting our belief that high expectations are best met with high levels of support.

Purpose of Homework and Study

Homework consolidates authentic classroom learning. It deepens understanding, sharpens skills, and develops habits such as concentration, self-discipline, and motivation. Students learn to take responsibility for their education, becoming independent, self-regulated learners. Homework also provides parents and carers with insight into their child's progress.

Our approach draws on **Cognitive Load Theory**, ensuring tasks are meaningful, well-sequenced, and connected to prior learning. We use **formative assessment** strategies so that homework is not just "extra work" but a chance to receive feedback and improve before summative assessments.

Reading remains central: frequent engagement with sophisticated texts builds vocabulary, comprehension, and critical thinking — all of which directly improve students' writing.

Section 2: Types of Homework Tasks

What Counts as Homework

At Sydney Technical High School, homework includes but is not limited to:

- Daily review of classwork, noting key concepts and terminology
- Completion of set tasks due for upcoming lessons (check Google Classroom Classwork and Streams)
- Progress on upcoming assessments using the calendar and assessment handbook
- Exam preparation with past papers and feedback from teachers
- Topic summaries and study notes
- Reading prescribed and related texts
- Background research for upcoming topics
- Formative practice tasks, including peer review
- Reading current affairs to build global awareness
- Skill practice, such as speeches or creative projects

• Extension work via Atomi, Google Classroom, Stile, or Education Perfect (for Languages)

Homework Expectations by Stage

Stage	Years	Focus	Time Guide
Stage 4	Years 7-8	Building study routines and core skills. Typical tasks include daily review of classwork, reading, topic summaries, and regular Education Perfect practice for Languages	1-2 hours per day
Stage 5	Years 9-10	Increasing independence and depth. Students use Atomi, Stile and Education Perfect strategically for revision and extension. Greater focus on extended tasks, drafts, and reflection on feedback.	2 hours per day
Stage 6	Years 11-12	Mastery, self-regulation, and HSC preparation. Emphasis on exam practice, independent reading, note-making, and consistent revision. Use of digital platforms remains vital for targeted preparation.	3+ hours per day
