


We are incredibly proud of all four students for their hard work, courage, dedication and the pride with which they represented Westmead Public School.






From the APC&I Team

We are very excited to introduce a newsletter segment from the APC&I Team!

We are Chloe Ally and Teaghan De Wet, the Assistant Principals of Curriculum & Instruction at WPS.



Each fortnight we will be sharing some practical and engaging ways that you can support your children at home.

What is Phonics?

Phonics is the understanding of the **relationship between graphemes (letters) and phonemes (sounds)** and the ability to recognise and manipulate them to read and spell words.

By Years 3-6, students have usually mastered the basics of phonics, but it still plays a vital role. Phonics helps students **decode new words when reading** and supports **accurate spelling**. As words become more complex, students also draw on **morphology** (understanding prefixes, suffixes and root words) and **etymology** (knowing a word's origin, such as Latin or Greek) to make sense of spelling patterns and meaning.

Together, these skills help your child become confident and accurate readers and writers.

Ways to Help at Home

Kindergarten - Year 2 Kindergarten Stage 1 Stretch simple sounds out (d/o/g) – make Be digraph detectives sure you say the sound, not the letter name during reading and writing Play 'find the sound' in a book you're and find as many dipgrahs as you can! Digraphs reading together. For example: Can you find include sh, th, ch, ck, ng, ph the sound /p/ Play 'I spy with my little eye, something beginning with...' and give a sound Play vowel digraph memory or snap. Write the vowel digraphs on cards and play memory or 'snap'

Year 3 - Year 6


Find and group words that have the same trigraph, such as 'air' found in hair, stair, pair

- **Sport word parts** when your child comes across a tricky work, break it into smaller parts (prefix, base, suffix). For example, *unhappy* = *un* (not) + *happy*.
- Talk about word origins Explore where words come from. For example, telephone comes from Greek (tele = far, phone = sound). This makes spelling patters more meaningful.
- **Play 'word families'** Choose a base word (like *sign*) and see how many related words your child can find (*signal*, *signature*, *assign*). Discuss how the meaning and spelling are connected.

Collection notice - schools



The department collects personal and health information about students, their parents, carers, families and other persons of significance before and during the course of a student's enrolment at a NSW government school. This notice provides information about the department's collection and handling of this information as required by privacy legislation.

What information is collected

The department collects information to ensure compliance with its obligations under laws governing or relating to the operation of schools such as those in the areas of education, public health, disability discrimination and child protection and its duty of care. Information the department may collect includes:

- student medical and health conditions and their management, medical records and medical practitioner details
- family details, relevant court orders and parent/carer and emergency contact information
- student school history including previous schools attended and history of suspension or expulsion for violent behaviour
- details about student welfare and wellbeing including attendance and behaviour management
- information on student special learning and support needs including disability
- records of student educational progress and outcomes

The department may also collect personal and health information required for the effective management, resourcing and administration of education in public schools. This includes information about religious and ethics education, Aboriginality, languages other than English spoken at home and parental/carer occupational and educational background.

Why information is collected

Information is collected for the primary purpose of providing every student with the opportunity to achieve their educational potential and for other directly related purposes including but not limited to:

- implementing programs that meet student educational and support needs
- communicating with parents and carers
- maintaining the good order and management of schools
- ensuring the safety and welfare of students, staff and others involved with the school's operation
- conducting lawful research and compiling statistics relating to the education, health, welfare and wellbeing of students and student performance
- assessing and evaluating the effectiveness of programs and their impact on student educational outcomes
- informing State and Federal Governments on matters that may affect resourcing of schools
- operational and administrative purposes
- determining whether students are meeting compulsory school requirements
- satisfying the department's legal obligations, in particular, its duty of care

How information is collected

Information is generally collected directly from the person to whom it relates. In many circumstances student information is collected from parents or carers with responsibility for the student's welfare and learning.

Collection of information from a student depends on the nature of the information involved, the maturity and capacity of the student and whether it is in the student's best interests.

When parents and carers provide schools with personal information about others, such as emergency contacts and other parent /carer details they should obtain the person's authority and inform them that the information is held by the school so they may access it.

Schools may collect personal and health information about current and prospective students from other agencies or individuals if required and permitted by the *Education Act 1990*, child protection legislation or other law.

Access and amendment

The department endeavours to ensure that the personal and health information it collects and holds is accurate, complete and up to date by encouraging families to regularly update the information if there are changes and by allowing access to and alteration of the information.

Requests to access and update personal and health information should be made directly to the school. The department's <u>privacy management plan</u> has information about how requests are handled.

Parents and carers may be denied access to student information in certain circumstances such as when it may result in a breach of the school's duty of care or other legal obligation, it would have an unreasonable impact on the privacy of others or where the information was provided in confidence.

Disclosure to other agencies

Schools will only disclose personal and health information to other agencies or persons outside the department in compliance with privacy legislation or as permitted or required by any other law. Personal information collected from students is regularly disclosed to their parents or carers.

The department may disclose personal and health information to other government agencies for the purposes of national reporting. For example, anonymised personal data for students and parents is provided to the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Agency (ACARA) which uses it to enable comparisons of National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) test results for schools across Australia published on the My School website. ACARA follows the Australian Privacy Principles to ensure that personal and health information is stored securely and is not disclosed without consent.

The department may disclose personal and health information for research and evaluation purposes under some circumstances. Such disclosure only occurs if it is consistent with privacy legislation, where the research or evaluation will be of public benefit and where the department is confident that personal and health information will be protected against further disclosure.

Permission to publish student Information

At enrolment and during the course of a student's enrolment parents and carers are asked to provide permission for the school to publish or release for publication in print and electronic media, information about their child's achievements and activities at school. Parents and carers should inform the school if they wish to alter this permission.

Further information about privacy


The department's <u>privacy management plan</u> details the department's practices and procedures for handling personal and health information. It can be accessed from the department's website. Concerns about the collection or handling of personal or health information should initially be raised with the school principal.

Attendance

It is crucial that all students attend school if they are well enough to do so. The Education Act (1990) requires that parents ensure children of compulsory school age attend school on each day the school is open for instruction and any absences are satisfactorily explained in writing.

At Westmead we ask that parents do this via the Sentral Parent Portal app.

Did you know that if a student misses one day a week, they miss 8 weeks per year which is more than 2.5 years missed over their school life (from years 1-10)? Students who miss learning time reduce their access to future learning and working opportunities.





Federal Government consultation on the Children's Online Privacy Code

The Office of the Australian Information Commissioner (OAIC), the Australian Government's privacy regulator, is seeking input from parents and carers to assist them in its development of the Children's Online Privacy Code (the Code).

The Code will put children at the centre of privacy protections in Australia. By the time a child turns 13, it's estimated that 72 million pieces of data will have been collected about them. The aim of the Code is to strengthen privacy protections for the handling of children's personal information.

Your insights as a parent or carer are important.

If you return is delayed, please contact the school by email with the details.

Is Your Child Ready for the School Day at Westmead Public School?

Be ready for school — pack your child's bag the night before with the materials they need for class including homework, sport and after school activities.

Remember to pack a healthy recess, lunch and water bottle in their school bag before you leave home.

When your child needs to leave school early for an appointment or family matter

Come to the school office to collect your child

Bring some photo identification

If you can, please collect your child before or after recess and lunch times

When Your Child Is Unwell

Keep them at home until all symptoms have gone or they have a medical clearance.

If your child has a fever, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, runny nose, loss of smell/taste, muscle/joint pains, diarrhoea, nausea/vomiting, extreme tiredness, unexplained chest pain or conjunctivitis (eye infection), then keep your child at home until all symptoms have gone.

If your child has vomited or had diarrhoea, they are required to stay at home for at least 24-48 hours.

BIRTHDAY TREATS, SHARED FOOD, CLASS & EXTRACURRICULAR PARTIES

Birthday Treats

Some children enjoy celebrating their birthday at school with their classmates and bring food items to share. On these occasions it is requested that nut free single servings for each child such as small cupcakes, small individually wrapped chocolates or donuts are provided, in their original packaging with ingredients identified. It is requested that no lolly bags/party bags are provided. We are unable to accept home-cooked food.

All birthday treats must be handed in to the class teacher **before school on the day**, to ensure that these requirements are met.

We are unable to accept birthday food items during the school day.

Shared Food

Teachers may plan activities involving shared food as part of classroom learning activities. These activities provide students with valuable hands-on experiences that act as stimulus in class writing, discussion or response activities. At times, students are able to eat what has been made. This will always occur under teacher supervision. Some examples of the type of activities that may include the use of food are:

Examples at Westmead

- •cooking as a learning opportunity
- •making fairy bread or scones to learn how to write or follow informative texts
- •food experiences linked to history topics eg damper

Class & Extra-curricular Group Parties

Teachers may hold class parties at the end of the school year to celebrate the successful year that students have had together, recognising the hard work, growth, and accomplishments of each and every one. This celebration is a chance to reflect on the milestones reached, the challenges overcome, and the friendships built along the way.

Teachers may supply foods and students may be asked to provide foods for these activities. We are unable to accept home-cooked foods for these activities.

Examples of Foods for Class/Extra-curricular Parties

- •Plain and flavoured chips must not contain any nuts or nut products
- Plain and flavoured chocolates must not contain any nuts or nut products
- •Tim Tams and Oreo biscuits must not contain any nuts or nut products
- •Mini Cupcakes must not contain any nuts or nut products
- •Lollies Allens or The Natural Confectionery Company must not contain any nuts or nut products
- •Zooper Doopers Cosmic Flavours only
- Soft Drinks Coca Cola, Fanta, 7Up, Lemonade and Pepsi
- •fruit juice poppers

Practical caution is taken to ensure all known allergies and intolerances are appropriately catered for when planning such activities.

If your child is unable to have birthday treats or shared food due to an allergy or intolerance, you may provide an alternate treat option for them. This should be in the original packaging with the ingredient list, your child's name and class and handed in to the class teacher **before school on the day**.

Important Safety Reminder: Crossing Hawkesbury Road

We would like to remind everyone about the importance of road safety, especially near our school.

Recently, there have been concerns about students and parents crossing Hawkesbury Road near Mowle St.

This area can be particularly dangerous, as it is not a designated pedestrian crossing.

For your safety and the safety of your children, we strongly recommend using the pedestrian lights at either Priddle Street or further down Hawkesbury Road near the shops.

These crossings are much safer, as they allow you to cross with the protection of traffic signals.

Please take the extra time to walk to these crossings and encourage your children to do the same. Your safety is our priority.

PERMISSION TO PUBLISH

When enrolling your child at Westmead Public School, we seek your permission to allow the school/NSW Department of Education to publish and/or disclose information about your child for the purposes of sharing their experiences with other students, informing the school and broader community about school and student activities and recording student participation in noteworthy projects or community service.

This information may include your child's name, age, class and information collected at school such as photographs, sound and visual recordings of your child, your child's work and expressions of opinion such as in interactive media.

The communications in which your child's information may be published or disclosed include but are not limited to:

- Public websites of the NSW Department of Education including the school website, the NSW Department of Education intranet (staff only), blogs and wikis
- NSW Department of Education publications including the school newsletter, annual school magazine
 and school report, promotional material published in print and electronically including on the
 Department's websites
- · Official Department and school social media accounts on networks such as YouTube, Facebook, Twitter and School Stream.
- · Local and metropolitan newspapers and magazines and other media outlets

Parents should be aware that when information is published on public websites and social media channels, it can be discoverable online for a number of years, if not permanently. Search engines may also cache or retain copies of published information. Published information can also be linked to by third parties.

A separate permission will be requested for special circumstances such as CAPA Night.

This permission remains in force for the duration of your child's enrolment at the school. If you wish to change your permission, please email the school at westmead-p.school@det.nsw.edu.au and include your child's full name, date of birth and class in the subject line.


