#### **ATHLETICS CARNIVAL**

This year's athletics carnival was held on an overcast but warm day, with occasional gusts of wind that added an extra layer of challenge for all competitors. Despite the less-than-perfect weather conditions, the event was a great success, with enthusiasm and school spirit clearly shining through.

We were thrilled to see a higher student participation rate than last year, with more students than ever eager taking part in a wide variety of events. Throughout the day, there was a strong sense of support and camaraderie, as students consistently encouraged and motivated their peers. The cheers, applause, and positive energy helped lift everyone's performance and kept spirits high from start to finish.

The carnival featured several exceptional individual performances, with athletes pushing themselves to new heights and achieving personal bests. One of the most exciting aspects of the day was witnessing two longstanding school records being broken by Cody Jamieson in the Under 14's 100m sprint and Jett Milsom in the Open's High Jump.

Farrar was the top-performing house during the athletics carnival, earning the most points across all the events held that day. Their strong performances in a variety of track and field competitions helped them accumulate enough points to finish ahead of the other houses. This impressive achievement means that Farrar not only won the carnival on the day but also secured the title of overall house champions for the year.
