

Ms Harris is reading - The Ballad of Songbirds and Snakes by Suzanne Collins



I recently read The Ballad of Songbirds and Snakes by Suzanne Collins. Many of you will know her as the author of The Hunger Games series. This novel serves as a prequel, jumping back in time to explore how President Snow became the cold, calculating dictator we know from Katniss' story.

I really enjoyed this addition to Collins' world of Panem. She shifts both her writing style and perspective, moving away from Katniss' first-person narrative to a third-person view that offers a more nuanced and layered portrayal of Snow. This change allows readers to explore his motivations and the events that shaped his character. It's a highly engaging read that keeps you wondering what happens to Snow and Lucy Gray.

I would recommend reading The Hunger Games series first, then diving into The Ballad of Songbirds and Snakes. You'll have a more enjoyable reading experience if you're already immersed in the world of Panem, and you won't miss the many subtle references to the original trilogy.

I'm looking forward to reading Collins' most recent novel, Sunrise on the Reaping, which follows Katniss' mentor, Haymitch Abernathy, during his Hunger Games. No spoilers please!

Back-to-Back Peace Prize Success for Winmalee High at Model UN

This past weekend, two of our outstanding students, Lucinda Balogh (Year 12) and Aurora Edwards (Year 10), proudly represented Winmalee High School at the 2025 Western Sydney Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA), held at Nepean Creative and Performing Arts High School.

MUNA is a Rotary initiative designed to give senior high school students (Years 10–12) a deeper understanding of the United Nations' role and valuable insights into international diplomacy.





Competing as the Kingdom of Denmark, Lucinda, Aurora, and supervising teacher **Mr Kevin Joseph** spent months preparing — learning about Danish history, culture, geopolitical alliances, and current global issues. Over the weekend-long assembly, the team engaged in lively debate and careful negotiation on resolutions addressing topics such as international security, human rights, environmental challenges, nuclear disarmament, trade policy, and United Nations reform.

In an impressive display of diplomacy and leadership, Aurora and Lucinda authored and sponsored a resolution promoting self-determination for Greenland. Their resolution received widespread support from other delegations and was successfully passed.

In recognition of their thoughtful advocacy, collaborative spirit, and persuasive diplomacy, the team was awarded the **2025 Peace Prize** by the adjudicators. Remarkably, this is the **second consecutive year Winmalee High has received this prestigious award** — a testament to the calibre of our students and the strength of our debating and public speaking programs.

The team now progresses to the Sydney West Netball Gala Day on Monday, 30th June. **Good luck, girls!**


A reminder that Ms Doyle is running a **Netball Development Program** on **Wednesday afternoons**. If your child is interested in joining this program, there are notes available in the library.


WHAT HAVE YOU BEEN UP TO SINCE GRADUATING FROM WHS?
