A Deep Dive into Soil, Water, and The Little Critters in the Environment

Last Friday, our 3/4 class embarked on an exciting excursion organised by Landcare and Carbon 8, titled "A Deep Dive into Soil, Water, and The Little Critters in the Environment." This engaging day was dedicated to exploring the vital role that soil plays in our ecosystem, emphasising its importance to everyone—from farmers to lawn lovers and veggie gardeners alike.

Throughout the day, students participated in a variety of hands-on learning activities designed to deepen their understanding of soil health and conservation. They discovered fascinating facts about soil biodiversity, learning that a single teaspoon of healthy soil can contain billions of microorganisms, including bacteria, fungi, and tiny invertebrates. These organisms are crucial for nutrient cycling and help maintain soil structure, which is essential for plant growth.

Additionally, students learned about the important role soil plays in carbon absorption. Healthy soils can capture and store significant amounts of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. By understanding how to care for our soil, we can contribute to a healthier environment and promote biodiversity both above and below ground.
