



The old man slowly opens the door and asks in a surprised voice, "Why are you here?"


"I need your help," I say and tell him my sad story of being KicKed out of my house.

Will Kostakis Writing Workshop

The students thoroughly enjoyed their writing workshop with Will Kostakis! They gained a solid understanding of how a narrative is structured, beginning with an Orientation, followed by a Complication, and concluding with a Resolution.

The primary focus of the workshop was on developing the Orientation of their stories. Students learned valuable techniques, such as using strong verbs, naming their characters, incorporating imagery through the use of their senses.

We also emphasized the their importance of making stories realistic, steering away "talking" from animals and ensuring the inclusion of plausible complications, actions, and resolutions. While it took a little time for students to adjust (as they love writing stories similar to those of Pixar and eventually they embraced these new concepts.

Each day, the students participated in workshops focused on sentence structure, punctuation, and the origins of words, further enhancing their writing skills.

STEM Dalton & Wee Jasper - Exploring Adaptations and STEM Learning

Our students are currently delving into the fascinating world of adaptations in plants and animals, exploring how they grow, evolve, and adjust to their environments in order to survive. They are identifying different parts of plants and animals, understanding their functions, and using microscopes to closely observe these living organisms.

Through the STEM process, students are investigating, experimenting, and solving problems, which is deepening their understanding of the natural world.

A key highlight at Dalton PS was the introduction of the Sphero BOLT, an interactive robot that students control and program using a phone or tablet. This hands-on experience is teaching them the fundamentals of coding, fostering creativity and problem-solving skills.

During our STEM PLC Day at Wee Jasper, students further explored how adaptations help plants and animals survive. Working in groups, they applied the STEM process to design solutions for survival, confidently identifying and utilizing adaptations in their projects. This collaborative approach allowed them to successfully solve problems and enhance their STEM knowledge.




















