

NAPLAN 2025

Each year the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is sat by students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Students will participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.


NAPLAN 2025 will take place from **Wednesday 12 March** to **Monday 24 March**.

NAPLAN is just one part of our school's learning assessment program. The tests assess literacy and numeracy skills your child is already learning at school, so the best preparation is their everyday classroom learning. Our school will also undertake activities to help students become familiar with the types of questions and tools available in the online tests.

What an incredible start to 2025! Welcome to all the Kindergarten families and families who have started at Ultimo Public School this year. I hope you were able to enjoy some quality time over the summer break with your children. I enjoyed a cold holiday this year and ventured to America and Japan. Of course, during my travels, I visited many public libraries. I was fortunate to visit the Morgan Library and Museum in New York which have rare books and manuscripts from as far back as 1890 on their shelves.

The media may have you believe that Libraries have become somewhat redundant in our society, however Libraries serve such an important role in our communities. On February 14th is Library Lover's Day. This is a day that is celebrated internationally each year which honours libraries, librarians, library lovers and the valuable roles that libraries play in our lives. School libraries play a crucial role in the educational landscape of Australia, serving as vital resources for students and educators alike.

Here are a few reminders to make sure they make the most out of every visit:

Library Day and Library Bags

Students visit the Library each week for 1 hour. Bringing a library bag is all important in helping our bookworms bring their literary adventures back home in good order. Please check in with your child or classroom teacher for which day your child is visiting the Library. You can order an Ultimo Library bag by using the Flexischools app. You can also use any cotton tote bag to borrow books. We request no plastic bags to be used.

Kindergarten: Borrow 2 books weekly
Years 1-6: Borrow 3 books weekly

Scholastic Book Club Issue 1 Book Club has arrived. Look out for your copy of Book Club coming home in your child's schoolbag. It's packed with hundreds of books from just \$3 to help you on your child's reading journey.

New Families to Book Club: Our school actively participates in Book Club. Book Club will be distributed throughout the year to your child via a brochure and orders can be placed online. The books will then be delivered to your child's teacher for your child to take home. Families can purchase books at a discounted rate through scholastic book club. The best part is 15% of your order value is given back to our school. It is easy to order. Just go to scholastic.com.au/loop or by using the LOOP app which you can download from the App Store or Google Play. Once you select your books, use the drop-down menu to find your class and the books will be delivered to your child's classroom. Please note the school does not take cash for Book Club orders.



Next Week is Bus Safety Week (17-23 February)

Key messages for parents and carers

- You are responsible for getting your child to and from the bus stop safely.
- Always supervise your child and hold their hand when walking to and from the bus stop and when crossing the road, until they are at least 10 years old.
- Meet your child at the designated stop time on the same side of the road as the bus stop never call your child across the road.
- Talk to your children about Stop! Look! Listen! Think! every time they cross the road:
- 1. Stop one step back from the kerb
- 2. Look continuously both ways
- 3. Listen for the sounds of approaching traffic
- 4. Think whether it is safe to cross and keep checking until safely across.
- Encourage your child to take a seat quickly when they get on the bus and to buckle up if the bus has seatbelts.
- <u>Safety Town</u> the road safety website for primary school students, teachers and families contains information for families around driving safely around buses and also around getting children to and from the bus stop safely.
- If you have recently moved, or your child is starting or changing schools, make sure you plan your trip in advance. These <u>fact sheets</u> provide information on getting your child to and from school safely

School Zone Road Safety Newsletter

Welcome to the first School Zone road safety newsletter for 2025.

This term, we're sharing information from Transport for NSW about e-bikes and e-scooters.



What are the requirements for e-bikes?

There are 2 types permitted in NSW: electrically powerassisted cycles and power-assisted pedal cycles. There are specific requirements associated with the use of each kind. Always check the manufacturer's details.

Can a child ride an e-bike?

Yes, if it meets the requirements. Shared (hired) e-bikes usually have a minimum age allowed. Always check before allowing a child to ride a shared e-bike.

What is an e-scooter?

A scooter powered by a rechargeable battery

Families

have an important part to play in keeping children safe around roads.

Is a child allowed to ride an e-scooter?

In NSW it is illegal to ride a privately owned e-scooter on roads, footpaths, shared paths, cycleways and cycle paths.

A child can only ride a privately owned e-scooter on private property.



Shared e-scooters are being trialled across NSW. A child must be 16 years or older to hire and ride a shared e-scooter within a trial area.
