What are you reading?

Ms Sheehy is reading Emma Cline's 'The Girls'

I become a bookworm in the holidays but find reading during term time very challenging. Having just joined a new Book Club though I have been forced to get reading by a due date and am enjoying it immensely. I love settling down in a comfortable chair to read.

Emma Cline is a new author for me, and this is a different genre than my normal Crime Fiction choice but is proving to be a compelling read.

Emma Cline's "The Girls" follows Evie Boyd, a lonely teenager in 1960s Northern California, as she is drawn into a cult led by a charismatic figure and mesmerized by an older girl named Suzanne. The novel explores themes of obsession, violence, and the destructive power of cults, set against the backdrop of a time of social upheaval.

Recently, **Teagan Hunt (Year 12)**, who has been part of Winmalee High School's Taekwondo team for the last five and a half years, tested for her Provisional Black Belt. As part of the testing requirements, Teagan was required to write an essay on "The value of self control and self discipline". In her essay below, Teagan shows a superior understanding of Taekwondo and the positive values that this type of training can bring into a person's life.

Taekwondo

Taekwondo to me is not just a martial art, it is a community, a method for self control and discipline to flow through you and an enjoyment to be shared. Taekwondo is a moving meditation of sorts. Upon entering the 도장 (dojang) place of study, one bows to respect the space, art and instructor 사범님 (sabeomnim (martial arts instructor/master-an honourific meaning sir)) and to say that they are self disciplined and ready to learn.

This bow reminds me each and every time to leave behind distractions from the outside world. For in class, not only am I a student practicing technique, I am also practicing patience, control and discipline that I can extend out into my daily life. Taekwondo has helped shape not only my body, but my character.



Taekwondo isn't about overpowering others, it is about mastering oneself. Every 품州 (poomsae) and 겨루기 (gyeorugi (gy is pronounced as a soft g/k sound)) sparring taught me that control comes from within, built through repetition, humility, and the choice to keep going even when it's hard.

Taekwondo matters to me because it is an essential part of my being, without it life would be incomplete. When I miss a class, my whole week feels incomplete and off-balance. I look forward to the focus during poomsae, the self control of self defense and the intensity of sparring. However, it's not just the movements that I enjoy, it's the people. The shared effort, the encouragement, the laughter and community. These moments bring me joy in a way nothing else does. The class is a family of sorts, built not by blood, but by sweat, discipline, and mutual respect. Training alongside others who are growing with me makes each lesson feel meaningful.

Every belt earnt isn't just a marker of physical skill, it is also proof of discipline, resilience, and respect not only to oneself but also to the discipline, the instructor and the other students.

Self-control and self-discipline are a large part of taekwondo. It's not just about holding back a punch or standing still when told. It's about training your mind to stay calm even when your body wants to rush, to push yourself to keep going when it's easier to stop. Every class reminds me that control is power. Discipline is the promise to yourself to show up, to push through, and to keep learning even when it is difficult and it appears as if you are not progressing. Through Taekwondo, these values don't just live in the dojang, they flow through into every part of my life, shaping how I act, how I think, and how I grow.

Even on tough days (even bad pain days), going to class makes everything feel a bit better, more clear. I leave sweaty, sometimes sore, but always proud. It's not about being perfect, it's about showing up and trying. I laugh with others, push myself, and leave feeling more focused. It's one of the best parts of my week.


