

Visit from University of Canberra academics & International PdD students



On Tuesday 24 September, we had a visit from Philip Roberts, Professor of Curriculum Inquiry & Rural Education from the University of Canberra. Ms. Andrews first met Phil while she was studying a rural education subject for her Master of Education. Phil brought two colleagues plus a team of academics who are also researching rural education internationally. One colleague was from Sweden, and another was a PhD student from Ghana.

Our students asked lots of questions about both Sweden and Ghana. They were amazed about the long and short days of Sweden and the approximation to Santa at the North Pole. Ghana being very close to the Equator was also of interest as their rainfall was significantly higher than Wee Jasper.



Our students showcased what learning at Wee Jasper PS was like and demonstrated a usual math lesson. They performed their dance one last time and enjoyed giving our visitors a tour of our school. Once we had shared our school with our guests, we boarded the bus to show some of Wee Jasper's highlights. We went straight to Micalong Creek and showed our valley's gorgeous water hole. Being one of the first particularly hot days, on the way back, we could not help but stop to visit Jenny and Paul at Reflections for an ice cream.

Phil will be return in November 13, to share some of his research about other small schools internationally with our students and staff. It will be very interesting to learn about other small schools and the students have already suggested an excursion to Sweden or Ghana.







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
