Mrs Healey will return to our school for Week 7 this term and continue working with students and staff. We thank the Frazers for allowing Mrs Healey to stay at their property during her visit. This will be Mrs Healey's final visit to our school. Another advertisement for the permanent Assistant Principal Curriculum and Instruction position will be published on Wednesday, 2 March on IWorkforNSW. If a suitable applicant is not appointed, our school will be identified to participate in a NSW Department trial. The trial will be a virtual model where a blend of face-to-face and virtual support will occur. There would be a minimum of two multi-day, face-to-face visits per term. This is a similar model to what we explored with Mrs Healey and we are confident we will make it work if matched with the right professional.

This grant will be divided up to provide our students with additional opportunities in dance, music, visual arts and drama. The grant will fund our participation in the PULSE dance performance.

Mr Morrison, who has great talent in music, is planning how to use these funds to support his music program. I am currently working with local artists as we plan innovative projects for our students. I look forward to sharing more details with you in the next newsletter.

Next week will be our final swimming lesson with Mrs Helen Cathles for Term 1. The students have received a one-on-one personalised lesson with Helen for the past four weeks, which has resulted in the students gaining both confidence and skills. Our younger students are now in the stream-like position for freestyle and developing their confidence to float on their back with introductory backstroke techniques. Our older student has developed her swimming fitness, stroke correction and introductory diving. We are grateful to have such a wonderful swimming instructor in our community. The students love Helen's positivity and personalised institution. We look forward to participating in the ten-day 'Learn to Swim' again with Helen in Term 4.

It was wonderful to have our first P&C meeting last week. It had been a while since we last met. I am grateful to our hard-working association who happily joined online to conduct both the AGM and our first general meeting. I wish to acknowledge and thank both the executives and the association for their dedication to supporting our school. Not many schools can claim 100 per cent active parent involvement in P&C and to have local community members constantly supporting our school is incredible. I also thank the staff who make themselves available outside of working hours to participate in meetings and fundraising events. I thank the P&C for their generous donation of \$3,000. It will be used to top-up the soft-fall area of the fixed equipment, further enhance the playground, and subsidise excursions.

Mr Al Phemister has resigned from his position as General Assistant. Mr Phemister gained this position through merit selection at the end of 2020. We acknowledge and thank Al for all of his contributions to our school as GA, but also in his casual roles as SLSO and as a visiting artist. He has certainly helped to enhance our school grounds and give the students some wonderful experiences. We wish him all the very best for his future projects and I know he will be missed. An Expression of Interest for the General Assistant role has been outlined in this newsletter. Latest COVID-19 information



The Premier and Minister for Education have announced changes to school settings for the remainder of Term 1. These updated settings were developed in close consultation with NSW Health and key stakeholders to ensure we continue to keep our schools open for learning, while keeping up with changing community settings.

The updated settings include:

- From Friday, 25 February, the twice-weekly testing of students and staff will stop. This means from Monday, 28 February, we will move to symptomatic testing. Tests are to be used at your discretion, such as, if your child is symptomatic or there are cases in their class. Our school will provide each student and staff member with ten tests.
- Beyond that, students and staff can access PCR tests or buy their own rapid antigen tests as these are now readily available and accessible in the community.
- We will continue to maintain that no student, visitor, parent or staff member is to be on site with even the mildest of cold symptoms. We thank everyone for adhering to this measure for the safety of our community.
- Masks will continue to be required indoors for all school staff, volunteers and visitors, including
 parents and carers, until Friday, 4 March. This is due to the lower vaccination uptake in the 5-12-year
 age bracket. From Monday, 7 March, masks will no longer be mandatory for staff. However, those who
 wish to continue to use them will be supported to do so.
- From Monday, 28 February, visitors can be allowed back on school sites regardless of their vaccination status. All visitors are asked to follow our usual sign-in and sign-out process.
- However, anyone working with students, in a voluntary or paid capacity, must show proof of double vaccination.

Our school will continue to ensure our layered COVID-smart measures are in place, including vaccinations, maximising natural ventilation in learning spaces, continued good hand-hygiene practices and enhanced cleaning. We strongly encourage our students and their families to consider vaccination including boosters when eligible.

Thank you again for your continued support during this school term.

Diving into Term 1 Swimming Lessons

This term, Wee Jasper Public School students have been attending Swimming Lessons at Yass Memorial Pool once per week.

Swimming Teacher Helen Cathles and Teaching Principal Michelle Andrews hold the lessons.

We do swimming lessons to improve our swimming skills, so it is safe to swim in things like rivers and rapids in Wee Jasper.

Kaiden has been learning how to kick and hold his breath underwater. Abigail has been learning how to blow bubbles and kick at the same time; she uses a water mattress, which helps her to float to improve her kicking. Matilda has been learning how to get into a streamline position to get ready for freestyle swimming. I have been learning how to do breaststroke, freestyle and back-stroke corrections.

I asked the Year I students many different questions about swimming to see their answers. These included what they like to do in swimming and what they are hoping to learn:

- "I want to learn how to dive and I like to do monkeys on the side of the pool. Monkeys are when you climb on the side of the pool" Abi, Year 1.
- "I like to do crocodiles. Crocodiles are when you put your hands underwater and walk with your hands. I also like to go underwater" Kaiden, Year 1.
- "I want to learn how to dive down and get the sink toys. I like kicking while holding onto the wall" Tilly, Year 1.

We are looking forward to starting gymnastic lessons from Week 7.





A very special visit

Thank you so much to the staff and students from Wee Jasper Public School for welcoming me to your school and community. I had a wonderful week of learning and am really looking forward to visiting again in a few weeks' time.

The children at Wee Jasper will always have a special place in my heart. The bond they have with each other and their teachers is very evident.

Together, we made some wall displays for their classroom. One was an 'I Wonder' wall to spark their curiosity. If they have any wondering throughout the day, they can write on the wall. Next to each of their photos, there's also an 'I learned' section where, after they've researched their wonderings, they can record their findings.

We made a 'Vocabulary Wall' for their teachers to write any tricky or sophisticated words they may come across in their shared reading. The aim is for the students to start using these words in their writing. We also made a 'Wow Work' wall for them to put any work on display that they're proud of.

Finally, we made a 'Look What Book We're Reading' display for the students to proudly display any learning relevant to their shared reading book.













Top tips for sunscreen at school

Regular use of sunscreen has been shown to reduce the incidence of melanoma and squamous cell carcinoma.

Teachers at school are not expected to apply sunscreen to students but SunSmart does ask that schools have strategies in place to help remind children to apply sunscreen before they go outside.

Choose SPF30 (or higher) broad-spectrum, waterresistant sunscreen. Monitor the expiry date and store it below 30 degrees.

It is best to apply a generous amount of sunscreen to any exposed skin around 20 minutes before going outdoors. Sunscreen should be reapplied every TWO hours even if the stated level of water resistance is 4 hours.

Always use sunscreen with other sun protection measures - clothing, a hat, shade and sunglasses. Don't just rely on sunscreen.

Sunscreen application strategies

- Request children BYO SPF30 (or higher) broadspectrum, water-resistant sunscreen – one that suits their skin. They could try a clip-on and hang it on their school bag. Not only is it easy for storage but it also acts as a visual reminder.
- Include sunscreen on the school booklist so each child has their own supply
- Download the free <u>SunSmart app</u> set the sunscreen reminder
- Add the <u>SunSmart widget</u> to the school's website so everyone can check the daily sun protection times and see when they need to use sun protection each day.
- Style up your sunscreen bottle so it is attractive and fun to use. Check out the <u>stop-motion video</u> showing some examples. Students could create their own
- Appoint sunscreen buddies so children can help each other.

- Have sunscreen monitors
- Store sunscreen with lunchboxes and/or hats so when children grab their food or hat before going outdoors, they will also be reminded to slop on sunscreen. If sunscreen is kept in the cooler section of the lunchbox, it will be cold when applying - especially nice on a hot day. By the time the food has been eaten, the sunscreen should have had time to bind to the skin.
- Set up sunscreen stations with a mirror and tissues for wiping hands. Try a sunscreen pump pack or roll on (they are usually easier to use).
- Encourage children to put a dot of sunscreen on each cheek, their nose and chin and rub it in with squiggles on their arms and legs. Try sunscreen letters and numbers.
- Post reminder notes near the door or on the board
- Student leaders can make application reminder announcements over the PA
- Play <u>You've got to be SunSmart</u> or the <u>SunSmart Countdown song</u> before the recess bell as a prompt for sun protection
- Create a sunscreen application chart to keep track of applications, add a sticker or mark each time sunscreen is applied. Which student or team are the sunscreen application champions?
 Perhaps they can win some free time?
- Remember the value of teacher role modelling
- Include information about sunscreen in the school newsletter. Use one of SunSmart's sample family notes.
- If a school supplies sunscreen it is best to notify parents of the sunscreen and its ingredients

Road safety

Walking together safely to and from school

Walking to school and back home again is a great way to spend time with your children and encourage safe and healthy behaviours.

Here are a few things you can do to help keep your children safer as a pedestrian:

- Talk with your children about being alert in the road environment.
- Plan and practice your trip to school so you use pedestrian crossings where possible.
- Always hold your child's hand. Children need your help to spot dangers such as vehicles coming out of driveways. They can also be easily distracted and wander into traffic.
- Meet your child near the school gate and don't call them from across the road.
- Explain why the place you have chosen is the safest place to cross.
- Remind your child to STOP! LOOK! LISTEN! THINK! every time they cross the road and keep checking until safely across.
- Talk to them about why they should stop, look, listen, think before crossing a driveway, road or carpark.

Young children can learn and practice these safe pedestrian behaviours with you. This will help them to be safer pedestrians when they are old enough to travel alone.
