This term, Year 10 English students have been working with Ms Nixon to study Jackie French's powerful play *Hitler's Daughter* as part of their Stage and Drama unit. Adapted from the award-winning novel, the play raises important questions about history, morality, and personal responsibility, encouraging students to reflect on the choices individuals make in difficult times.

Through a blend of script work, performance activities, and class discussions, students have been exploring themes of power, identity, and ethical decision-making. They have also been developing performance skills in voice, movement, and characterisation to bring the play to life on stage.

The unit has sparked thoughtful conversations about the role of theatre, not only to entertain, but also to challenge audiences and deepen their understanding of the world. 

We've also included a handful of mystery books for younger readers perfect to take home as a gift for a younger sibling, cousin, or friend.



#### Year 11 Legal Studies





On Thursday 24 July, the Year 11 Legal Studies students swapped the classroom for the chambers of power, taking part in an unforgettable experience at NSW Parliament. Students made their way to Parliament for a two-hour educator-led session aligned with Part I: The Legal System of the Preliminary Legal Studies course. The visit offered a first-hand look at the workings of democracy in action, reinforcing key syllabus concepts such as the rule of law, separation of powers, and law-making procedures.

Inside the historic Legislative Assembly and Legislative Council chambers, students participated in a mock parliamentary debate to pass a bill regarding first-home buyers. From drafting legislation to debating its merits, students took on the role of elected representatives and experienced the complexities of the legislative process. This experience deepened students' understanding of how laws are made, the role of government, and how legal institutions reflect society's values. The group then returned to school before lunch, filled with new insights and a deeper appreciation for the role of Parliament in shaping our society.
































#### Year 7 HPGE Historians travel through time






This term, our talented Year 7 High Potential and Gifted Education (HPGE) students kicked off their Investigating the Ancient Past unit, in true historian fashion, with curiosity, colour, and creativity! Using archaeological thinking, students collaborated to construct a gigantic timeline stretching from the time of dinosaurs to their own birthdays, including major milestones like the Moon landing, the Gold Rush, WWI and WWII, and even COVID.

The activity launched our exploration of key historical concepts such as continuity and change, and chronology, while also building excitement for the ancient civilisations we'll study next. It was a perfect example of how classes at The Forest foster high expectations and deep engagement, with every student encouraged to stretch their thinking, ask big questions, and make connections across time. Students don't just study history at the Forest, they experience it.




# **SCIENCE**
























#### **STAGE 4**
