STEM

Mrs Kemp has been helping students better understand and practise using the STEM process (1. define a problem, 2. brainstorm solutions, 3. plan your solution, 4. develop and make it, 5. test and improve it, 6. evaluate and share it) this semester by making water bottle rockets. Students considered how a soft drink bottle could be modified to fly smoothly on a controlled flight after being launched with air pressure.













STEM

The students brainstormed different fin and nosecone designs with Mrs Kemp, and set about making and attaching them to their bottle. Mrs Kemp has brought her bottle launching kit twice this term, allowing students to test their prototype, then modify it for better performance in time for the next launch.













Intergenerational Day

Intergenerational Day was created to bridge the gap between young and old people. At Wee Jasper Public School, this day invites students to spend time with parents and grandparents. This year, we were incredibly fortunate to also share the day with internationally-acclaimed ceramicist Janet de Boos, who also calls Wee Jasper home. She helped the three generations (students, parents and grandparents) connect on the day by teaching them how to work together with clay.
