

Dear Parents and Carers,

Warami. Welcome to Term 3. We've hit the ground running, with many events happening in and out of school. Our **2026 School Captain Interview panel** met yesterday, with student interviews scheduled for tomorrow. We wish all candidates the best and want to congratulate all students who have applied on the quality of their applications. We look forward to hearing students deliver their speeches at our next whole school assembly.



Yesterday we had guests speak at assembly about a pilot **Aviation Micro-credential which is being offered exclusively at Winmalee High**. Mr
Pendergast has been working closely with staff from Western Sydney International Airport and Western Sydney University to coordinate this exciting opportunity. Our guests, Eva Atkins and Vimal Parashar shared information about the micro-credential and educational pathways possible within aviation following the completion of the course.

This is an excellent opportunity for our students. The cost of the course will be partially subsided by the airport, the university and the school, making the cost

\$120 for students. The course is open to students in Years 9-12. Students can express interest by seeing Mr Pendergast. Currently there is a limit of 20 students, but we may be able to negotiate two courses to run if there is a lot of interest.

Education Pathways - The micro-credential provides the foundational knowledge and serves as a stepping stone to advanced programs, including:

Certificate I in Aviation (with RPL for the three units completed in microcredential)


Certificate III or IV in Aviation (Ground Operations and Services)

Certificate IV in Transport & Logistics

Diploma of Aviation Management

Certificate IV in Leadership and Management (for supervisory pathways)





There are many opportunities for employment, including traineeships and apprenticeships in a broad range of areas. We encourage students to have a look at the available information online.




What are you reading? Mr McGown is reading......

The Happiest Man on Earth - Eddie Jaku

Eddie Jaku's *The Happiest Man on Earth* is one of the most powerful and moving books I've read. As a survivor of Auschwitz, Eddie endured unimaginable horror, yet he emerged with a message of hope, kindness, and gratitude. His story reminds us that even in the darkest times, we have the power to choose how we respond. What struck me most was his belief that happiness is not something we find, but something we choose to create, by being kind, helping others, and living with purpose. For students, this book is a profound reminder that resilience, empathy and perspective are some of the most important qualities we can develop. Eddie's

life is proof that strength isn't always loud, sometimes it's found in forgiveness, friendship, and refusing to let hate win.

If you haven't already, a trip to the Jewish Museum in Darlinghurst is a must. There is a great interactive experience where you can speak with Eddie via AI technology. Visitors to the museum can ask Mr Jaku a question and receive an answer in real time as though he was in conversation with them. A truly amazing experience.


charred), the damper was dusted off and served with butter and golden syrup, affectionately known as "Cocky's Joy." It was so

This semester there is continued focus on the importance of school attendance. Our program **Attendance Matters** will continue for all students and is aligned to our whole school Wellbeing Program.

We are proud to share that we have reached our attendance rate target, set within our School Excellence Plan, and want to congratulate the effort students have made to attend school regularly.

Staff will be emphasising the strong links between attendance, academic success and student connectedness to learning in all subject areas. Students will be rewarded for ongoing success with certificates and an attendance BBQ at the end of the semester.

There will be increased monitoring of areas we wish to strengthen including lateness to school and whole day absences. The school is working closely with the Home School Liaison Officer to identify students causing concern and to work closely with parents and carers to support and engage the student with the school community.

The school utilises an **SMS text notification system** daily to notify parents of student absences and provides follow up emails as a reminder each week when there is no response to text messages. A text message will be sent for student absences each day. It is imperative that **ALL** absences are explained by **replying directly to each individual text via SMS** or either by providing a note or calling the school directly. If your phone number does change, please inform the school to ensure you are receiving attendance information for your child.



The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process.



Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information.
